



Just bring your photographs/reference images, and our Artists in Residence will draw/paint your picture in any medium of your choice (pencil, charcoal, acrylic, pastels).



Co-op News New Beginnings: Co-op Students Discover Personal Insights

The second semester co-op students have been at their placements for just over a month, and the excitement and benefits of experiential learning are being realized. Their placements cover every sector of the working world, ranging from the medical field, to law, to pet care, to teaching, to computer hardware engineering.

The following quotations are taken from the current Co-op students' journals:

Topic: Self Awareness

A feeling about me that seemed especially strong this week at the hospital was my confidence. I'd never had a job before, therefore being independent while completing new tasks was certainly new and difficult. Nevertheless, I do think that I was able to adapt and improve for the better. As I said in the past few journals, being shy was always a setback, and it was affecting my experiences at work. However, I do believe that I have become so much more confident and outgoing, and I love the change. Working at the front desk is no longer a challenge for me, and in fact, I enjoy working at the front desk more than working in the back by myself. During this past week, I was also given the opportunity to watch ECT procedures, and it was so eye opening. After the procedures, I had the courage to approach the anesthesiologist and ask him some questions to help me figure out which career path I would like to take in the future. We went over school, the industry, the pros and cons about being an anesthesiologist, and the downsides of being a doctor. It took me a while to approach him, however I was so glad that I did because I learned a lot, and it definitely reignited my interest in anesthesiology. If it had been last year, I would've never been able to approach that doctor because I would have been too shy, however thanks to my personal improvement; I was able to do so. Even small things like smiling at strangers on the subway, or talking to employees have become such an easy, everyday thing for me. I do think that although going to co-op at 7:20am every morning is a struggle, this will benefit me in the long run. I'm already seeing a difference in my personality, and I've always wanted to be outgoing, therefore I'm glad I had this opportunity.

Topic: Personal Change

My co-op experience so far has definitely changed me already after only a few weeks. I have learned and realized so many new things that have changed the way I work on tasks now, since I get a lot of tasks to do at my co-op placement. All the new skills I have been taught has changed the way I take on new tasks to do.

Now I know to prioritize tasks once I receive new ones, to realize which need to be done first and which can wait a while to be done. I now ask questions whenever I receive a new task to be sure I know exactly what I am meant to do and to make sure I am on the right track. I used to be shy and nervous to ask questions even if I am confused, but now I realize it is so much more helpful to know 100% what I am doing and ask all the questions I need so that I understand how to complete the task properly. Another thing that has changed because of my co-op experiences is that I now always review my work and spell check before I submit it. I realize that for some of my tasks they are depending on me to create a professional document that shows their workplace and it should not be filled with mistakes. I also feel bad that they have to look over my work to check for errors so I now try to have no more mistakes and gain their trust so they do not need to spend time searching for mistakes in my work. I feel like this co-op experience has changed me already and is teaching me many important and valuable skills that I will need to use in the future. I am sure I am going to learn many more and that this experience is giving me many chances to grow.

Topic: Goal Setting

At my co-op there are many different aspects that are encouraging me to pursue my educational and career goals. At my placement I have the opportunity to interact with different types of people who have had different experiences. I can talk to different nurses about the educational path that they chose and how it benefited them. The interactions that I have had with the nurses at my placement has helped me and encouraged me to consider different paths that I have never considered before. These interactions have also helped me realize that there are school and job opportunities outside of Canada, which is something that I had never really considered before co-op. The nurses that I have talked to are very positive about what they do and the benefits they get from nursing, which has encouraged me to continue to pursue a career in medicine. Another aspect of my co-op that is encouraging me to pursue a career in medicine is the work that I am doing. Going into my co-op I thought that I wouldn't enjoy or be cut out for working in a hospital. That is not the case now because this experience has shown me that I am capable of handling patients and that I love the environment of a hospital. I know now how a hospital works which has encouraged me to want to work in one. The last aspect of co-op that has encouraged me to continue to pursue a career in medicine is the terms and surgeries that I am learning about. At co-op there is a variety of different surgeries that patients undergo, I have been given the opportunity to learn about those procedures and the recovery process afterwards. This exposure has peaked my fascination about surgery and about the medical field. I am now aware of different types of surgery and this fascination with more surgeries has continued to encourage me to pursue a career in medicine. I hope that throughout the rest of my co-op experience I will continue to be encouraged through learning to pursue my dream of working in medicine.

Our team has been busy with providing our students with information about the University and the College Application process, scholarship and community involvement hours and SHSM requirements outstanding for our grade 12's.

The Guidance Team this year consists of Ms. Lovleen Rai (ESL Counselor/Literacy Lead), Ms. Viviane Estafanos (French Immersion Counselor/AP Co-oridnator, F.I. Teacher), Ms. Julie Scott (Student Success), Ms. Maria Merecoulias (Student Success for ESL students). Mr. Nizam Alkins, Head of Guidance (Counselor) and Ms. Gail Burdett (Guidance Secretary).

We also would like to announce the process for making guidance appointments. <u>First</u>, please see Mrs. Burdett, our Guidance Secretary. If any student would like to make an appointment with their "area" identified counselor (French Immersion, ESL, Other), they should come to the Guidance Office before school starts (8:30 to 8:45), during their lunch (11:30 to 12:30), or after school (3:00 to 3:30) to make their appointment.

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) deadline has now passed. Currently 189 Thornlea students have applied. We wish them all the best and will continue to answer their questions on the University selection process. The next marks transmission for OUAC will be on **April 26**th.

Guidance will continue to monitor and support the College application process. Currently, 38 Thonrlea students have applied. No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own on-line at www.ontariocolleges.ca.

Please note that the "equal consideration" deadline has passed (Feb. 1st), but students can still apply. The next marks transmission for OCAS will be on **April 26**th.

College and University Spring Open Houses are a popular way for prospective students to visit various Post-Secondary Institutions and evaluate them prior to applying and/or choosing. It is never too early to begin the search. The Guidance Department encourages all students, especially in grades 11 and 12 to attend the open house program of any potential future University/College. Please visit the University/College website to confirm Open House schedules during March Break. Spaces can be limited.

For Scholarship information, please make an appointment to see Ms. Rai in the Guidance office. We also have a handout in the Guidance office.

We also would like to announce to all our grade 9 students. Grade 9 students that complete their 40 community service hours in their grade 9 year(by June 29), will receive a special certificate of completion.

For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our "Volunteer Bulletin Board" for current opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education requirement.

<u>Finally, a reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service</u> hours as soon as possible. It is highly recommended that this be completed before the April 26 <u>OUAC/OCAS transmission.</u>

THE JUDGES CUP

Last week, we, the participants for the 2018 Judge's Cup had the honour of representing Thomlea at the Ontario Superior Court of Justice in Newmarket to compete against other schools in the region in a mock trial case. For these past few months our team has assumed numerous roles: judges, lawyers, clerks, witnesses, to name a few. Certain times if felt as if we were actors assuming roles of villains and victims in films, and other times as if we were professional legal counsel with the stake of justice in our hands. There has never been a dull moment during our meetings. With the help of our generous lawyer adviser Domenic, each day we discussed new findings in the case, loopholes in the alibi, cross-examination questions that bordered on leading, and incredulous theories - but with evidence to back it up. From down the hall you could hear us shouting: "It's a yes or no question ma'am!", "Objection!", or "... But! Were they fresh?" Judge's Cup has not only enabled us to learn more about the proceedings of our Canadian legal system, but provided an opportunity for students to collaborate and bond. I'd highly recommend this opportunity to all students! Regardless of whether you are considering a career in law, you should always understand your rights and how the law protects you. Thanks to Ms.Magic and my fellow teammates, this was a wonderful experience! We look forward to next year!

"During this experience, I've had the honour to be appointed as one of the four lawyers in the Judge's Cup competition. To be honest, I was excited, but petrified of not living up to expectations. Thankfully my teammates were incredibly talented in spotting flaws in this case, ranging from the position of the blood to the lack of evidence supporting the sworn statements. Ideas just came flowing out of us endlessly, debated and shaped into the perfect case for both defense and crown. In addition, our mentoring lawyer Domenic assisted us in drafting our opening and closing statements as well as our examination questions. It's a wonder how we can change from pages of cluttered ideas into neat, structured questions. When we were running through mock cases, there are moments when I felt like a true lawyer standing in court presenting my case to the judge and the jury. When the real competition came, I wasn't nervous at all. We sat before the judge, our papers and affidavits in ready to be submitted. I can't even describe the thrill I experienced that day, prompting the witness, using the affidavit to it's greatest extent, and delivering a remarkable closing statement to end it.

I have learned so much both in court and out of the courtroom, all thanks to our teacher Ms. Magic and all of my teammates. I witnessed the Canadian court in session, learned the proper delivery of evidence and statements, and how to phrase my words in a way that is convincing yet still not badgering. There is not a single moment of regret during these 2 months and if I will ever have the chance to join again, I inevitably will!"

"Judges cup was an amazing experience. Our whole team worked really hard to build a crown and defense case, and we even got to work with a lawyer, Domenic! After weeks of preparation, we went to the competition. It took place at the Newmarket courthouse. During the day we heard some amazing speeches from several experienced lawyers, and then the competition started. We went against two schools, arguing the manslaughter case of Jamie Rogers. All of the teams there were pretty amazing, but I'm super proud of our team. We worked extremely hard and I don't doubt that we impressed the judges! It was an incredible day where the whole team learned more about a career in law, we met a lot of new people, and we got to practice our public speaking skills. Judge's cup was truly an experience I've never had before, and I'm glad I joined this year!"

Participating at this year's Judges' Cup was an honourable experience as I had a good opportunity to acquaint myself firsthand with the justice system. It was incredible to see many other students participate and battle out at the courts, showcasing their eager and enthusiasm for the country's law system. Judges' Cup is a provincial competition for students that are interested in or taking law in high school, it is a three day tournament which is deemed as a lavish simulation. The Judges' Cup is our version of the Stanley Cup, but without all physical injuries or brawls. The student lawyers, witnesses, and accused are all role playing. The Justices, provincial prosecutors, court clerks, courtrooms and phlegmatically apathetic constables are all exceptionally bona fide and, for the record, volunteer their time and expertise to all participants. As per my role, I had the opportunity to play a bartender, who was a key witness, to the case we all would be fighting on defending or going against beyond a reasonable doubt to prove the accused is guilty. Being a witness is difficult because they are the only individuals in the competition who had to get in role, from dressing to memorizing their affidavits, but nonetheless it was nothing extremely challenging. Overall, I really enjoyed the experience although we did not win. But there is always a next time.

Description

Youth Innovation By Design focuses on ways in which innovators identify problems, see them as opportunities, generate ideas, and organize resources to develop and take successful solutions forward into the world, both for-profit and not-for-profit. Students will be encouraged to use a variety of design thinking techniques, including the Innovation, Creativity, and Entrepreneurship (ICE) Toolkit to develop and grow their ideas. They will consider the ethical and legal implications of decisions, the breadth of roles in innovation culture as well as related financial literacy and sustainability models. In support of both group and individualized projects, students will be introduced to, and taught how to connect with, local and global ecosystems. Student learning throughout the course will be supported by guest speakers and mentors provided through a pilot collaboration with York University's YSpace Markham and Innovation York.


