FLU SEASON IS HERE

Get the flu shot as early as possible



The first and best step to preventing the flu (or influenza), is to **get the flu shot every year**. The flu spreads quickly and easily from an infected person to others and anyone can get it. Getting the flu shot can protect you, your family and those around you.

Students may be at higher risk of getting the flu as they come together in close public spaces including the classroom, gymnasium, cafeteria and library.

The flu shot is especially important for students who have a chronic condition (e.g. asthma, diabetes) or those who live with or have close contact with a pregnant woman, kids less than five years old, or a resident of a nursing home or other chronic care facility since these groups are at higher risk of getting very sick or being hospitalized because of the flu.

Flu shots are **free** and are readily available at:

- Health care provider's offices for people six months of age and older
- Participating pharmacies, for people five years of age and older

In addition to getting the flu shot annually, here are some other health tips that can help prevent the spread of the flu:

- Wash your hands well and often with either soap and water or alcohol based hand rub
- Cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze (if you do not have a tissue, cough into your upper sleeve)
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Stay home when you're sick
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and shared items

It's important to get the flu shot as early as possible as it can take nearly **two weeks** for the influenza vaccine to take full effect.

As of October 17, 2018, it will be legal for individuals **19 and older** to buy, use, possess and grow recreational cannabis. It remains illegal for anyone under the age of 19. This is the same as the minimum age for the sale of tobacco and alcohol in Ontario.

Regardless of age, cannabis is not allowed on school property or at school-related events at any time.

It is illegal for **anyone** regardless of age to smoke or vape any substance, including cannabis:

- at school, on school grounds, and all public areas within 20m of these grounds
- on children's playgrounds and public areas within 20m of playgrounds
- in child care centres, or where an early years program is provided
- in places where home child care is provided – even if children aren't present

There will be consequences for students if they are believed to be in possession or under the influence of alcohol, illegal drugs or cannabis. Suspension will be considered. There are exceptions if the medicinal use of cannabis is outlined in the student's Health Care Plan.

If a student gives alcohol or cannabis to anyone under the age of 19, the school will contact police, suspend the student and consider expulsion.

In YRDSB, we want families and students to be informed about the facts of cannabis legalization. To support this learning, you may find the following resources helpful . You can also request a hard copy through the school office.

School Bus Cancellation Notice

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be region-wide meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries which prevents the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- When bus service is cancelled all school tests and/or examinations will be cancelled and rescheduled.
- Student trips involving the use of school buses will also be cancelled.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. **If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same transportation home.**

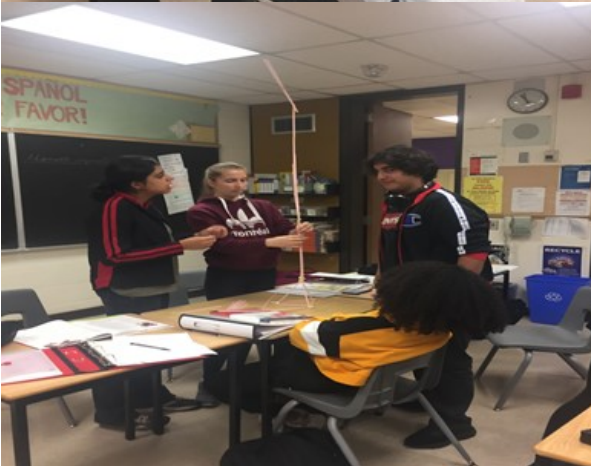
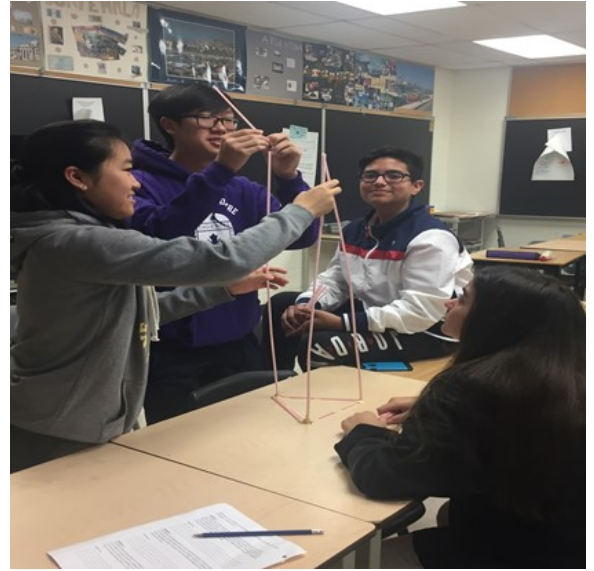
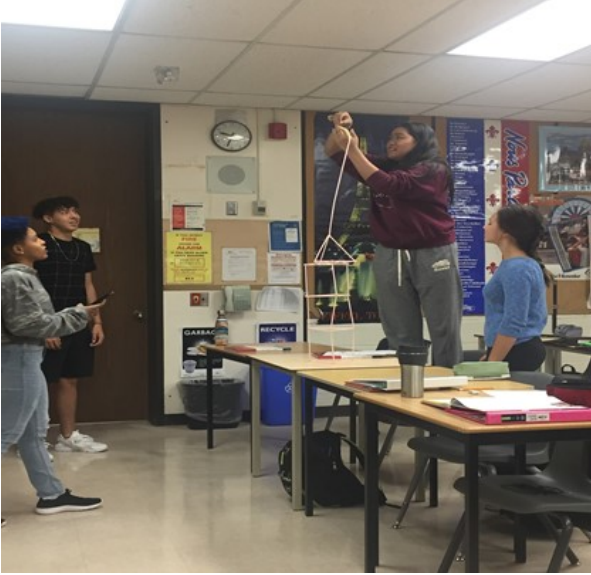


Highlights from the History Department

Co-op News

The Journey Begins: Co-op Students Discover Employability Skills and Career Directions

The first semester co-op students have been at their placements just over five weeks, and already the excitement and benefits of experiential learning are being realized. Their placements cover every sector of the working world, ranging from the medical field, to design, to cabinet making, to teaching, to auto and auto body repair, to computer hardware engineering.

The following quotations are taken from the current Co-op students' journals:

Personal Change:

Through my first month of Cooperative Education, I have learned a lot about businesses, and gained a better understanding of how offices work in the real world. Above all of this, through my first month of Cooperative Education I have learned a lot more about how important personal traits such as responsibility and initiative affect you in the workplace. After learning about these personal traits, I noticed a lot of beneficial changes in my lifestyle.

First of all, I noticed that I am a lot more responsible. For example, last semester I would sleep in late, and wouldn't worry about being late for first period at all. I didn't think that it would be a big deal if I missed the first 15 minutes of first period. This semester I have been waking up at 6:45 a.m. everyday no matter the circumstances because at my workspace, the morning instructions are the most important time of the day. Also, if you are late you would have to deal with your supervisor.

Secondly, I noticed an improvement in my Initiative. Working in an office, you should be able to do things without being asked too. My supervisor is always so busy, so I learned how to make the best use of my time without being given instructions. I also noticed that if you don't have the ability to work independently, you wouldn't last long in a workspace. In an office, no one wants to supervise you and hold your hand throughout the day to help you accomplish your tasks.

After one month of co-op, I think I've learned how to maintain a better attitude when you have to do boring tasks. I found that smiling and laughing through everything is very beneficial to your overall mood and attitude.

It has almost been over a month since I have been going to my Co-op placement and I feel like I have changed and learned a lot. Honestly, I didn't think my Co-op placement would affect me even though Mr. Babalis, told me it would. Working with kids for about 3 hours a day has taught me a lot about patience.

I also disliked little kids before I started my placement because as an employee at Toys R Us I see children always making a mess of the store and having to clean up after them. But in class the kids clean up after themselves. The only time we clean up after them, is during lunch. I've learned that kids aren't that bad and I kind of like kids now. I also never took in how much of an influence teachers are till now. Teachers teach life skills that everyone uses in everyday life. For example, how to deal with conflict between you and someone else. Another thing that has changed about me is my language and manners. Community Service Hours

We would also like to remind our learning community that there is a process in place for Community Service Hours. All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for pre-approval. It should be at a Not-For-Profit organization.

We also would like to announce the approved initiative to all our **grade 9** students. Grade 9 students that complete their 40 community service hours in their grade 9 year will receive a special certificate of completion. This is for grade 9's only. The 40 hours must be submitted into our Guidance Office by **Friday June 21st to Qualify**.

For more information on volunteer opportunities, please come down to the Guidance Office and pick up a Community Service Hours form and please take a look at our "Volunteer Bulletin Board" for opportunities to fulfill this Ministry of Education graduation requirement.

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) Pin Codes arrived!! 237 potential graduating students have already picked up their envelope with their Pin Code and are on their way to applying to University. As of Nov. 14th, 50 Thornlea SS students have applied to University and several already have an early conditional offer!

If a student has not picked up their code, they should come to the Guidance office immediately.

University Applications:

You can select as many University programs as you would like (\$50.00 each), but, you can only choose a **maximum of 3 programs** per University. For example:

Only 3 choices can be used for all University of Toronto campuses, for example (St. George, Scarborough, Mississauga) can have one program each or all 3 at Scarborough or any combination adding up to 3.

Waterloo University, you could only select a maximum of 3 programs. If you wanted to add a 4th you cannot.

If you need clarification on this process or have questions, please do not hesitate to ask a counselor.

Guidance has already provided Ontario College Application workshops. 7 students have applied to date. We expect more before the deadline. No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own with their Ontario Education Number (OEN) at www.ontariocolleges.ca- Students can apply today! Please speak to Ms. Rai if you have further questions.

The Deadline for your University Application is January 16, 2019 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card well before that date.)

The next OUAC University grades transmission is scheduled for early February, 2019.

The “Equal Consideration” Deadline for your College Application is February 1st, 2019 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OCAS College grades transmission is scheduled for Nov. 22nd, 2018.

Part-Time Status

Attention to all **grade 12** students, who wish to apply for part-time status, may pick up an application form from their Guidance Counselor starting on Monday November 19th. Your Counselor will then make a follow-up appointment with an Administrator, after your application has been submitted. The completed form must be submitted by Monday November 26th by 2:00 PM, so that it will not appear on your Transcript.

Full Disclosure deadline

Reminder full disclosure date is Wednesday Nov. 28th. If you wish to drop a course and not have it appear on your transcript see Guidance asap.

If students are planning on making a request for a timetable change for 2nd semester, they should make an appointment with their counselor today or ASAP.
