<u>Co-op News</u> Co-op Students Discovering Employability Skills and Career Directions

This semester's co-op students have been at their placements for eight weeks and already the excitement and benefits of experiential learning have been realized. Their placements cover every sector of the working world ranging from Law, Medical, Media and Marketing, Accounting, Financing, Teaching, Senior Homes, and the Trades.

The following journals are taken from the current Co-op students:

Personal Change

Co-op is a very different experience for me, as I am able to apply all I've learned up until now, at school, as well as outside of school, to my work. After completing my third week at *Paul Zammit Real Estate Ltd.*, I can say that even in this short period of time, I have undergone a few changes. The whole reason that we go to school is to be better educated and eventually put this knowledge to use in the field of work. In a way, you can say that this is the ultimate goal. For years, we go to school and slowly figure out which career path would be best suited to us, then we work toward that goal. Co-op is great, as it allows students to do a sort of trial run. Students can work in the field they are considering pursuing in the future to see whether or

not they are actually suited for that kind of work. After all, your career is the ultimate goal, and goals are supposed to be achievable. That is one of my changes. I've realized that the career I want to pursue in the future is achievable. Before starting Co-op, I'd always thought of my future career like more of a dream than a goal. Another thing that's changed is my perception of the working field. In school, we always discussed the working fields, but being at school, we'd never really gotten a good idea of what it would really be like to work. Inevitably, with only my own imagination as reference, expectations were made for



my choice career. During the past few weeks, not only have I learned about the marketing field, but I have also changed the way I think about careers and working. I have more realistic goals and expectations for the future, and I am now able to work more efficiently to achieve them.

I think that if I walk away with one thing during my co-op experience, it is that I want to pursue a career in the financial sector. Knowing this, I have been looking for opportunities to gain new experiences with every chance I get. I am currently taking an Accounting course at Thornlea; this should help me gain valuable insight into the world of finances. I am also currently looking for a summer/ part time job as a bookkeeper. I also have recently been looking into business programs at various universities. Overall co-op is proving to be a very valuable experience. Personal Change

Doing co-op for the past few months has changed me as a person. I have learned how to be more patient, I have learned how to look at things with "different eyes". Being put in this teaching position has made me grow as a person. When at Johnsview Village Public School I learned how to think and be creative on the spot. I learned how to deal with conflict. There were times

when the teacher and I had to accommodate and needed to think of activities on the spot. There were times when my supervisor had me deal with conflict between two students so I could learn about different parts of being a teacher. I needed to learn how to be patient because there are times when students won't know what to do, when students don't understand and as the teacher you have to be patient and help them through it. The most important thing that I believe I learned is how to look at things from different perspectives. When teaching I needed to accommodate different learning styles. I

needed to teach in a way that would benefit the students. There were times when I had to find a way to look at material in the way one of the students would so teaching it could be more efficient. I think that being able to look at certain things with a different perspective is something that I'll be using for the rest of my life, in any job or work that I do. I loved going to work every day and I loved learning and growing as a person. I loved teaching and the experience was phenomenal.

What experiences am I gaining from my placement?

For the past month of working here at CYR Funding, I feel like I have gained a great amount of skills and experiences. For example, I feel like my work habits have changed and improved. At

work, we are expected to work fast and get things done so we can move on to the next task. I think that this work habit from my co-op placement will carry over to school because it is better to finish the assignments and not leave it for the last minute. Another thing that I have experienced at my placement is gaining confidence to answer phones and call clients. I think this is important because I realized that talking to people through the phone is probably one of the most effective ways to contact the person aside from e-mails and actually talking to them in person. Calling through the phone requires you



to speak with confidence as well as knowing what to say to the person. I think I have learned from my mistakes and now I am able to answer phones with little to none errors. My attitude towards work has also changed from the experience from this placement. When my supervisor or someone else from the office asks me to do something, you can't just say no and hand it off to someone else. I have learned to accept the work because it will help me in the long run. Overall this placement has benefitted me and I think that there will be even more of an improvement as this program continues.

The Post-Secondary Institutions (Universities and Colleges) visits have come to an end. We would like to thank our presenters and our students for attending these seminars and asking great questions

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) Pin Codes have arrived!! 135 graduating students have already picked up their envelope with their Pin Code and are on their way to applying to University. If a student has not picked up their code, they should come to the Guidance office immediately.

Guidance will also be offering a College Application workshop on <u>December 15 &16th at 11:40</u> in the Upper Computer Lab. There is a signup sheet in the guidance office. No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own with their Ontario Education Number (OEN) at <u>www.ontariocolleges.ca</u> - Students can apply today!

The Deadline for your University Application is January 13, 2016 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OUAC University grades transmission is scheduled for February 11th, 2016.

The "Equal Consideration" Deadline for your College Application is February1st, 2016 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OCAS College grades transmission is scheduled for February 12th, 2016.

We would also like to remind students that there is a process in place for Community Service Hours (CSH). All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for a CSH sheet and pre-approval. *A reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours by Friday January 29th, 2016. Before the OUAC transmission.*

If students are planning on making a request for a timetable change for 2nd semester, they should make an appointment with their counselor ASAP.

101 Fees

All fees are non-refundable. Your application will not be forwarded to your university choice(s) until you submit full payment to the OUAC. Fees for withdrawn university choices are not refunded.

Summary of Fees

All fees are listed in Canadian dollars. These fees are for fall entry 2016.

Base Application Fee: \$150 For the initial 3 university/program choices.

International Service Fee: \$10 If the mailing address is outside of Canada.

Additional Choice Fee: \$50/choice For each university/program choice beyond the initial 3 (e.g., if 2 additional university choices are added, you must pay \$100 in addition to the base application fee).

Note: You may apply to as many Ontario universities/programs as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any one university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.

Methods of Payment

Payment for online applications is accepted by:

- Credit card (VISA, MasterCard or American Express). Prepaid credit cards and VISA debit cards are not accepted.
- Online banking (Canadian banks and credit unions only). Normally takes 1-3 business days.

All payments must be made in Canadian funds. For more information, visit <u>Methods of Payment</u>.

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101 Important Dates

These are important dates in your application process. Please check them carefully and keep them in mind as you apply.

2015

Late August 2015

The eINFO site goes live. Visit the eINFO website to start your research.

September 25-27, 2015

All 21 Ontario universities are in one place at the <u>Ontario Universities</u>? Fair (OUF). Just for you! Faculty, academics and knowledgeable representatives are ready to answer your questions.

October - November 2015

Gather information about Ontario's 21 universities at the <u>University Information Program (UIP)</u>. The UIP travels across Ontario after the OUF, offering fair- or presentation-style events in most Ontario regions.

By the end of November 2015

You will receive your Application Access Code Letter from your guidance counsellor with your school number, student number and temporary PIN. Keep this letter for your records. You will need this information to apply.

2016

January 13, 2016 Deadline to submit your completed application to the OUAC.

Note: The OUAC still processes applications received after this date and distributes them to the universities. However, specific university deadlines will apply.

The initial application includes all final grades from completed Grade 11 and 12 courses and a list of all currentyear courses in progress.

January 21, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all application data and grades from the OUAC for all applications submitted by January 13, 2016.

February 5, 2016

Recommended last date for you to submit all information to the OUAC to be considered for early admission. This information includes university and program changes and additional active choices.

Note: This is not a deadline. The OUAC accepts and processes changes at any time.

March 2, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all final first-semester and current full-year grades for 4U/M courses from the OUAC.

May 5, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive second-semester midterm and interim grades for full-year courses from the OUAC. Grades that the OUAC receives earlier will be sent to Ontario universities when received.

May 27, 2016

9/23/2015

The latest date by which you can expect a response from an Ontario university. This includes:

- an offer of admission;
- a refusal; or
- a deferral, pending the receipt of specific information.

June 1, 2016

The earliest date you may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment (e.g., registration deposit, residence deposit, etc.).

All other admissions-related elements, including scholarships, other forms of student assistance or financial incentives, and offers of residence are considered part of the offer of admission. Therefore, you may accept these other offers prior to June 1, 2015, but Ontario universities will not compel a student in any way to make a decision earlier.

July 14, 2016

Target date for the OUAC to transmit all remaining final grades to the universities.

Early June to August 2016

The Admission Information Service (AIS) allows you to determine which Ontario universities still have spots available in first-year undergraduate programs.

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FALL 2016 - IMPORTANT DATES APPLY

Early October, 2015

The online application is available at ontariocolleges.ca.

November 23, 2015

First date that 2016 / 2017 application data is sent to the colleges. This is also the earliest date that colleges may notify applicants that their application has been received.

February 1, 2016

The deadline for applying to highly competitive programs. Applications received and paid for before this date will be given equal consideration by the colleges.

NOTE: Applicants for all programs are encouraged to apply before this date, as website volumes are highest at this time.

OFFER

February 1, 2016

Earliest date the colleges may release offers to applicants. Offers will continue to be issued until programs are filled or waitlists are established.

NOTE: Applicants who have not met admission requirements for a program may be notified at any time during the application process.

ACCEPT

February 1, 2016

Earliest date that applicants may confirm an offer of admission.

May 1, 2016

The most common deadline for continning offers of admission but not the only one. Applicants should check their offers of admission for exact deadline dates.

June 15, 2016

Earliest date that colleges may require payment of tuition fees.

DATA TRANSMISSION SCHEDULE

Data files from school boards and 7 or high schools are due at OCAS on the following dates:

October 5 - 9, 2015

Demographics, marks history, and current and projected registrations are due. OCAS requires marks history for all courses taken in grades 9, 10 and 11.

November 20 - 25, 2015

First semester midterm marks are due. Schools may transmit interim marks for full-year courses as soon as they are available.

February 12, 2016

For semestered schools: First semester final marks and currently enrolled second semester courses are due. For non-semestered schools: Interim marks are due.

April 25 - 29, 2016

For semestered schools: Second semester midtern marks are due. For non-semestered schools: Interim marks are due.

July 8, 2016

For semestered schools: Second semester final marks and proof of graduation are due. For non-semestered schools: Final marks and proof of graduation are due.

August 19, 2016

For somestered schools: Second semester final marks (and / or summer school final marks) and proof of graduation are due. For non-semestered schools: Final marks (and / or summer school final marks) and proof of graduation are que.
