MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRINCIPAL

Dear Families and Community Members,

Spring is on its way! One of the signs of spring is the annual literacy test which is a graduation requirement for our students. The test will take place on March 30th beginning at 8:50 a.m. On that day **only** students writing the test will attend school in the morning; all other students will start class at 12:30 p.m. The one exception is for those students in our Special Education Community classes who will arrive to school at their regular time.

To help support students prepare for the test, there are a number of activities taking place. We have whole school activities and after school literacy classes set up to support our students. For further information on the test and supports for the test please contact our literacy teacher Ms. Rai.

We would also like to acknowledge the great job that our students did last semester. We had over 471 out of 850 students receive an average of over 80% and appear on the honour roll. We also had 158 students with an average of 90% or better who appeared on the Principal's List. Congratulations to our students and staff for their dedication and hard work. On Wednesday March 22, 2017 we will hold our Subject Awards Assembly for students in grades nine to eleven to celebrate their achievements; grade twelve subject awards will take place in June during our graduation ceremony. We hope to see you there!

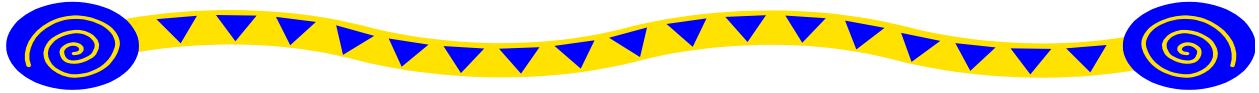

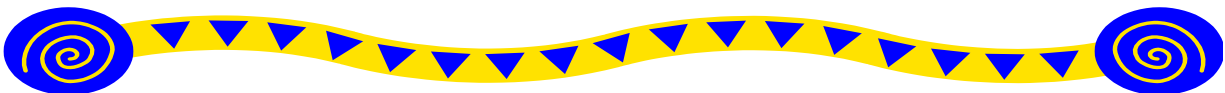

RE: Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test – Modified School Day
Thursday, March 30, 2017

The Education Quality and Accountability Office (EQAO) has scheduled Thursday, March 30, 2017 as the day for students across the province to complete the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT). To assist in creating the best environment possible for the students writing the test, the Board has agreed to a modified school day structure for the day in which the OSSLT will be written. This practice is very similar to that followed by other GTA school boards.

THORNLEA SECONDARY SCHOOL has a regular start time of 8:50 am. This year, students writing the test will come to school as per their normal start time and complete the test. Students not writing the OSSLT will be asked to commence their school day approximately three and a half hours later, at 12:30pm, to coincide with the conclusion of the OSSLT on Thursday, March 30, 2017. Students requiring accommodation will continue to write their test during an extended test taking period. School will finish for all students at the normal time. **Please note, there will be no cafeteria service on this day.**

Please note students in Self-Contained Special Education Classes (Developmentally Delayed, Autistic, Orthopaedic, Section 23, Intensive Support, and Acquired Brain Injury) and Elementary Music will follow their normal schedule.

Student Transportation Services has been advised of these arrangements and will adjust bus schedules as follows:

- Students who are eligible for school bus transportation and are writing the OSSLT, will be picked up in the morning at their regular service time.
- Students who are eligible for transportation and are not writing the OSSLT test will be picked up 3 ½ hours later than their regular service time.
- All students will be transported home at regular service times.

We anticipate that student achievement will be enhanced by this modification since the entire school staff will be available to administer the test and supervise students; ample classroom space will be available, eliminating the need to write in specialty rooms; and sufficient technology will be available to support students receiving accommodation. In addition, a calmer student environment during the OSSLT designated writing time will result as only students writing the test will be in school.

We wish every student success on the OSSLT.

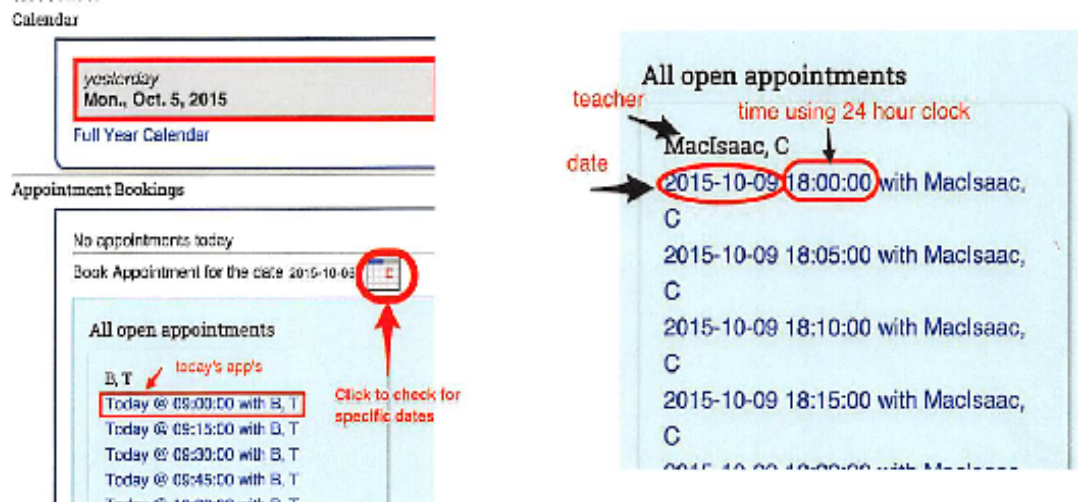

The online tool teachassist has the ability for parents/guardians to book appointments for Parents' Night. You will be able to book your appointments via Teachassist.

To book an Appointment with your classroom teacher who has set up appointment slots with TeachAssist:

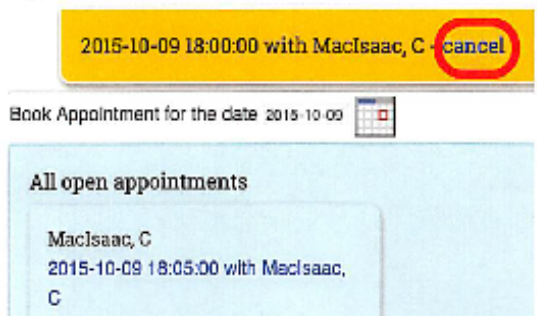
1. Students or parents go to ta.yrdsb.ca . Use student's username (student number) and password to log in to Teachassist.
2. Once logged in scroll to the bottom of the page and if a teacher has created Appointment slots they will be visible on the page.
3. Click on the calendar to select the appropriate date for Parents' Night, For this Semester it is on **Thursday, April 6, 2017.**



4. Click on the time you would like to select. Please note that teachassist uses a 24 hour clock, and appointment times are 10 minutes in length.
5. A confirmation of your appointment time and date will appear on your screen. You can change or cancel your appointment at any time, depending on the teacher's availability.
6. It is recommended to allow travel time between appointments in order to reach the next classroom.

These are just some of the items you would see displayed on an Iranian Nowruz table or *Haft-sin*: goldfish (life, the sign of Pisces), hyacinth (the beginning of Spring), garlic (medicine/health), apples (beauty), sprouts *sabzeh* (rebirth), coins (prosperity), wheat germ pudding *samanu* (affluence/sweetness), sumac (the colour of sunrise), vinegar (age and patience) and others.

Syrian Refugee Visits Thornlea SS Library

Thornlea Amnesty International Book Club, founded in 2016, is a club that reads books and then plans events related to the books' central themes. Their most recent novel, Chris Cleave's *Little Bee*, focuses on a Nigerian refugee's experiences as she flees her country and the struggles she faces after landing in Britain. Inspired by this novel and by the conflict in Syria, the Book Club decided to invite a Syrian refugee to Thornlea to speak about his experiences.

On February 28th, students from three classes each paid \$2 to the Book Club to come to the library to hear a Syrian refugee speak about his life. Ousama, the speaker (who has asked for his personal details to be changed in order to protect his family in Syria), arrived in Canada eight months ago when a Toronto-based church sponsored his journey. The money raised by the Amnesty International Book Club will be donated to a joint project by Har Zion, a local synagogue, and the Imam Mahdi Islamic Centre, a local mosque, to provide aid to another family of eight Syrian refugees.

Ousama opened his presentation by teaching some startling facts to the audience. One such fact: 6.2 million people have been forced out of their homes into refugee camps within Syria, while 4.8 million Syrians have been pushed out of their country altogether. Ousama said that, to escape this conflict, many Syrians attempt dangerous trips to neighbouring countries, but many don't survive. He is one of those people who has moved through many countries to stay safe,

having lived in Syria, Jordan, and Turkey, among others. He also explained that the war in Syria is the worst humanitarian crisis since WWII and that it's not likely to end soon because the conflict is very complex, involving many countries with many dissonant interests.

The speaker spent a lot of time telling the audience personal stories to give them a better idea of what life is really like in the Syrian war. In Syria, he has a mother and two sisters, but, for his safety, they forced him to leave them behind after the Syrian government identified him as someone who had smuggled medicine into besieged areas. (Fortunately, his family in Syria is now safe.) Ousama became very emotional when telling some of his stories. One story that nearly brought him to tears was that of a young boy in a refugee camp he volunteered at who happily dug his nails into the mud to write because the camp lacked the pencils and paper he needed to practice his math. When Syria becomes more peaceful, Ousama wishes to go back to help rebuild the country and heal all those who have been affected.

Ousama closed his presentation with advice to students on how they can help the situation in Syria. They can befriend refugees who have come to Canada to make them feel welcome, donate to a humanitarian organization, and use social media to attract the attention of politicians who can push for a ceasefire. Students can also volunteer to help refugees in many ways: they can teach new Canadians English, they can help them adjust to their community, and they can work with the humanitarian organizations in Toronto. Ousama warned students not to jump to conclusions about the Syrian conflict based on what the media says; much of it does not provide in-depth coverage of the issue and often paints the countries involved in a good light even if they are harming civilians. Finally, he encouraged the audience to work hard with other young people to clear corruption out of politics and work even harder to keep politicians honest. We wish Ousama and his family the best going forward and thank him for his time.

On February 22, thirteen former Thornlea students paid a visit to their high school to discuss their experiences in college and university with current grade 12 students.

The alumni, like good friends, made sure to keep the mood light, making jokes frequently and speaking highly of both Thornlea and their present schools. They offered a lot of advice to our Grade 12s, notably to learn to manage their time & money, to use the help offered by their college or university (although it will be their responsibility to find it), and not to be shy with their professors. Learning how to make & keep good friends while staying in touch with old ones was another topic that was discussed. Although they warned of some of the challenges posed by university, such as stress and the commute, the alumni reassured any nervous students that success is possible for those who work hard.

“It was good to hear, especially from people who are in university, what that life is like and what to expect,” said Anthony Landry, a student who was in the audience. In general, the speakers encouraged the grade 12 students to go to college or university, saying that it is a good place to learn and that the freedom and independence are a welcome change. Hopefully, some of the students who were in the audience will come back to Thornlea next year to share their experiences with next year’s graduating class.

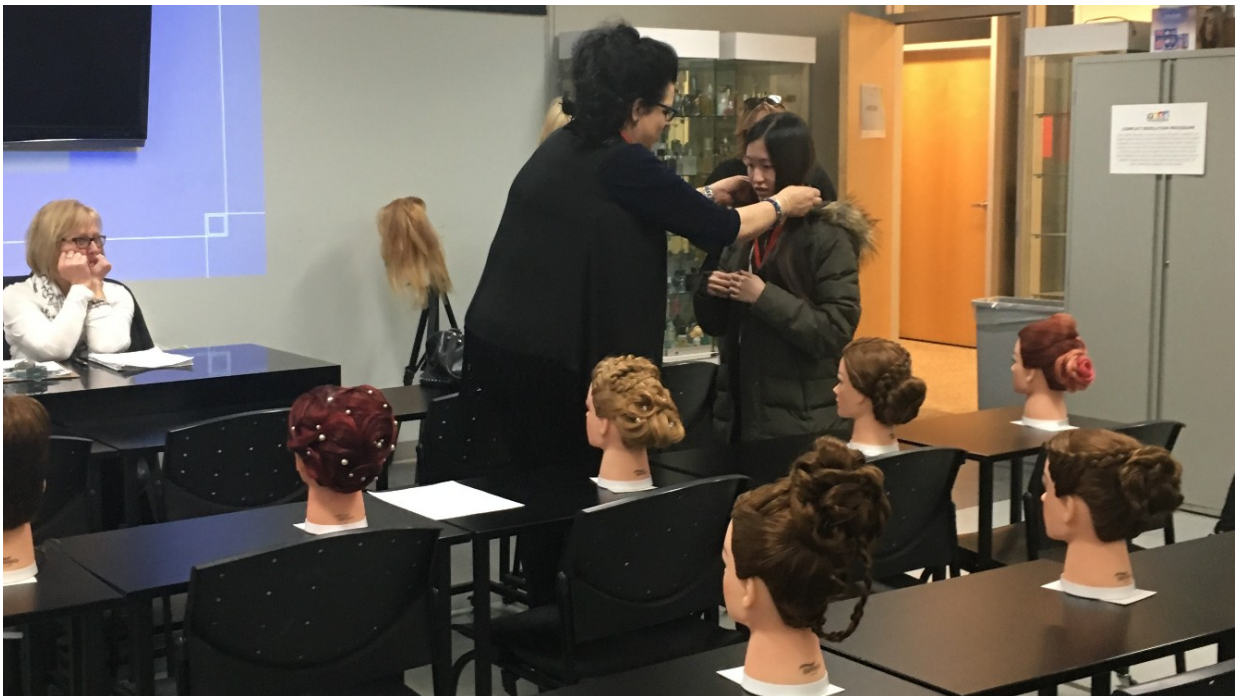

Hello all from the Guidance Department! Our team has been busy with providing our students with their course request for next year. Please make sure your child has submitted a signed course selection form to the Guidance Department.

A Course Selection Verification Sheet will be distributed after the March Break, at that time students can request a change on this sheet.

Important Notice for all grade 12's that have applied to OUAC for university!
Your grades from semester one have been processed by OUAC and sent to the Universities to which you have applied. Please log on to your online application in order to review your academic information. This verification is especially important if OUAC does not have a valid email address on file, or you are not able to receive emails from OUAC/your Universities because of a junk-mail setting with you inbox. If you see an error in your OUAC file, it is very important that you contact your Guidance Counsellor as soon as possible to have it corrected.

College and University Spring Open Houses are a popular way for prospective students to visit various Post-Secondary Institutions and evaluate them prior to applying and/or choosing. It is never too early to begin the search. The Guidance Department encourages all students, especially in grades 11 and 12 to attend the open house program of any potential future University/College. Please visit the University/College website to confirm Open House schedules during March Break. Spaces can be limited.

We would also like to remind students that there is a new process in place for Community Service Hours (CSH). All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for a CSH sheet and pre-approval. **Finally, a reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours as soon as possible before the next OUAC transmission.** For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our “**Volunteer Bulletin Board**” for current opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education requirement.


Course Verification
