



Platonic Solids

During the past few weeks, Ms.Gallop's class has been working on a subject in math called Platonic Solids. The Platonic Solids include the cube, tetrahedron, icosahedron, octahedron, and dodecahedron. These shapes are special because each face is congruent. Each member of the platonic solids has a different congruent shape that makes them unique. Ms. Gallop's class learned about platonic solids through hands-on activities. They constructed nets and assembled them. They also created figures using straws, and popsicle sticks. Students also used their knowledge of angles and triangles. Students found and labeled different angles in their figures, such as corresponding angles, supplementary angles, and opposite angles. They also labeled a right angle triangle. Through these activities, Ms. Gallop's class discovered the relationships and patterns between the shapes. This activity introduced another aspect of learning where it gives you a hands-on experience on how to make the nets of these shapes.
