Orange Shirt Day



In the Fall of 1973, six-year-old Phyllis Webstad's grandmother took her to the local general store and bought her a brand new orange shirt for her first day of school. She was so proud of this beautiful new garment and she beamed as she wore it looking forward to going to school.

When Phyllis arrived at St. Joseph Mission however, the shirt was ripped away from her never to be seen again. Forty years later, Phyllis Webstad began the Orange Shirt Day movement to raise awareness and promote healing for crimes committed against aboriginal children between 1831 and 1996 in the residential school system. Today we honoured the day by wearing orange shirts. A documentary, called 8th Fire, was shown in the Lecture

Theatre at lunch to educate both staff and students on residential schooling. Thank you to all those who helped to raise awareness.

Two regional activities, a video pitch and a <u>Dragons' Nest Finale</u> are organized in semester two to provide a challenging environment for students to strengthen their go-to-market skills. Fight the Bite!

Protect yourself against West Nile virus and Lyme disease

If you are heading outdoors to keep active, go camping or work in your garden, protect yourself and your family against West Nile virus and Lyme disease. West Nile virus is spread to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito; Lyme disease is spread through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick.

What you can do:

- Cover up when you go outdoors with light coloured long sleeved shirts and pants;
- Use an insect repellent containing DEET;
- Check yourself and your children for ticks;
- Remove attached ticks as quickly as possible; and
- Clean up standing water around your home where mosquitoes like to breed

The Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT) is going online!!

On Thursday, October 20, after several years of research, development, consultation, trial runs and system checks, EQAO will take the important step of holding a large-scale assessment of OSSLT-eligible students in a digital environment. Open to all of Ontario's secondary schools, this is a critical trial of EQAO's online testing system and of schools' and school boards' technological capacity to support online assessments. At SDHS, all grade 10 students will be participating in the online administration of this test. In addition, all previously-eligible students who are not enrolled in the OLC (literacy course) for the 2016/2017 school year will be participating. In addition to the classroom preparation provided for this test, there are sample materials and sample tests on the EQAO website. There is even a sample on-line version at the following link:

Additional support and/or practice materials can be provided by Lisa Schneppenheim, SDHS's Literacy Teacher. Lunch n' Learn sessions for students will also be offered in October.

Please note, if students are unsuccessful and/or there are technological issues during this online administration, all students will still have the regularly scheduled OSSLT in March 2017 to satisfy their literacy requirement. Those who pass the online test will not have to write the one scheduled in March.

International Baccalaureate Program Information Evening

The International Baccalaureate (IB) program is student-centred with a focus on developing intellectual, personal, emotional and social skills for students who live, learn and work in a rapidly changing world. The program emphasizes critical, compassionate thinking, community involvement and intercultural understanding. It is founded on international standards and assessment. Students who complete the program earn both an Ontario Secondary School Diploma and an IB Diploma.

Attendance

Student attendance is directly related to student success. It is very important that students are at school on time and in class daily.

At Sutton District High School, when a student misses a class without a valid reason, our automated attendance program will phone home in the evening stating what grade the student is in and what class(es) were missed that day. If parents have any questions regarding the reported absence, they should check with their child and his or her teacher, as well as the appropriate Vice Principal if necessary.

Being Punctual and Prepared to Learn

We are supporting our students in arriving to class on time every day, for every period. There are strong links between being late, missing classes and lowered academic achievement. We want all students to succeed here at SDHS. So we will be consequencing those who are late or who miss too much time from class due to excessive hall-walking. Starting on Monday, September 12th all students who are late to class, meaning arriving after the bell, will be issued one warning for their tardiness. Any subsequent late, students will be issued a 20-minute lunch detention. Detentions will run from 12:05 -12:25 in a central location within the school. The detention room is supervised by teaching staff and our expectation is that students sit quietly to serve their detention. They can choose to use the time productively and complete assignments, homework, read or engage in other individual quiet study. The intention is to promote being punctual and prepared to learn at the beginning of class.

Valid Absences

Only absences due to illness, medical/dental/legal appointments, bereavement, and school-sponsored activities are valid. All other absences, including missed buses and oversleeping are invalid. When a student is absent, it is the student's responsibility to ensure that his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) confirm knowledge of the validity of the absence. Parent(s)/Guardian(s) are asked to call the Attendance Office at 722-3267 (accessible 24 hours daily) on the morning of each day their child will be absent or write a note verifying the absence. Informing of the absence prior to the day or on the day of the absence will allow the information to be entered and will prevent the need for a phone call home or for the student to obtain an admit slip upon return. If no phone call or note is received, students must obtain an admit slip from the office. In certain instances, medical documentation may be required. Students who are 18 years of age or older are to sign in and out at the Attendance Office when leaving or entering the school for any reason. Students are responsible for informing teachers in advance of an anticipated absence. Students are responsible for all missed work (tests, assignments, class notes) when absent and are encouraged to obtain this work from their teacher beforehand when possible.

Holidays and Observances

Students are now required to submit the form for Community Volunteer Hours PRIOR to volunteering. The students will need to get pre-approval from a Guidance Counsellor and have the form returned to them BEFORE they volunteer. This will require a minimum one week turnaround time. Please ensure that you follow these procedures so that you can get credit for all of your Community Volunteer Hours.

Students are reminded that any hours obtained over the summer should be handed into the Guidance office.

As a graduation requirement, students are required to complete 40 hours of community volunteer hours. It is recommended that students complete these hours in grades 9, 10 and 11. «First_Name» «Last_Name» has completed «Community_Servi» hours of community volunteer hours. Community volunteer hour forms can be found in the Guidance Office. Please be advised the completed forms are processed periodically, the hours submitted to the office may not appear for up to four weeks. Loran Scholarship Information

There are less than three weeks left for Grade 12 students to submit sponsored applications for the Loran Awards. Sutton District High School can sponsor up to three students for our <u>university scholarships</u>, 30 of which are valued at up to \$100,000 over four years.

The application process includes the submission of a reference letter and the confirmation of school sponsorship, both of which must be completed by **Wednesday October 19, 2016**. **Please note** that if you wish Sutton District High School to sponsor you that your completed application must be brought to guidance no later than **October 7, 2016** so that consideration may be given to sponsorship. **Submission of your application to guidance does not guarantee sponsorship**.
