University Applications:

You can select as many University programs as you would like (\$50.00 each), but, you can only choose a **maximum of 3 programs** per University. For example: Only 3 choices can be used for all University of Toronto campuses, for example (St. George, Scarborough, Mississauga) can have one program each <u>or</u> all 3 at Scarborough or any combination adding up to 3.

Waterloo University, you could only select a maximum of 3 programs. If you wanted to add a 4th you cannot.

If you need clarification on this process or have questions, please do not hesitate to ask your child's counselor. Deadline for <u>equal consideration is Jan. 13th 2022.</u>

Week 4: Be mindful of your online presence and digital footprint

It's important to manage your online presence and digital footprint!

This past year, kids have faced unique challenges, as many of their in-person activities <u>have been replaced</u> with an increased use of technology. This has resulted in an unprecedented increased online presence and digital footprint for most <u>of us, adults, and kids alike</u>,

Everyone should assume that what is shared online will remain online forever. Every action you take online, and information posted about you contributes to your "digital footprint" which can straddle our personal, student and professional lives. Improving our awareness of the traces of data we leave online and recognizing how our individual digital footprints vary can help to improve the protection of our data online.

Topics and tips for Week 4 include:

Access the embedded links to find out more (links will take you to different websites):

- Understand what you post shapes your <u>online reputation</u> and becomes part of your <u>digital footprint</u>.
 Always strive to <u>establish a positive presence online</u>.
- Minimize the risk of being a target of online harassment. <u>Avoid sharing too much information</u> online and <u>be safe on social media</u>.
- Know that posts are <u>not always private</u>.
- Delete accounts (and associated information) that you no longer need old accounts and data can be a risk.
- Navigate safely. Take the <u>quick self-assessment on Internet Safety</u>.



Biography:

Nate Leipciger was born in Chorzow, Poland, in 1928. He immigrated to Toronto in 1948, where he eventually obtained a university degree in engineering. Nate was a member of the International Council of the Auschwitz-Birkenau Museum for fifteen years and has been an educator on the March of the Living for nineteen years. Nate lives in Toronto with his wife Bernice, their children, many grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. Nate is the author of the memoir, *The Weight of Freedom*.



Book Synopsis:

Nate Leipciger, a thoughtful, shy eleven-year-old boy, is plunged into an incomprehensible web of ghettos, concentration and death camps during the German occupation of Poland. Demonstrating incredible strength of character as he struggles to survive, he forges a new, unbreakable bond with his father and yearns for a free future. With memories that remain etched in tragedy and pain even as he looks optimistically to the future, Nate builds a new life in Canada. Introspective and raw, yet ever hopeful, *The Weight of Freedom* is Nate's vivid journey through a past that can never be left behind.

The York Region District School Board is hosting a series of professional development

We live in a time where Jews are facing a sharp rise in antisemitism. This intensifying hate is a profound risk to the Jewish community and to all oppressed and marginalized communities.

Jewish Canadians are the most targeted religious group for hate crimes in the country (Statistics Canada). In York Region, the Jewish community was the victim of 79% of reported hate crimes motivated by religion, and more than 18% of hate crimes overall.

Building on the pillars of the Director's Action Plan, this session is an opportunity for all YRDSB staff to explore antisemitism from its roots to its present incarnation, and to discover ways to become allies in countering the world's oldest form of discrimination.
