Orange Shirt Day - September 30, 2016

The orange shirt day movement started in 2013 to highlight the pain and suffering of thousands of Indigenous children who were sent to residential school throughout the last century. The colour of the shirt is connected to the experience of Phyllis Webstad who was sent to Cariboo Residential School near Williams Lake, BC, in 1973. Six-years old at the time, Phyllis went to her first day of school wearing a new bright orange shirt. New clothes were a rare thing for the young girl, who was being raised by her grandmother. However, upon arriving at the school, the nuns stripped her of the shirt, forcing her to wear the school's institutional uniform.

Webstad has felt the impact of that event long after it occurred, "that feeling of worthlessness and insignificance, ingrained in me from my first day at the mission, affected the way I lived my life for many years. Even now, when I know nothing could be further than the truth, I still sometimes feel that I don't matter."

The shirt has since gone on to become a symbol of a national movement that recognizes the suffering of Indig- enous children at residential schools across the country and to show a renewed commitment to ensure that every child matters.

Recognize the resiliency and bravery of Residential School Survivors by wearing an orange shirt on September 30th.

The Dragons' Nest is an in-class high school business program designed to encourage students to explore their creative and entrepreneurial potential and help them identify and build confidence in their entrepreneurial abilities by creating a real business venture. The Learning Partnership matches mentors from the business community with teachers to ignite a passion for entrepreneurism in the classroom. Two regional activities, a video pitch and a <u>Dragons' Nest Finale</u> are organized in semester two to provide a challenging environment for students to strengthen their go-to-market skills. The Dragons' Nest Finalists in the GTA program are given automatic entry to the Launch Zone at Ryerson Summer Company with up to \$3,000 so they can operate their venture and generate income in the summer. <u>Susan Wakutz</u> is the Program Manager.


Protect yourself against West Nile virus and Lyme disease

If you are heading outdoors to keep active, go camping or work in your garden, protect yourself and your family against West Nile virus and Lyme disease. West Nile virus is spread to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito; Lyme disease is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

What you can do:

- Cover up when you go outdoors with light coloured long sleeved shirts and pants;
- Use an insect repellent containing DEET;
- Check yourself and your children for ticks;
- Remove attached ticks as quickly as possible; and
- Clean up standing water around your home where mosquitoes like to breed.
