Culminating days – June 22 – 28

Are you looking for work? Your job is out there. We'll help you find it.

Pathways to Prosperity is a program designed to match job seekers with high-demand jobs and support local employers to train and retain skilled talent.

The program includes a 4-week training course in one of four sectors: manufacturing, construction, food service, or agriculture that leads to a 5-week paid work placement. Participants may have an opportunity to secure further employment when the program is complete. Local employers are currently facing significant labour shortages, and this program can help you find your future career.

To qualify for this free training opportunity, participants must currently be unemployed or under-employed (less than 20/hrs a week) and not currently enrolled in other education or training.

Pathways to Prosperity programs to consider



*All programs include employability skills training and industry-specific certifications, which vary by program.

Manufacturing

Learn how to use measurement systems and tools, learn CNC machine fundamentals, production line operations, troubleshooting and quality assurance concepts. You will also be introduced to welding and other manufacturing jobs.

Construction

Learn how to operate hand and power tools, construct floor joists, frame walls, install and remove roof shingles, install vinyl siding, and learn about the demolition of residential construction projects.

Agriculture

Learn how to use farming equipment using state-of-the-art simulators, learn to safely operate equipment, learn about heavy equipment maintenance, and gain agriculture work safety and awareness skills.

Food Service

Gain foundational skills for the food service/restaurant industry, including the basics of food preparation and cooking, proper food cutting techniques, safe use of commercial kitchen tools and equipment, food allergens, and food safety training.

INTERACTIVE GROUP PROGRAM



Camp Ignite provides children 6-13 years old with a Mentor to spend time with for 1.5 hours each week for the months of July and August. In this free group program, Mentors will meet with children in a large group setting and smaller groups to promote genuine rapport building, social emotional competencies and educational engagement through fun, interactive activities. In small groups, Mentors will engage children and youth on their academic journey, assisting with improving academic skills and building confidence in their abilities.

Indigenous Languages and International Languages (ILIL): Secondary Credit Program Update and Registration (2022-2023)

Duration

September to June (a minimum of 32 students is required for a course to be offered). PLEASE NOTE: Course offerings are not guaranteed as they are subject to sufficient enrolment, classroom and teacher availability.

<u>Eligibility</u>

Open to students (grade 9 to 12) who are non-first language speakers and first language speakers.

Pre-requisites

Students must have the required pre-requisite course in order to enroll in a level C or level D International Languages course, regardless of fluency (i.e., students may not skip levels). Advanced standing is granted only to students who have recently arrived (6-12 months) in Ontario and have an equivalent course pre-requisite from the home province/country.

How to Register

Registration: Wednesday, May 25, 2022 to Monday, September 19, 2022.

Credit classes begin September 24, 2022. Secondary (Grades 9 to 12) ILIL registration will not be accepted after the third class. Refer to our ILIL Secondary Credit Program webpage for the most up-to-date information about class start dates and times.

The 2022-2023 program year will be delivered virtually through synchronous learning, supported by asynchronous activities.

Course Materials & Fees

A \$10.00 non-refundable consumable fee is collected in the third class. Any additional book fees will be collected during class hours as required for certain courses. International fee-paying visa students are required to pay an additional \$500 for registration for a total of \$510.

- As a general rule, students **can not** complete hours in a for-profit-business

Due to COVID restrictions, **for 2021 - 2022 school year only**, the Ministry of Education has allowed the following activities that are not normally acceptable:

- Activities that include up to 10 hours of paid work, with the requirement to complete a reflection exercise indicating how their work contributed to service for others. - Activities such as walking a younger neighbour or sibling to and from school or helping younger siblings with their homework
- Activities that consist of duties normally performed in the home (e.g. students could help an elderly relative with errands, provide after-school care for a sibling)
- Students who graduate within the 2021-2022 school year (prior to June 30, 2022) will need **20** community hours the requirement for graduation after this date remains at 40 hours

ATTENDANCE

Student attendance is directly related to student success. It is very important that students are at school on time and in class daily. At Sutton District High School, when a student misses a class without a valid reason, our automated attendance program will phone home and email in the evening stating what grade the student is in and what class(es) were missed that day. If parents have any questions regarding the reported absence, they should check with their child and their child's teacher.

VALID ABSENCES

Only absences due to illness, medical/dental/legal appointments, bereavement, and school-sponsored activities are valid. All other absences, including missed buses and oversleeping are invalid. When a student is absent, it is the student's responsibility to ensure that the parent(s)/guardian(s) confirm knowledge of the validity of the absence.

Parent(s)/Guardian(s) are asked to call or email the attendance office at 722-3267 or sutton.dhs@yrdsb.ca (accessible 24 hours daily) on the morning of each day their child will be absent. Informing of the absence prior to the day or on the day of the absence will allow the information to be entered and will prevent the need for a phone call home or for the student to obtain an admit slip upon return. In certain instances, medical documentation may be required. Students are responsible for informing teachers in advance of an anticipated absence. Students are responsible for all missed work (tests, assignments, class notes) when absent and are encouraged to obtain this work from their teacher beforehand when possible.
