Information about the Ontario Secondary Literacy Test

This year's Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) will be written on **Thursday, March 30th**, **2017**. The test will be written in the morning in two 75 minute sessions, with a 15-minute break in between booklets. The school day has been adjusted so that only students who are writing the test are in the building during the morning. The modified timetable then allows for every student to



attend all four shortened periods in the afternoon. The modified timetable will be shared next month.

All students writing this year's OSSLT will attend an orientation session in the lecture theatre during period 3 on February 28th, or March 1st (depending on which class they are in). This orientation session will introduce all students writing this year to the format of the test, the requirements of the test, and some tips for success in writing the test. Each student will be given an orientation booklet to refer to, which also includes information on how to access practice materials on-line at www.eqao.com. Students requiring accommodations for the OSSLT are continuing to work with the Special Education department to ensure that these are implemented on the day of the test.

In preparation for the literacy test, all Grade 9 and 10 courses have been incorporating the explicit teaching and use of OSSLT tasks and strategies into the curriculum so that all students have various opportunities to practice each of the tasks in a variety of subject areas.

In addition, all students who are writing the OSSLT this year are invited to attend a series of Lunch n' Learns in room 325 to practice the various tasks that they will see during this year's literacy test. During each of the sessions, students will complete one OSSLT task and self-assess the task using the scoring tools that are appropriate to each task. The schedule of these sessions is listed below:

Allergies/Medical Conditions

There are students and staff members in our school who have life-threatening allergies to nuts and other allergens. If they smell or come into contact with these foods, they may have an anaphylactic reaction.

Eco Tip

March is Monitors-Off Month

Did you know that computer monitors average 30 watts when they are turned on? If a monitor is on all day, it would use 720 watt-hours. That's over 26kw-h each year. Even when "sleeping" or "hibernating", enery efficient mornitors average 2 watts. If a monitor is turned off instead of sleeping for twelve hours each day, it would save almost 9KW-h each year. While that may only save \$1.30 a year, if everyone turned off all their monitors when not in use, we would greatly decrease energy consumption.
