Message from Our Trustee

One of our top priorities as a school board is creating an environment that enables our students to focus on learning and be successful. That means creating environments where students are safe and feel safe, where all of our students know that they are welcome and supported, and where they see their identities reflected, valued and celebrated.

Championing Equity and Inclusivity

Championing Equity and Inclusivity is one of the priorities outlined in the <u>Board of Trustees' Multi-Year Strategic Plan</u>. We are fortunate to live in one of the most diverse regions of Canada, and welcome students, staff and families with a broad range of identities and experiences. There has been much work underway at the Board in the past few months to ensure we are providing all of our students with a safe, equitable and inclusive learning environment, including:

Providing Board-wide training for over 12,000 school staff on anti-Black racism.

Bringing together over 250 students and staff at our annual SpeakOut conference for the 2SLGBTQ+ community.

Acknowledging <u>Treaties Recognition Week</u>, and learning about the importance of treaties and treaty relationships in Canada from First Nations community members.

• Hosting a labour market information night for parents to learn about current and future career opportunities and employment trends.

Bringing together hundreds of members of the education community for three days of learning focused on Indigenous Education and Equity at our world-renowned <u>Quest conference</u>.

This is in addition to the ongoing work taking place in our schools. It is also important that our families know and feel that they are a valued, respected and important part of our school community. We recently held regional school council forums that brought together school council members from across the region to learn and share together on important topics such as engaging families, vaping and more. It was wonderful to see so many family members there.

The Board of Trustees was also pleased to receive and commit to taking action on the recommendations in response to the Anti-Black Racism, Antisemitism, Classism and Islamophobia community consultations.

Winter Months

With the winter weather already upon us, I also want to remind families that school transportation may be cancelled on <u>extreme cold or inclement weather days</u>, and there may be rare occasions when emergency weather conditions result in school closures. To ensure families are aware, last month, we tested a new system to send text messages to families in emergency situations only. Information about transportation cancellations and school closures will also be available on Board and school websites, Board social media channels and local media.

Many of our students and families will be celebrating days of significance and holidays in the coming weeks and months, and I wish you all the very best for the season. I hope everyone has a safe and happy winter break and we look forward to welcoming students back in January.

Bus or School Cancellations

With winter weather already here, we want to share some important reminders for families.

When an **inclement weather** or **extreme cold** or day is declared, school transportation (including buses and taxis) are cancelled in the morning and afternoon. Schools will remain open. If you drive your child to school, or your child takes alternate transportation, you must make arrangements for your child to get home at the end of the day. Please call the school if your child will not be attending school on those days. Students will not be penalized for missing school on these days.

There may be rare instances when **emergency winter events** occur and we need to close all schools and Board locations. Please take the time to make plans in the event of an emergency school closure.

Information about transportation cancellations and Board closures will be shared through local media, <u>Board</u> and school website and on <u>twitter</u> <u>@YRDSB</u>.

Our process for extreme cold, inclement weather and emergency weather days are outlined in the Board's <u>Severe Weather policy</u>, which has been recently updated and is available for public comment. Seeking feedback from staff and community members, including parents/guardians, is an important part of the review process. All <u>policies available for comment</u> are sent to school council chairs and are posted on the Board website, along with information about how to provide feedback.



Community Service Hours

We would also like to remind students that there is a process in place for Community Service Hours (CSH). All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for a CSH sheet and pre-approval. A reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours by Friday January 24th, 2020. Before the next OUAC/OCAS transmission.

We also would like to announce the approved initiative to all our <u>grade 9</u> students. Grade 9 students that complete their 40 community service hours in their grade 9 year will receive a special certificate of completion. This is for grade 9's only. The 40 hours must be submitted into our Guidance Office by <u>Friday June 19th to Qualify</u>.

For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our "Volunteer Bulletin Board" for opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education graduation requirement.

The Post-Secondary Institutions (Universities and Colleges) visits have come to an end. We would like to thank our presenters and our students for attending these seminars and asking great questions. A special thank you to Ms. Lovleen Rai for organizing all the visits.

As for Scholarship information for grade 12 graduating students, please make an appointment to see Ms. Rai in the Guidance office. There is additional scholarship information available, please see Ms. Rai for the password.

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) Pin Codes have been distributed. Over <u>200</u> graduating students have already picked up their Pin Code and are on their way to applying to University. Over <u>120</u> Thornlea students have already applied and some have been accepted with an early conditional offer! If a student has not picked up their code, they should come to the Guidance office immediately.

University Applications:

You can select as many University programs as you would like (\$50.00 each), but, you can only choose a <u>max-imum of 3 programs</u> per University. For example:

Only 3 choices can be used for all University of Toronto campuses, for example (St. George, Scarborough, Mississauga) can have one program each <u>or</u> all 3 at Scarborough or any combination adding up to 3.

Waterloo University, you could only select a maximum of 3 programs. If you wanted to add a 4th you cannot.

If you need clarification on this process or have questions, please do not hesitate to ask a counselor.

Guidance already offered a College application seminar. If you need further assistance please see Ms. Lovleen Rai in the Guidance Office. 15 students have already applied.

Ontario College Application:

No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own with their Ontario Education Number (OEN) at www.ontariocolleges.ca- Students can apply today!

You can apply to an Ontario College today! Deadline for equal consideration is Feb. 1st 2020.

Please see Ms. Lovleen Rai for support with your Ontario College Application.

The Deadline for your University Application is January 15, 2020 (it is highly recommended to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OUAC University grades transmission is scheduled for February 13, 2020.

Deadline to submit your completed application to the OUAC.

Note: The OUAC still processes applications received after this date and distributes them to the universities; however, specific university deadlines will apply.

The initial application includes all final grades from completed Grade 11 and 12 courses and a list of all current-year courses in progress.

January 23, 2020

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all application data and grades from the OUAC for applications submitted by January 15, 2020.

February 4, 2020

Recommended last date for students to submit university and program changes and additional active choices to the OUAC to be considered for early admission.

Note: This is a recommended deadline. The OUAC will still accept and process application changes at any time.

February 28, 2020

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all final first-semester grades and current full-year grades for 4U/M courses from the OUAC.

The "Equal Consideration" Deadline for your Ontario College Application is <u>February1st</u>, 2020 (highly recommended to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OCAS College grades transmission is scheduled for early **February 7**, 2020.

If students are planning on making a request for a timetable change for 2^{nd} semester, they should make an appointment with their counselor today.

Holocaust Vocabulary

Holocaust: The murder of 6 million Jews in Europe from 1933 to 1945 by Nazis and the people who helped them. The Holocaust also targeted Roma, Slavs, the disabled, gay people, and others.

Jew: A person who follows the Jewish religion (Judaism) and/or identifies with Jewish culture and history. Nazi: A person who followed Adolph
Hitler's ideas during the Holocaust. Nazis
were extremely nationalistic, and believed
in the concept of an Aryan "master race"
that was destined to rule the world. They
also believed the 'inferior' races should be
destroyed.

Concentration Camp or Labour

Camp: Prison camps where jews and other victims of the Nazis were confined and forced to work long hours without food or medicine. Camps were overcrowded, surrounded by barbed wire, and heavily guarded. Millions of Jews were also murdered in these camps, usually in gas chambers, but also by shooting and starvation.





WELCOME HELEN YERMUS

Holocaust Survivor



Helen Yermus was born in Kaunus (Kovno), Lithuania, Today she lives in Thornhill.

She is visiting Thornlea students to share her story of how she and her mother survived the worst genocide of the 20th century.

Have your thoughtful questions ready.



More Vocabulary

Displaced Person Camp (DP Camp):

After the Holocaust, the survivors lived together in camps (not prison camps) until they could find a country to go to to start a new life.

Ghetto: A place where Jews were forced to live by the Nazi invaders. There was not much food or medicine. Jews could not leave the ghetto without permission.

KinderAktion: a round-up, by the Nazis, of Jewish children. These children were either murdered on the spot, or sent to a concentration/death camp to be killed.

Dachau - One of the many concentration camps set up by the Nazis to exploit Jews as slave labourers and/or to murder them. Between 1933-1945, over 188,000 prisoners were incarcerated in Dachau. At least 28,000 died between 1940-1945, but unknown numbers died between 1933 and 1939.

Antisemitism: Hatred of/Prejudice against Jews/Jewish people.

HELEN YERMUS TIMELINE

1932 - Helen Yermus born in Kaunas, Lithuania in Europe

1939 - World War II begins

194r - Germany invades Lithuania and establishes a ghetto for the Jews of Kaunas. Helen and her father, Yitzhak, her mother, Toby, and her little brother, Abraham, were forced into the ghetto by the Nazis. Her great aunt and cousin soon joined them; however, during the Oct. 28 "Great Action" in the ghetto, her great aunt and cousin were separated from the family and machine-gunned to death along with 10,500 other Kaunas Jews.

1944 - Helen's little brother, Abraham, is rounded up in the "Kinder-Action" despite Helen's efforts to save him. The Kovno Ghetto was then liquidated, and Helen and her mother were shipped to the Stutthof concentration camp. The men were separated, including Helen's father, who was taken to Dachau and killed. Helen worked as a slave labourer for many months, digging trenches for the German military.

1945 - In January, the Nazis began the great Death Marches, but Helen and her mother were left behind. Nazis entered their tent and injected them with a poisonous substance. While several others died, miraculously, Helen and her mother survived. 1948 - After spending 3 years in DP camps, Helen and her mother, Toby, finally made it to Canada, where Helen has made it her life's work to to teach Canadian students the lessons of the Holocaust, ensuring young people learn the consequences of hatred and prejudice.

1952 - Helen married Aaron Yermus, whom she met in a DP camp in Austria. She has 3 children and 9 grandchildren.

87-Year-Old Holcaust Survivor Shares her Story with Ms. Magic-Love's Gr. 12 Class





On Wednesday, November 27th, **Helen Yermus** appeared as a special guest of **Thornlea Library's Speaker Series**. **Ms. Magic-Love**'s students were riveted and respectful as the painful details of Helen's story were revealed, one after the other.

Even though she was only 8 years old in 1941 when the Germans invaded her home country of Lithuania, she still struggles with vivid memories of when, in 1944, her six-year-old brother, Abraham, was pulled from her arms by Nazi soldiers during the "Kinder Action" in the Kovno Ghetto. As a 'punishment' for fighting to hold on to Abraham, she was *not* put on the truck with him and the other children. Because of this 'punishment,' she survived this "Kinder Action," but she never saw her little brother again.

Also in 1944, when the Kovno Ghetto was liquidated, Helen was separated from her father, Yitzhak. For years after the end of the war, she searched every face in a crowd, hoping to catch sight of Yitzhak, her best friend and mentor, and the person who had encouraged her to keep a diary, no matter what happened. Yitzhak was murdered in Dachau but this information was only confirmed for Helen a couple of years ago through research done by her Israeli daughter-in-law. Trying to keep her promise to her father, Helen wrote in her diary every day, but it did not survive the war. Helen often contrasts herself with Anne Frank, whose diary *did* survive, but Anne did not. Many years later, Helen's granddaughter, the actress Sara Farb, would play Anne Frank on stage at the Stratford Festival.





When Yitzhak was taken to Dachau, Helen (aged 11) and her mother, Toby, were sent to Stutthof Concentration Camp in Germany. They worked many months as slave labourers, digging ditches and trenches for the German military.

In January of '44, when the Germans knew the war was almost over, they sent most of Stutthof's Jews on a 'Death March.' As a punishment for returning to their tent to get straw to stuff beneath their clothing for warmth, Helen and Toby were left behind at the camp with about 50 other prisoners. The Nazi soldiers ordered these remaining Stutthof prisoners to lie down on the ground in a circle. One at a time and with the same needle, they were injected with a lethal substance. Helen, her mother, and some of the other prisoners, miraculously survived the injection, as the prisoner ordered to administer it (a medical doctor in her former life) was able, surreptitiously, to dilute the poison with water.

After they were liberated by the Russians, Helen and her mother, hungy and ill, spent weeks in a make-shift refugee centre a former school. They bonded closely with another mother and daughter, Mrs. Reuben and her daughter, Rivkah. Due to lack of food and medical attention in the centre and from the townspeople, Rivkah died on the school room floor, Helen lying right beside her. In the *History Channel* documentary, *Cheating Hitler: Surviving the Holocaust*, which premiered on television just a couple of weeks ago, Helen is reunited in her home in Thornhill with Rivkah's brother. You can catch this clip from the documentary on *YouTube*, and it is a moving sight.

Helen and her mother were brought successfully to Canada by family in 1948, after they spent 3 years in DP camps. Helen is married to Aaron Yermus (another survivor) and they have 3 children and 9 grandchildren. Helen has made it her life's work to teach Canadian students about the lessons of the Holocaust and to ensure young people learn the consequences of hatred and prejudice.

- Must be at least 17 years of age. For anyone aged 17-23, please visit https://blood.ca/en/blood/am-i-eliqible/abcs-eliqibility and select Weight to ensure you meet the eligibility requirements. For anyone aged 23 and over, you must be at least 110lbs to donate blood.
- ✓ Any tattoos and/or piercings in the last 3 months? If yes, you must wait 3 months before donating blood
- ✓ Zika Risk: Have you travelled outside of Canada in last 3 weeks? If yes, please refer to https://blood.ca/en/blood/am-i-eliqible/abcs-eliqibility/travel and select "Accepted Countries List". Donors who have travelled to locations outside of Canada, the continental U.S. and Europe must wait 21 days after their return home, before donating blood.
- ✓ Malaria Risk: Have you travelled outside of Canada in last year? If yes, please refer to https://blood.ca/en/blood/am-i-eliqible/abcs-eliqibility/travel and select "Check the Country list here" to determine if you are eliqible to donate blood.
- ✓ Medications: Please review https://blood.ca/en/blood/am-i-eliqible/abcs-eliqibility "medications". If your medication is not listed, please call 1-888-236-6283 to speak with one of our trained health professionals.
- Dental work: If you have had a cleaning or filling, you are eligible to donate the day after your treatment. If you have had an extraction, root canal or dental surgery you are eligible to donate 72 hours after your treatment, if you have fully recovered.




