Land Acknowledgement

We affirm that we are all treaty people and acknowledge that the York Region District School Board is located on the lands of two treaties. These treaties are signed with the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation and the First Nations of the Williams Treaties who are: the Mississaugas of Alderville, Curve Lake, Hiawatha, Scugog Island; and the Chippewas of Beausoleil, Rama, and Georgina Island our closest neighbour and partner in education.

To honour this agreement we will take up our responsibility to be respectful of their traditions, knowledge and inherent rights as sovereign nations. We will respect their relationship with these lands and recognize that our connection to this land is through the continued relationship with these First Nations, and we acknowledge our shared responsibility to respect and care for the land and waters for future generations.

MAKING IMPROVEMENTS TO ENCOURAGE ACTIVE SCHOOL TRAVEL


Keep an eye out for some of the following in your community



Sidewalk Stencils provide active and engaging activities for students and families on walking routes!



Wayfinding Signage assists students and families in planning an active route to school. These also make great spots to meet up!



Bike & Scooter Racks are available to encourage more children to bike and scooter to school.



No Stopping Red Lines are supplemental to existing "No Stopping" signs. The red line indicates where pick-up and drop-off is not allowed.

School pavement markings remind drivers they are entering a school zone.



BENEFITS OF ACTIVE SCHOOL TRAVEL



Fewer cars during pick-up and drop-off can help reduce traffic congestion



Walking & wheeling raises awareness of active transportation in the community



Encourages students to walk and cycle to their destination at an early age forming good lifelong habits



Active school travel can lead to improved physical and mental health and has been shown to improve attention and focus during the school day



Opportunity to spend time with friends and get to know their neighbourhood



Improves air quality around schools


AST Program Components

- Goal is to provide tools that encourage students to walk, cycle, roll and ride the bus to and from school more often. Not just for one day, but <u>all</u> year round!
- Concept originated from a pilot in the City of Markham that began in May 2019, Newmarket piloted program between 2021-2023 at 6 schools
- Funding has been received to:
 - Install additional bike and scooter racks (installation date TBD)
 - 2. Install AST infrastructure
 - Wayfinding signage
 - Red line painting / No stopping zones
 - School zone stencils
 - Sidewalk stencils
 - Walk with the Mayor Event



AST Program Components

- Weekly announcements and special events help encourage AST
 - Partners can support with communication and newsletters
 - School Council can support with the promotion campaign
- Monthly initiatives
 - Walk to school events
 - Classroom competitions
 - Special campaigns
 - Cycling Pop-up and Education
 - Assembly
- Data collection another tool to assess impacts of communication and infrastructure improvements
 - On the ground data collection and observations
 - School staff hand up survey (once a month)



Red Line Marking



No Stopping Signs on Street Adjacent to School.

Stopping a vehicle, including for pick-up or drop-off of students, is not permitted during the times shown.



No Stopping "Red Zone"

Supplemental to the existing "No Stopping" signs, the red line indicates where pick-up and drop-off activity is not allowed.

No Stopping Signs

No parking or pick-up or drop-off activity permitted

No Parking Signs

Only active pick-up and drop-off permitted



WHAT ARE THOSE RED LINE MARKINGS ON THE CURB?



The red curb markings indicate where pick-up and drop-off is not allowed. They are supplemental to existing "No Stopping" signs and have been strategically placed in locations where it is deemed unsafe to stop or park your car to drop off or pick up your child.

These markings are part of the Active School Travel pilot program which is a partnership between YRDSB, YCDSB, Town of Newmarket, York Region, and Smart Commute Central York.



 - will be scheduled and discussed at the next meeting; or if time permits, and a consensus is reached, can be discussed at the conclusion of Agenda Items


