Modified School Day Letter for OSSLT – Thursday March 30, 2017

Dear Parents/Guardians:

<u>RE: Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test – Modified School Day</u> <u>Thursday, March 30, 2017</u>

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) has scheduled **Thursday, March 30, 2017** as the day for students across the province to complete the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT). To assist in creating the best environment possible for the students writing the test, the Board has agreed to a modified school day structure for the day in which the OSSLT will be written. This practice is very similar to that followed by other GTA school boards.

Sutton District High School has a regular start time of **9:20 a.m.** This year, students writing the test will come to school as per their normal start time and complete the test. Students **not** writing the OSSLT would be asked to commence their school day approximately **three and a half hours later** to coincide with the conclusion of the OSSLT on Thursday, March 30, 2017. Students requiring



accommodation will continue to write their test during an extended test-taking period. School will finish for all students at the normal time.

The school day timetable will proceed as follows:

2:20 – 2:50	Period 3
2:55 – 3:25	Period 4

Please note students in Self-Contained Special Education Classes (Developmentally Delayed, Autism, Intensive Support, etc.) will follow their regular schedule.

Student Transportation Services has been advised of these arrangements and will adjust bus schedules as follows:

- Students who are eligible for school bus transportation and are writing the OSSLT, will be picked up in the morning at their regular service time.
- Students who are eligible for transportation and are not writing the OSSLT test will be picked up 3 ½ hours later than their regular service time.
- All students will be transported home at regular service times.

We anticipate that student achievement will be enhanced by this modification since the entire school staff will be available to administer the test and supervise students; ample classroom space will be available, eliminating the need to write in specialty rooms; and sufficient technology will be available to support students receiving accommodation. In addition, a calmer student environment during the OSSLT designated writing time will result as only students writing the test will be in school.

Important immunization information from the Ministry of Health

The *Immunization of School Pupils Act* (the Act), requires Public Health to collect and review immunization records to ensure students are up to date with their immunizations. The Act also gives the medical officer of health the authority to direct school principals to suspend students whose immunization records are not up to date. In the spring of 2017, York Region Public Health is focusing on students who are seven and 17 years of age in the Public and French school boards. Students who do not provide up to date immunization information or a valid exemption will be suspended from school on **April 5, 2017**. In order to minimize the number of suspended students, York Region Public Health will provide support to parents, guardians and students to help them update their immunizations.

Please see below for important dates related to immunization, and information regarding additional immunization clinics. Thank you for supporting immunization in the community.

- April 5, 2017 First day of suspension period. Suspension orders will be issued.
- April 5, 2017 to May 2, 2017 Suspension period. Students who are suspended may return to school once up to date immunization information is provided to Public Health.

• Students who have attended public health immunization clinics will present to the school principal a "**Return to School Notice**" which can be interpreted by the principal as clearance for that student to return to school.

- March break immunization clinics will be available in Vaughan and Richmond Hill.

- York Region Public Health visits each high school for an immunization clinic during the school day. No appointment is required to attend the clinic. Visit <u>york.ca/immunizations</u> for more information.

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Allergies/Medical Conditions

There are students and staff members in our school who have life-threatening allergies to nuts and other allergens. If they smell or come into contact with these foods, they may have an anaphylactic reaction.

To help create an allergen-safe environment, do not bring nut or nut products (especially peanut products), or sprays with odour (such as perfume or colognes) to school.

If your child has a serious or life-threatening allergy or medical condition, let the school know immediately and speak to the school office about completing the appropriate medical forms. There are students in our school who have a life-threatening allergy to nuts and other allergens. If they smell or come into contact with these foods, they may have an anaphylactic reaction.

We request that staff and students refrain from bringing peanut products into the building. Peanut products are not sold in our school vending machines or cafeteria. Please inform the school, if your son or daughter has any allergies. Care and caution must be used when eating outside the cafeteria. Additional items may be restricted based on information that we receive throughout the year.

Many students and staff members are highly sensitive to perfumes, colognes, aftershaves and other scented products. By choosing to use unscented personal care products, we can make Sutton District High School a better place for all of us to learn and work.

March is Monitors-Off Month

Did you know that computer monitors average 30 watts when they are turned on? If a monitor is on all day, it would use 720 watt-hours. That's over 26kw-h each year. Even when "sleeping" or "hibernating", energy efficient monitors average 2 watts. If a monitor is turned off instead of sleeping for twelve hours each day, it would save almost 9KW-h each year. While that may only save \$1.30 a year, if everyone turned off all their monitors when not in use, we would greatly decrease energy consumption.

BAHA'I FAITH

March 2 - 20 The 19-Day Fast is observed every year from March 2 until March 20. During this time those who are physically able, abstain from food and drink from sunrise until sunset each day.

March 20 Naw Ruz (Baha'i New Year). Baha'is celebrate New Year on the first day of spring. Work and academic studies are suspended on this day. This date is also celebrated as a cultural event or faith day by many faith groups throughout the world.

BUDDHISM

March 20 - Spring Ohigon is a special time to listen to the teaching of the Buddha and to meditate on the perfection of enlightenment. This day is of particular importance for Jodo Shinshu Buddhists. CHRISTIANITY March 1 Ash Wednesday (Western Calendar) is the beginning of Lent, the forty day period (excluding Sundays) of prayer, repentance and self-denial that precedes Easter. It is a reminder of the days Jesus spent alone in the wilderness.

HINDUISM

March 13 - Holi is a colourful spring festival observed widely in Hindu communities around the world. The myths, customs and rituals associated with Holi vary considerably from place to place. Mar. 28 - Apr. 5 Navaratri (Spring) is a nine-day celebration of the Divine Goddess for good health, happiness and knowledge.

JUDAISM

March 12 Purim celebrates the victory over an oppressive ruler by Oueen Esther and her Uncle Mordecai. SIKHISM March 14 Sikh New Year's Day is the first day of the new Nanakshahi solar calendar. This is year 549 of the new era.

ZOROASTRIANISM

March 17 - Ghambar Hamaspathmaedem celebrates the creation of human beings.

March 21 - Naw Ruz (New Year's Day) in Fasli calendars. - This is the first day of the Zoroastrian and Persian year. It is a time of religious observance preceded by ten days of remembrance of the dead. It symbolizes the renewal of the world after winter. Irrespective of their religion, many Iranians celebrate this day. This celebration may also fall on March 20 based on the time of sunrise.

March 28 - Birthday of Prophet Zarathustra, the founder of the Zoroastrian faith.
