Remember that classes may change at the end of September. Families are still registering and we may have to shuffle students and grades the teachers teach as we ensure we meet the cap of 20 students in primary classes. We appreciate your patience as we work through our class placements. We do have a number of combined classes which are composed of students from two or more adjacent grades who are grouped with one teacher for instruction. "In all classrooms, no matter how they are organized, teachers need to provide for the individual needs of students. To achieve this, they use a variety of methods on a daily basis to asses the needs of each student, and then adjust the focus of instruction for skill development accordingly. In all classrooms, there is a range of students, and a teacher's goal to meet the needs of all learners remains the same regardless of classroom organization. Also, the focus of instruction for all subjects is on helping students to advance regardless of age, grade, or current level of performance" (Combined Grades - Ministry of Education, Ontario).

At Sutton PS we will be continuing our work on respectful workplace and learning environment. This means "that we create and maintain a healthy and productive working and learning environment that fosters respect for and is supportive of the dignity, self-esteem and fair treatment of everyone taking part in its activities." Respect is the character trait this month which links to our school and community focus of respectful workplace and learning environment. Respect plays an important role in a school. We need to take a person's feelings, needs and thoughts into consideration as we build relationships within the school community. It is important that this message of treating each other with respect is a similar message a student receives at home and at school in order for them to build positive relationships with staff and their peers. Anaphylaxis Canada would like to remind everyone to always read the ingredient list and precautionary statements (e.g. May contain), whether you are purchasing a product for yourself, your child, or to share with others. Be careful not to rely solely on a "free-from" claim on the front of a package for important allergen information. Of special note, for those with peanut and tree nut allergies, please be aware that there are currently several products that have a "peanut-free" claim on the front of the package and a "May contain tree nuts" warning on the back. If you have any questions regarding a product or ingredient/labelling information, kindly contact the manufacturer directly.

### SEPTEMBER SCHOOL BUS TRANSPORTATION NOTICE

Each summer, Student Transportation Services of York Region (STSYR) makes adjustments to bus route schedules to accommodate new students and new school openings. As a result, some students may experience changes in their bus schedule or route number. Please confirm bus stop service for September by checking <a href="https://www.schoolbuscitv.com">www.schoolbuscitv.com</a> as of August 19. If you are unable to find the information you require, please contact your school.

During the first two weeks of school, students should arrive at their bus stop ten minutes early. After this, students are asked to arrive 5 minutes early as each bus route develops its regular routine and service times

#### Transportation Eligibility

In accordance with Board policies, transportation is provided for students who live within their designated Home School attendance area and outside their grade appropriate Non-Transportation Zone. Transportation eligibility changes throughout a student's school career. Please note students currently in Grade 3 and Grade 8 who use school bus service may see a change in their eligibility as they transition to Grade 4 and Grade 9.

#### Eligibility JK- Grade 8

- All YRDSB students in JK Grade 3 who live within 1.2 km of their school are not eligible for transportation.
- All YRDSB students in Grades 4 8 who live within 1.6 km of their school are not eligible for transportation.

#### Eligibility Grade 9-12

 All YRDSB students in Grades 9 - 12 who live within a transit served area are not eligible for transportation.

Parents of students entering Grade 4 and Grade 9 may confirm their transportation eligibility by accessing the Bus Stop Information tab at <a href="https://www.schoolbuscity.com">www.schoolbuscity.com</a>.
