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MESSAGE FROM THE VICE-PRINCIPAL

Dear Families and Community Members,

In terms of activities and events, November has not disappointed our school community at all. Life at Thornlea continues to maintain a fine momentum, offering students and staff much to be proud of and much to look forward to as we progress through the semester.

We started the month with our Grade 9 students spending **November 4**th in a different kind of learning environment. They joined trusted adults at their workplace participating in a provincial initiative known as Take Our Kids to Work Day. The start of this week marked the end of the first half of the semester. This means that students taking Careers and Civics ended one course and then began the next on the subsequent day. Also this past week, some of our Grade 9 student leaders returned to their elementary schools where they met with former teachers and spoke to younger peers, offering them support and insight about Grade 9 at Thornlea. Their former teachers were impressed with them and we are proud to have them as a part of our community. Also this week, our entire school came together for two meaningful and representative assemblies to mark Remembrance Day. Each assembly was a showcase of the talent, organization, collaborative spirit, and general style of our school community. Performances from our Glee Club, our French Immersion students, and the involvement of cadets and student MCs resulted in an event of very high caliber. A special thank you goes to Mr. Izumi and the History Club for their orchestration of the event and to Mr. Stone and the Stage and Lighting Crew for their expertise.

On Monday, November 16th at 7:15 p.m. in our school library, parents are invited to attend our November School Council Meeting. There is no school for students on this day. It's a perfect time for them to catch up on some muchneeded rest. Given the momentum we've seen so far, I'm sure December will be no different.

On Thursday, November 12-th <u>we went on a Fine Arts Trip</u> to <u>McMichael Art Gallery</u>.

Our Grade 10-12 students had a great opportunity to participate in combination of In-Gallery/ Outdoor Workshops and to take advantage of both the McMichael's unique art collection to discuss specific artists and the surrounding grounds. Students were en-

gaged in art-making activities using paints, pastels and other drawing materials, followed by discussions about vantage point, landscape composition, and the relationship between light and colour. We experienced and discussed what it means to create an artwork **en plein air**, beginning with close observation of landscape paintings by members of the Group of Seven and their contemporaries in the Collection. We also took advantage of the surrounding outdoor environment to gain a greater sense of the challenges artists encounter while working outdoors. What a *great day we had* yesterday!

101 Fees

All fees are non-refundable. Your application will not be forwarded to your university choice(s) until you submit full payment to the OUAC. Fees for withdrawn university choices are not refunded.

Summary of Fees

All fees are listed in Canadian dollars. These fees are for fall entry 2016.

Base Application Fee: \$150 For the initial 3 university/program choices.

International Service Fee: \$10 If the mailing address is outside of Canada.

Additional Choice Fee: \$50/choice For each university/program choice beyond the initial 3 (e.g., if 2 additional university choices are added, you must pay \$100 in addition to the base application fee).

Note: You may apply to as many Ontario universities/programs as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any one university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.

Methods of Payment

Payment for online applications is accepted by:

- Credit card (VISA, MasterCard or American Express). Prepaid credit cards and VISA debit cards are not accepted.
- Online banking (Canadian banks and credit unions only). Normally takes 1-3 business days.

All payments must be made in Canadian funds. For more information, visit Methods of Payment.

These are important dates in your application process. Please check them carefully and keep them in mind as you apply.

Late August 2015

The eINFO site goes live. Visit the eINFO website to start your research.

September 25-27, 2015

All 21 Ontario universities are in one place at the <u>Ontario Universities</u>? Fair (OUF). Just for you! Faculty, academics and knowledgeable representatives are ready to answer your questions.

October - November 2015

Gather information about Ontario's 21 universities at the <u>University Information Program (UIP)</u>. The UIP travels across Ontario after the OUF, offering fair- or presentation-style events in most Ontario regions.

By the end of November 2015

You will receive your Application Access Code Letter from your guidance counsellor with your school number, student number and temporary PIN. Keep this letter for your records. You will need this information to apply.

2016

January 13, 2016 Deadline to submit your completed application to the OUAC.

Note: The OUAC still processes applications received after this date and distributes them to the universities. However, specific university deadlines will apply.

The initial application includes all final grades from completed Grade 11 and 12 courses and a list of all currentyear courses in progress.

January 21, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all application data and grades from the OUAC for all applications submitted by January 13, 2016.

February 5, 2016

Recommended last date for you to submit all information to the OUAC to be considered for early admission. This information includes university and program changes and additional active choices.

Note: This is not a deadline. The OUAC accepts and processes changes at any time.

March 2, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all final first-semester and current full-year grades for 4U/M courses from the OUAC.

May 5, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive second-semester midterm and interim grades for full-year courses from the OUAC. Grades that the OUAC receives earlier will be sent to Ontario universities when received.

The latest date by which you can expect a response from an Ontario university. This includes:

- an offer of admission;
- a refusal; or
- a deferral, pending the receipt of specific information.

June 1, 2016

The earliest date you may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment (e.g., registration deposit, residence deposit, etc.).

All other admissions-related elements, including scholarships, other forms of student assistance or financial incentives, and offers of residence are considered part of the offer of admission. Therefore, you may accept these other offers prior to June 1, 2015, but Ontario universities will not compel a student in any way to make a decision earlier.

July 14, 2016

Target date for the OUAC to transmit all remaining final grades to the universities.

Early June to August 2016

The Admission Information Service (AIS) allows you to determine which Ontario universities still have spots available in first-year undergraduate programs.

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FALL 2016 - IMPORTANT DATES APPLY

Early October, 2015

The online application is available at ontariocolleges.ca.

November 23, 2015

First date that 2016 / 2017 application data is sent to the colleges. This is also the earliest date that colleges may notify applicants that their application has been received.

February 1, 2016

The deadline for applying to highly competitive programs. Applications received and paid for before this date will be given equal consideration by the colleges.

NOTE: Applicants for all programs are encouraged to apply before this date, as website volumes are highest at this time.

OFFER

February 1, 2016

Earliest date the colleges may release offers to applicants. Offers will continue to be issued until programs are filled or waitlists are established.

NOTE: Applicants who have not met admission requirements for a program may be notified at any time during the application process.

ACCEPT

February 1, 2016

Earliest date that applicants may confirm an offer of admission.

May 1, 2016

The most common deadline for continning offers of admission but not the only one. Applicants should check their offers of admission for exact deadline dates.

June 15, 2016

Earliest date that colleges may require payment of tuition fees.

DATA TRANSMISSION SCHEDULE

Data files from school boards and 7 or high schools are due at OCAS on the following dates:

October 5 - 9, 2015

Demographics, marks history, and current and projected registrations are due. OCAS requires marks history for all courses taken in grades 9, 10 and 11.

November 20 - 25, 2015

First semester midterm marks are due. Schools may transmit interim marks for full-year courses as soon as they are available.

February 12, 2016

For semestered schools: First semester final marks and currently enrolled second semester courses are due. For non-semestered schools: Interim marks are due.

April 25 - 29, 2016

For semestered schools: Second semester midtern marks are due. For non-semestered schools: Interim marks are due.

July 8, 2016

For semestered schools: Second semester final marks and proof of graduation are due. For non-semestered schools: Final marks and proof of graduation are due.

August 19, 2016

For somestered schools: Second semester final marks (and / or summer school final marks) and proof of graduation are due. For non-semestered schools: Final marks (and / or summer school final marks) and proof of graduation are que.

What parents should do

- Contact your pharmacy to arrange returning your Allerject device and to obtain a replacement epinephrine auto-injector with the same dose.
- Consult your pharmacist to ensure you understand how to properly use the replacement auto-injector.
- In the event a life-threatening allergic reaction (anaphylaxis) occurs before you can obtain a replacement auto injector, use your Allerject device as directed by your healthcare provider, and then seek emergency medical attention.
- Speak with your healthcare professional if you are concerned about your health or your child's health.

Report any adverse events to <u>Health Canada</u>.

Because of the prevalence of this epinephrine auto-injector in our schools, please check the inventory at your school and contact any family that may be using the affected Sanofi Allerject product to have it replaced.
