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MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRINCIPAL

On May 3rd, grade 12 students celebrated Prom at Madsen Greenhouse Banquet and Chapel in Newmarket. Although it was a cool and rainy evening, everyone had an enjoyable time in the beautiful venue. The evening was filled with yummy food, catchy tunes, and a lot of dancing. The next event for our grade 12 students will be taking place on June 28th as we look forward to celebrate their graduation ceremony at Paradise Banquet Hall.

Athletic teams have been finishing the season off on a high note. On May 29th, students in the special education program attended the Annual Secondary SNAP Track & Field Meet at Bill Crothers Secondary School. The Coed Volleyball team had a great season for 2018. With 17 players playing on two teams, this year was the biggest turnout ever for coed volleyball. The teams participated in five tournaments, taking silver in the prestigious Vaughan SS event as a season highlight. With all players but one returning, next season looks very promising. Way to go Thunder! The boys rugby team finished 2nd in Tier Two West in regular season. The girls rugby team finished their season as the Tier Two Pool C Consolation Champions. With only one player graduating this year, and much of our team consisting of Grade 9's, our team will be very strong in years to come!

On May 9th and 11th, Theatre 219 had evening performances for the Theatre for Young audiences. With different shows both nights, audiences in attendance enjoyed the totally family friendly plays performed by Thornlea students. There was a lot of enjoyment and laughter had by all. Between May 10th-18th, 21 students under the supervision of Mme Pilaram and vice-principal Mr. Hu went on an adventure to France. They spent four days discovering the best of Paris including the Eiffel Tower, Musée d'Orsay, Montmartre, the Louvre, Notre-Dame Cathedral, and Versailles. They then traveled to the south of France visiting the beautiful towns of Nice, Cannes, Antibes, Èze, and the principality of Monaco.

Students enrolled in the Recreation and Healthy Active Living Leadership course had the opportunity to participate on a canoe trip in Algonquin Park, Ontario. This year's 'Outdoor Ed' class travelled to Algonquin Park on May 14th, starting on Smoke Lake and paddling south. As the culminating activity of the course, students paddled and portaged through a series of lakes and rivers, camping each night on a different lake along the way. Team building and leadership skills were demonstrated by everyone along with paddling, portaging, and camp craft skills. After five days and four nights the canoe trip concluded at Cache Lake.  Re: Semester Examination Schedule for June 2018

Thornlea students will write their semester examinations at the end of June. Our exam schedule is on the back of this page. All exams are written at 10:00 a.m. from Wednesday June 20th to Monday June 25th 2018. Please review the examination rules below, and determine the days on which your examinations are scheduled.

York Region District School Board Examination Rules

Examination Schedule:

All students must write their examinations at the scheduled time. **Vacation, employment and/or appointments must not be scheduled during the examination period. Students must be available throughout the exam schedule in the unforeseen event that any exams need to be rescheduled.**

It is the responsibility of each student to confirm the scheduled examination time, date, and location.

If a student has a valid medical certificate detailing why he/she was unable to write the final examination on the assigned day, the school's administration will address the situation on a case by case basis.

Should any exam day be cancelled, all evaluations of that day will be re-scheduled during the exam period. In such an event, check the website to learn when postponed exams will be written.

On the day of the examination:

1. Bring any remaining course textbooks to your examination to return to your teacher.
2. Arrive at the assigned examination room by 9:50 a.m.
3. Textbooks to be returned to the teacher should be placed on the floor beside your desk and specific devices that a teacher has instructed you to bring beyond the pen, pencil and eraser normally required.

During the examination:

1. You must not talk or communicate with any student in the evaluation room once the evaluation has begun.
2. You must remain in the evaluation room for one full hour and you may not leave during the last fifteen minutes of the evaluation time.
3. No items may be borrowed/shared during an exam.
4. Any student cheating on an evaluation or trying to pass information to another student will have their test paper immediately confiscated by the teacher and will be referred to administration who will determine the grade received on a case by case basis.

After the examination:

1. Vacate the building as soon as your examination is completed. There is no cafeteria service during this time and teachers are occupied marking.
2. Exam Review Day is on June 27th from 8:55-11:30 am. Please see below for the schedule.

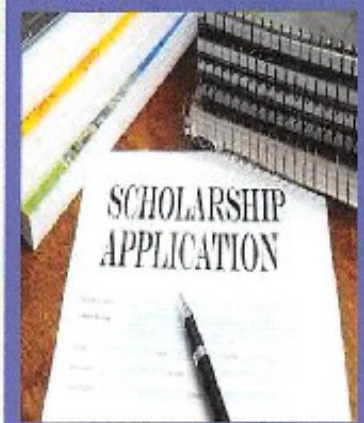

SCHOLARSHIP INFORMATION SHEET

**IT'S *NEVER TOO EARLY* TO
PLAN AHEAD**

An Automatic Entrance Scholarship is based on a student's marks. A student is automatically considered for these scholarships upon his/her application to the university/college.

A Direct Application Scholarship is open to student who meets the eligibility requirements. An application is completed on-line or sent in by registered mail.

A School Nominated Scholarship is screened at the school level. With these scholarships, Taomles S.S. is limited in the number of applicants it can forward.

RESEARCH EARLY TO MEET ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

REASON #1

Many scholarship applications can be lengthy and take time to complete.

So, when a student begins preparing his/her application early it can help make the process smoother and less stressful in Grade 12.

REASON #2

Scholarship recipients need to demonstrate academic excellence.

Each scholarship will specify the minimum average.

REASON #3

Scholarship recipients need to demonstrate leadership qualities by:

- participating in clubs/sports in school
- volunteering regularly at an organization or two

WHAT CAN A STUDENT DO NOW TO BEGIN HIS/HER SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION?

1. Begin volunteering at an organization that interests you. Remember that demonstrating your dedication and commitment is key. In other words, ensure you volunteer at the organization for an extended period of time.
2. Work on developing your leadership skills. You can develop these skills either at your job, activities, and/or volunteer work.
3. Consider the clubs, teams, and committees that you can join at your school.
4. Ensure that you earn good marks. Scholarships may look at both your Grade 11 marks and your Grade 12 marks.
5. Keep a scholarship portfolio that includes the following:
 - Achievements & Accomplishments (both academic & social)
 - Volunteer experiences (list the skills you developed)
 - School participation in clubs, teams, and/or committees (list the skills you developed)
 - Track potential people you can ask to write a recommendation letter

Salutations from the Guidance Department!

Our team has been busy with providing our students with information about the University and the College Application process, scholarship and community involvement hours and SHSM requirements outstanding for our grade 12's.

The Guidance Team this year consists of Ms. Lovleen Rai (ESL Counselor/Literacy Lead), Ms. Viviane Estafanos (French Immersion Counselor/AP Co-ordinator, F.I. Teacher), Ms. Julie Scott (Student Success), Ms. Maria Merecoulias (Student Success for ESL students), Mr. Nizam Alkins, Head of Guidance (Counselor) and Ms. Gail Burdett (Guidance Secretary).

We also would like to remind everyone on the process for making guidance appointments. **First**, please see Mrs. Burdett, our Guidance Secretary. If any student would like to make an appointment with their "area" identified counselor (French Immersion, ESL, Other), they should come to the Guidance Office before school starts (8:30 to 8:45), during their lunch (11:30 to 12:30), or after school (3:00 to 3:30) to make their appointment.

Important Notice for all grade 12's that have applied through OUAC for university!
Your mid-term grades from semester two have been processed by OUAC and sent to the Universities to which you have applied. Please log on to your online application in order to review your academic information. This verification is especially important if OUAC does not have a valid email address on file, or you are not able to receive emails from OUAC/your Universities because of a junk-mail setting with your inbox. If you see an error in your OUAC file, it is very important that you contact your Guidance Counselor as soon as possible to have it corrected.

Important Notice for all grade 12's that have applied through OCAS for college!
Your mid-term grades from semester two have been processed by OCAS and sent to the Colleges to which you have applied. Please log on to your online application in order to review your academic information. This verification is especially important if OCAS does not have a valid email address on file, or you are not able to receive emails from OCAS/your Colleges because of a junk-mail setting with your inbox. If you see an error in your OCAS file, it is very important that you contact your Guidance Counselor as soon as possible to have it corrected.

University Applicants - We highly recommend you accept your offer **before** the deadline of "midnight" **June 1st**. You should have been contacted by **May 29th** if you have been accepted into your program. The next OUAC transmission will be on **July 5th**. The next OCAS transmission will be on **July 6th**.

Graduating students who plan to attend college or university in September should **continue to check their OCAS and OUAC accounts and their email** on a regular basis. College bound students should have received a response from the colleges that they applied to and can expect to receive communication about payment of fees, with mid-June being the earliest that colleges can require payment of tuition fees. University bound students should expect a response from the universities that they have applied to **by May 29th**.

University bound students should verify the deadline for **payment to secure a space in residence (usually June 1st)**.

A reminder that all offers are CONDITIONAL upon the receipt of final grades in July – students should continue to work hard to ensure the required final average.

We would also like to remind our learning community that there is a process in place for Community Service Hours. All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for approval. Your service must be for a Not-For-Profit organization/event.

For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our “**Volunteer Bulletin Board**” for current opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education requirement.

Finally, a reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours as soon as possible. It is highly recommended that this be completed before June 1st, this is the deadline to accept your University Offer.

Registration is open – register on-line in your career cruising account, get your sheet signed by a parent/guardian and hand it in to your guidance counselor asap.

In celebration of Asian/South Asian Heritage Month, Carol Nguyen, a Toronto-based, award winning, 19-year-old, Asian-Canadian filmmaker presented to our students on filmmaking, in the context of social issues. 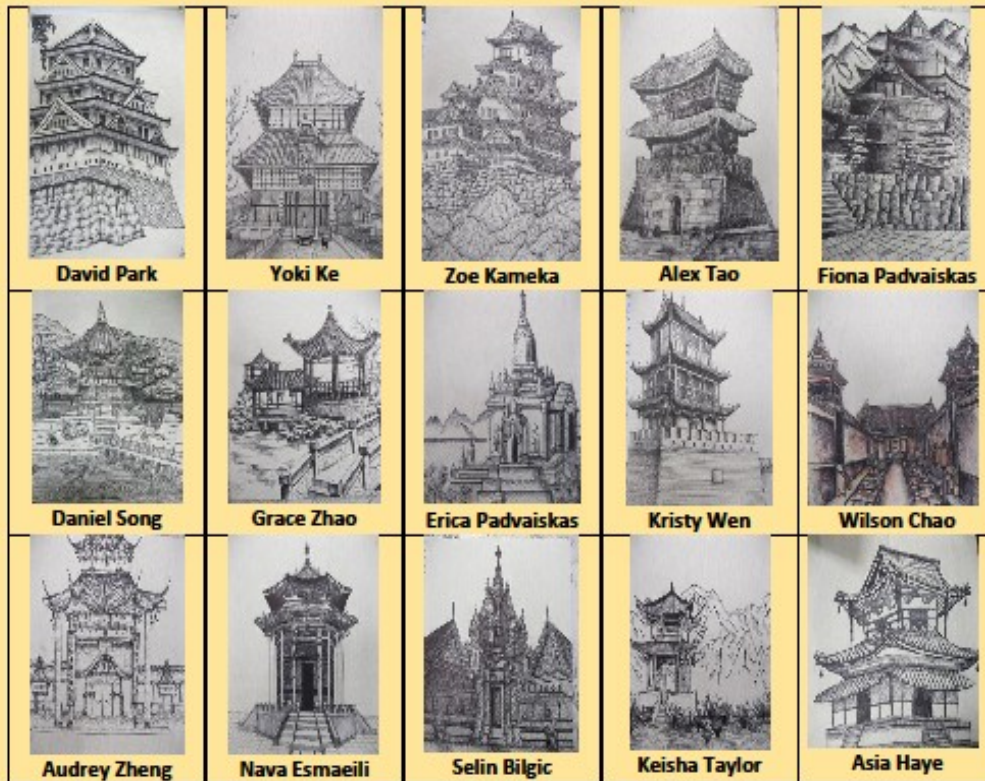


Celebrating Asian Heritage Month at Thornlea

THE McMICHAEL - HIP HOP CULTURE

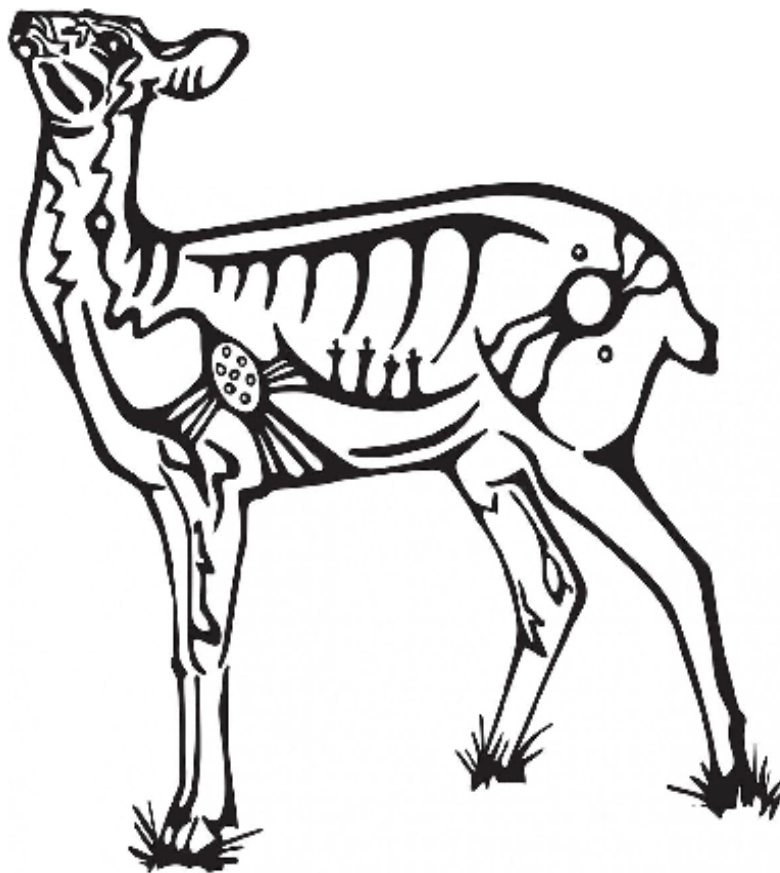
