Dear Thornlea Families,

I want to make you aware of a couple of upcoming events. This Monday is a Professional Activity Day and the school will be closed on that day, reopening on Tuesday November 16th. On Monday night, our School Council will meet virtually. There will be a presentation on scholarships from a former university admissions officer. A link to the school council presentation is enclosed in the bulletin. This Thursday will be the Ontario Literacy test. Writing the test will be our current grade 11 students and non-graduating grade 12 students. In the spring, our grade 10 students will have their opportunity to write the test.

Last week we send home a letter announcing that basketball for Jr. and Sr. boys and girls will take place during the winter season. In addition, there will also be girls' volleyball, coed curling and boy's and girl's skiing and snowboarding. There have been many students trying out for our teams and it is nice to see so many activities taking place at school this semester. We would like to congratulate the SR. boys' soccer team for a strong season. They made it all the way to the Tier 1 quarterfinals of the YRAA.

For the past three weeks, Thornlea has welcomed about thirty Afghan refugees to our school. I would like to thank our students who went out of their way to welcome them to our school, show them around, and explain how a Canadian High School operates. The group has been moved to Toronto and we wish them the best as they learn about our country and education system.

In the newsletter, you will see a detailed explanation on how to change their learning model. Those students wishing to move to remote learning may do so after our mid-semester reporting is complete. If you have any questions or concerns about this please feel free to reach out to me at any time.

Finally, I would like to thank the Head of our History department, Laura Ceausu, and her group of student volunteers who put together our virtual Remembrance Day presentation. Hopefully this will be the last year that we are required to do our presentation in a virtual format. I wish everyone a safe and relaxing weekend.

Grade 12's have now received their special OUAC access code/pin on Friday October 22nd it was sent to their school email Gapps account, along with their OEN for Ontario College applications.

Full Disclosure for Grade 11 and Grade 12 Courses For 2021/2022, the course withdrawal date (Full Disclosure) will be 5 instructional days after the midsemester report is issued. The Full Disclosure date for Grade 11 and <u>Grade 12</u> <u>courses is December 6, 2021</u>. If a student withdraws from a Grade 11 or 12 course prior to December 6, 2021, then the course will not be recorded on the Ontario Student transcript. If a student withdraws from a Grade 11 or 12 course after the Full Disclosure date, a withdrawal (W) is entered in the credit column, and the student's mark at the time of withdrawal will be recorded as a percentage in the achievement column of the transcript.

For Scholarship information for grade 12 graduating students, please check the Scholarship section for updates on the grade 12 Guidance GoogleClassroom.

The next transmission to the Ontario Universities Application Centre (OUAC) will be on **Nov. 19th, 2021**.

The next transmission to the Ontario College Application Services (OCAS) will be on **Nov. 19th, 2021**.

University Applications:

You can select as many University programs as you would like (\$50.00 each), but, you can only choose a **maximum of 3 programs** per University. For example:

Only 3 choices can be used for all University of Toronto campuses, for example (St. George, Scarborough, Mississauga) can have one program each <u>or</u> all 3 at Scarborough or any combination adding up to 3.

Waterloo University, you could only select a maximum of 3 programs. If you wanted to add a 4^{th} you cannot.

If you need clarification on this process or have questions, please do not hesitate to ask your child's counselor. Deadline for <u>equal consideration is Jan. 13th 2022.</u>

Ontario College Application Seminar:

You can apply to an Ontario College today! Deadline for <u>equal consideration is</u> <u>Feb. 1st 2022</u>. <u>www.ontariocolleges.ca</u>

Please see your counselor for support with your Ontario College Application.

If students are planning on making a request for a timetable change for 2^{nd} semester, they should contact their counselor.

Community Service Hours

We would also like to remind our learning community that there is a process in place for Community Service Hours. All graduating students must complete 20 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. It should be at a Not-For-Profit organization.

Learning Model Changes

In September, we shared that we would provide families further information to support switching between in-person and remote learning models prior to mid-semester.

Students learning remotely may request to return to face-to-face learning by contacting the school. Changes will be facilitated within 1-2 days. Transportation may require additional time to initiate.

Requests may also be made to move from in-person learning to remote learning. Please contact the school to request a switch to remote learning. Staff from the school will make arrangements to contact you to review the request and share information about the hybrid learning model.

• Learning model changes for students affected by COVID-19 will be facilitated within 2-3 school days.

• Model change requests will be facilitated as soon as possible and prior to mid-semester reporting.

After mid-semester reporting, students and families may request a short-term COVID-19 related model change or a long-term model change for other circumstances by contacting the school.




Pre-AP and AP Art Portfolio Workshops for Grade 11-12 students

Award-Winning Author, June Hur, Visits Grade 9 English Class

Ms. Kim's Grade Nine English class just finished reading June Hur's stunning novel, *The Silence of Bones*, and were so lucky to have a Virtual visit by the author this month.

June spoke about her journey of becoming a writer of Korean historical fiction and her ten year journey of rejections that finally led to her first novel, *The Silence of Bones*, being published.

June shared her writing process, the daily life of a writer, and how to become a published writer. She also went on to explain exactly how an author earns a living.



Students asked a lot of questions about the decisions she made in the novel -- how she came up with the characters, plot, and why she made certain choices.

June also talked about her two upcoming novels soon to be published -- students asked if they could get early access to them. She said she would think about it!


Scotiabank Giller Prize Guess-the-Winner Contest Winners!



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


Tune In YRDSB: Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program

We live in a time where Jews are facing a sharp rise in antisemitism. This intensifying hate is a profound risk to the Jewish community and to all oppressed and marginalized communities.

Jewish Canadians are the most targeted religious group for hate crimes in the country (Statistics Canada). In York Region, the Jewish community was the victim of 79% of reported hate crimes motivated by religion, and more than 18% of hate crimes overall.

Building on the pillars of the Director's Action Plan, this session is an opportunity for all YRDSB staff to explore antisemitism from its roots to its present incarnation, and to discover ways to become allies in countering the world's oldest form of discrimination.


Simply make a drawing and wait until the next day to see the smiles on everyone's face as they enter the building. It is very easy to organize. Just spread the word and watch the miracle happen!

Supporting New Families with a Family Ambassador Program

To do that, you will need to create a database to connect volunteers with new families and support the process.

Steps to creating a Family Ambassador Program

- Set up two ocoure forms tone for Annuassauors and one for the new families seeking support)
- Have a volunteer maintain a database of people and connect them to one another
- Include information about the program in the school information package, and promote it in your school newsletters
- Seek feedback on what is working and what is not, and adjust the program accordingly

Fundraising During a Pandemic

Many schools engage in fundraising as a way to help enhance their students' academic experience. Fundraising during a pandemic may require some creative thinking, but it is still a fun and potentially profitable way to engage your school community. Here are some tips, ideas and guidelines to help you with your efforts.

Guidelines and tips...

- At this time, lunch programs are not permitted.
- If you are selling packaged goods, find vendors who can deliver the product directly to the consumer's home through the mail or a courier company.
- Remember that Public Health safety guidelines must be followed when planning and hosting a fundraiser or event.
- Guidelines to inform the school's fundraising plan and activities can be found in the YRDSB Policy and Procedure #676, <u>School Fundraising and</u> <u>Administration of School Generated Funds</u>
