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MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Families and Community Members:

Despite all the recent snow, spring is on its way. One of the signs of spring is the annual literacy test which is a graduation requirement for our students. The test will take place on March 31st beginning at 8:50 a.m. On that day only students writing the test will attend school in the morning; all other students will start class at 12:30 p.m. The one exception is for those students in our special education community classes who will arrive at school during their regular time. To help support students there are a number of activities taking place. We have whole school activities and after school literacy classes set up to support our students. For further information on the test and supports for the test please contact our literacy teacher Ms. Anderson.

We would also like to acknowledge the great job that our students did last semester. We had over 420 out of 740 students receive an average of over 80% and appear on the honour roll. We also had 120 students with an average of 90% or better who appeared on the Principal's List. Congratulations to our students and staff for their dedication and hard work. Last Thursday we held subject awards assembly for students in grade nine to eleven. Thank you to the many parents and guardians who came to join us on the day to honour individual excellence. Grade twelve subject awards will take place in June during our graduation ceremony. Last Thursday an old Thornlea tradition returned to our school. Our student council staged a talent show to benefit 360 Kids, an organization that supports homeless youth. SWE (some wonderful entertainment) raised \$400 for 360 Kids. Thanks to our student council president Syvanne Avitzur for organizing the evening.

We would like to acknowledge the great season that our Sr. Boys Basketball team had. The team lost in the YRAA Tier one final to Vaughan by two points. It was a thrilling final played before a packed house. The Sr. Girls Volleyball team also had a great season winning a number of tournaments and qualifying for the playoffs. The team just missed making the YRAA finals. A number of spring sports have started practicing indoors prior to the arrival of spring. Rugby for boys and girls has started and Boys baseball is also underway. For more information on spring sports please contact Ms. Dawe in the Physical Education department.

Finally, I would like to thank our Vice-Principal John Sebastiano for the great job that he did at Thornlea. He will be moving to Maple H.S. after March Break to take over as Principal. A warm Thornlea welcome is extended to our new Vice-Principal Barbara Caravella.

Dear Parents/Guardians:

RE: Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test – Modified School Day
Thursday, March 31, 2016

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) has scheduled **Thursday, March 31, 2016** as the day for students across the province to complete the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT). To assist in creating the best environment possible for the students writing the test, the Board has agreed to a modified school day structure for the day in which the OSSLT will be written. This practice is very similar to that followed by other GTA school boards.

Thornlea Secondary School has a regular start time of 8:50 am. This year, students writing the test will come to school as per their normal start time and complete the test. Students **not** writing the OSSLT would be asked to commence their school day approximately **three and a half hours later**, i.e. **12:30 pm**, to coincide with the conclusion of the OSSLT on Thursday, March 31, 2016. Students requiring accommodation will continue to write their test during an extended test-taking period. School will finish for all students at the normal time.

Please note students in Self-Contained Special Education Classes (Developmentally Delayed, Autistic, Orthopaedic, Section 23, Intensive Support, and Acquired Brain Injury) and Elementary Music will follow their normal schedule.

Student Transportation Services has been advised of these arrangements and will adjust bus schedules as follows:

- Students who are eligible for school bus transportation and are writing the OSSLT, will be picked up in the morning at their regular service time.
 - Students who are eligible for transportation and are not writing the OSSLT test will be picked up 3 ½ hours later than their regular service time.
- All students will be transported home at regular service times.

We anticipate that student achievement will be enhanced by this modification since the entire school staff will be available to administer the test and supervise students; ample classroom space will be available, eliminating the need to write in specialty rooms; and sufficient technology will be available to support students receiving accommodation. In addition, a calmer student environment during the OSSLT designated writing time will result as only students writing the test will be in school.

We wish every student success on the OSSLT.

I would like to thank the York Region District School Board and my Principal, Joe Foti, for supporting this Health and Wellness initiative. It was a privilege to promote activity while sharing the sport I love with those around me.

More than 400 students from the York Region District School Board, representing 48 elementary schools, participated in the Jr. NBA Clinic on February 5th led by current and former NBA, WNBA and NBA Development League players.

The event at Ricoh Coliseum was part of the NBA All-Star Weekend activities taking place in Toronto and the clinic attracted 2,500 students from across the Greater Toronto Area.

When Nizam Alkins played basketball at the YMCA, when he was around eight years old, he recalled his father gave him some words of encouragement, saying he would some day get an opportunity to be in a NBA All-Star Game. How prophetic those words turned out.

Alkins, who currently teaches and coaches the junior boys' basketball team at Thornlea Secondary School, was involved in this year's NBA annual extravaganza in Toronto.

While Alkins will not be on the Air Canada Centre hardwood court with the likes of LeBron James or Kobe Bryant, he was on the floor in one of the auxillary events to be held at the Enercare Centre. Along with fellow Thornlea Secondary School teachers and senior boys basketball coaches Shane James and Mo Saleh, the trio were among 40 coaches selected to take part in the Junior NBA Day.

"We want to promote basketball and junior development of the game," Alkins said. "It's like a basketball field trip for the kids."

In looking ahead to his participation in this event, Alkins feels honoured.

"For me, it's a highlight. An event like this (NBA All-Star Game) doesn't come to Toronto that often and it might not even return in my lifetime. It should be an exciting weekend in Toronto," he said. On Jr. NBA Day, We had Matt Bonner! I got to work with him. I had 2 assistants, a student/athlete from Seneca College and one from Mohawk College Mens' Basketball Team. St Paul catholic elementary school (43 students grades 4/5) from Newmarket. 5 teachers from that school in the photo chaperoned. We had an amazing time and Matt signed every kids Jr NBA T-shirt. He also gave away a signed autographed basketball. Matt Bonner was amazing , first class, talk about giving back...he is the man! There were over 2500 students in the building that day at the Enercare Centre. Gr. 11 Thornlea student Daraja Williams met and spoke with the 2015 Booker Prize-winning author Marlon James on February 18th at the Bram & Bluma Appel Salon at the Toronto Reference Library. Daraja won 2 tickets to go see the famous author after participating successfully in our school's Black History Knowledge Quiz.



Daraja was an audience member in the theatre while the now world-famous author of the novel *A Brief History of Seven Killings*, Marlon James, was interviewed by TIFF artistic director, Cameron Bailey.

Despite the fact that *A Brief History* is NOT a brief book, Daraja was surprised to learn that James' original manuscript was even longer than the final version, and that James' publisher convinced him to remove an entire chapter before publication. After that, the only thing James would agree to was a reduction of font size!

So that he could get our Library's copy of *A Brief History* signed and dedicated to the students of Thornlea Secondary School, Daraja waited in

line patiently for over one hour after the interview in order to meet Marlon James. Daraja also purchased a signed copy of the book for himself!

James' ambitious novel is almost 800 pages long, and is a fictitious account (written from multiple points of view and styles, including Jamaican patois) of the attempted assassination in the 1970s of singer Bob Marley in Kingston, Jamaica.



Daraja was also surprised to see that the audience was very multicultural. Daraja expected the live interview would draw mostly Torontonians of Jamaican heritage, but now realizes that **the great thing about reading** is that it reaches across race, nationality, and culture to attract *all* people who want to feel more connected to the wider world.









Hello all from the Guidance Department! Our team has been busy with providing our students with their course request for next year. Please make sure your child has submitted a signed course selection form to their Home-room Teacher or the Guidance Department. A Course Selection Verification Sheet will be distributed after the March Break, at that time students can request a change on this sheet.

A reminder that the Guidance Team this year consists of Mr. Paul Stephenson (Counselor/Student Success), Ms. Andrea Tse (Counselor & Head of ESL), Ms. Joan Walker (Counselor & SHSM Coordinator), Mr. Nizam Alkins, Head of Guidance (Counselor) and Ms. Gail Burdett (Guidance Secretary).

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) deadline has now passed. Currently 130 Thornlea students have applied. We wish them all the best and will continue to answer their questions on the University selection process. The next marks transmission for OUAC will be on April 28th.

Guidance will continue to monitor and support the College application process. Currently, 42 Thornlea students have applied. No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own on-line at www.ontariocolleges.ca. Please note that the "equal consideration" deadline has passed (Feb. 1st), but students can still apply. The next marks transmission for OCAS will be on April 25th.

As for Scholarship information, please make an appointment to see Mr. Stephenson in the Guidance office.

Important Notice for all grade 12's that have applied to OUAC for university! Your grades from semester one have been processed by OUAC and sent to the Universities to which you have applied. Please log on to your online application in order to review your academic information. This verification is especially important if OUAC does not have a valid email address on file, or you are not able to receive emails from OUAC/your Universities because of a junk-mail setting with you inbox. If you see an error in your OUAC file, it is very important that you contact your Guidance Counsellor as soon as possible to have it corrected.

College and University Spring Open Houses are a popular way for prospective students to visit various Post-Secondary Institutions and evaluate them prior to applying and/or choosing. It is never too early to begin the search. The Guidance Department encourages all students, especially in grades 11 and 12 to attend the open house program of any potential future University/College. Please visit the University/College website to confirm Open House schedules during March Break. Spaces can be limited. We also would like to remind students of the process for making guidance appointments. If any student would like to make an appointment with their "Alpha/Program" identified counselor, they should come to the Guidance Office before school starts (8:30 to 8:55), during their lunch, or after school (3:00 to 3:30).

We would also like to remind students that there is a new process in place for Community Service Hours (CSH). All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for a CSH sheet and pre-approval. **Finally, a reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours as soon as possible before the next OUAC transmission.** For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our "**Volunteer Bulletin Board**" for current opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education requirement.
