Hello Parents and Guardians,

I wanted to update you about the progress in the school's preparation for the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test (OSSLT).

Results of the WSIs:

- ⇒ If your son/daughter is in grade 9 or 10, he/she has received the practice test and short writing task back. Please review the results with your child.
- ⇒ Your son/daughter will also receive the long writing task feedback by November 27. Please review these results with your child as well.
- ⇒ If you are concerned about the results, please remember that the upcoming WSIs will continue to focus on these skills in greater detail.

Information about the After School Literacy Program:

- ⇒ We are planning to offer **two sections of the After School Literacy Program in 2nd semester.**
- ⇒ One section will take place **every Monday and Wednesday** from 3:15 to 4:15 from February 21 to April 4 (excluding days during March Break).
- ⇒ Another section will take place **every Tuesday and Thursday** from 3:15 to 4:15 from February 27 to April 5 (excluding days during March Break).
- ⇒ The benefit for students to enroll in the Program is that:
 - each session will focus on one or two tasks from the test,
 - students will learn to apply specific strategies and tips for each type of reading and writing task, and
 - they will receive guidance from the teacher through instruction and immediate feedback on the sample tasks.

*****The registration form will be available starting January 8, 2018 in the Main Office and through E-bulletin.** Return completed forms to the Main Office.

- ⇒ The WSIs will resume second semester on February 20, 2018.

The Guidance Team this year consists of Ms. Lovleen Rai (ESL Counselor/Literacy Lead), Ms. Viviane Estafanos (French Immersion Counselor/AP Co-ordinator, F.I. Teacher), Ms. Julie Scott (Student Success), Ms. Kathryn Pantazopoulos (Student Success for ESL students), Mr. Nizam Alkins, Head of Guidance (Counselor) and Ms. Gail Burdett (Guidance Secretary).

We also would like to announce the new process for making guidance appointments. **First**, please see Mrs. Burdett, our Guidance Secretary. If any student would like to make an appointment with their "area" identified counselor (French Immersion, ESL, Other), they should come to the Guidance Office before school starts (8:30 to 8:45), during their lunch (11:30 to 12:30), or after school (3:00 to 3:30) to make their appointment.

Keep in mind that many Post-Secondary Institutions (Universities and Colleges) will be coming to Thornlea to speak to our senior students in the first semester.

This week we have Queen's University on Nov. 16. Next week we have Waterloo, Laurier, UOIT, Ottawa.

We would like to thank all the post-secondary representatives for their informative seminars with our graduating students.

The Ontario University Application Centre (OUAC) Pin Codes have arrived!! 186 graduating students have already picked up their envelope with their Pin Code and are on their way to applying to University. If a student has not picked up their code, they should come to the Guidance office immediately.

Guidance will offer a College Application workshop on **December 21st, 22nd at 11:35 in the lower computer lab.**

No PinCodes are distributed for College Applications; students will create their own with their Ontario Education Number (OEN) at www.ontariocolleges.ca- Students can apply today!

The Deadline for your University Application is January 17, 2018 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OUAC University grades transmission is scheduled for February 15th, 2018.

The "Equal Consideration" Deadline for your College Application is February 1st, 2018 (recommend to pay on-line with a credit card)

The next OCAS College grades transmission is scheduled for Nov. 24th, 2017.

We would also like to remind our learning community that there is a new process in place for Community Service Hours. All students must complete 40 community hours to obtain their Ontario Secondary School Diploma. **The Guidance department must approve your community service opportunity before you start your hours. Please see your counselor for approval. Your service must be for a Not-For-Profit organization/event.**

A reminder to all grade 12 students; that they should hand in their community service hours by Wednesday January 31st, 2018. Before the OUAC transmission.

Part-Time Status

Attention to all **grade 12** students, who wish to apply for part-time status, may pick up an application form from their Guidance Counselor starting on Monday November 13th. Your Counselor will then make a follow-up appointment with an Administrator, after your application has been submitted. The completed form must be submitted by Monday November 27th by 2:00 PM, so that it will not appear on your Transcript.

Full Disclosure deadline

Reminder full disclosure date is Wednesday Nov. 29th. If you wish to drop a course and not have it appear on your transcript see Guidance asap.

If students are planning on making a request for a timetable change for 2nd semester, they should make an appointment with their counselor today or ASAP.

For Scholarship information, please make an appointment to see Ms. Rai in the Guidance office.



Thornlea Library Speaker Series

On Tuesday, October 17th, the students of Thornlea Amnesty International Book Club invited two speakers from YouthSpeak, Cole and David, to speak to over 100 Thornlea students about their transitional journeys. The presenters were introduced by student Dominique Laws. They began by sharing a visual of the Genderbread Person, (an effective tool for explaining the differences between biological sex, gender expression, gender identity, and sexual attraction).




Then Cole and David took turns sharing their personal stories. Kim Parlee, Staff Advisor for Thornlea's GSA, moderated the Q&A which followed. Many students gathered around Cole and David after the event, staying 45 minutes into the lunch hour to talk with them and give their support. Thanks go to Diana Adamo, Krish Shah, and Emma Perrin for helping us to set up the venue before the speakers arrived. Special kudos to Niloo Gheshlaghi and Noura Khajehnouri for preparing an informative brochure for all of the student guests attending the presentation.



On Thursday, November 2nd, the Holocaust survivor Faigie Libman, spoke to about 160 students, sharing her story about how the insight of her mother and the kindness of strangers helped her to survive WWII. Many students were so moved by Faigie's presentation, that they flocked around her afterwards to meet her and share their support. Faigie was born in Kaunas, Lithuania. In 1941, she was moved into a ghetto with all of the other Jews of her city. During the October 28th "Great Action," Faigie, her parents, and her grandmother were separated from her grandfather and her aunt; the latter were machine-gunned to death along with 10,500 other Kaunas Jews. In 1944, the ghetto was liquidated, and Faigie, her parents, and the remaining Jews of Kaunas were sent in cattle cars to concentration camps. Faigie's father was sent to Dachau in Germany. Faigie and her mother were sent to Stutthof in Poland. Between 1944 and 1945, Faigie and her mother worked in Stutthof, and then in three separate labour camps. Finally, they dug trenches for the Nazis before being sent on the "Death March" that was to be their end. Russian soldiers liberated Faigie and her mother in 1945, the same week that her father was shot in Dachau. After living in a DP camp in Austria for three years, they were finally accepted for immigration by the Canadian Government, and settled in Montreal. Faigie went on to have a thriving professional and personal life. She is the mother of four children, and a grandmother. She taught kindergarten in Toronto for over 28 years. She now speaks all over the province, sharing her story of survival and of the many non-Jews who helped her and other Jews, risking their lives for another human being. We were introduced to Faigie through a Thornlea graduate, Joshua Hanff.



On Friday, November 10th, Dr. Daniella Astorino, a chiropractor from ProMedX Sports Injury & Wellness Centre, spoke to two physical education classes about The Importance of Posture. Students learned why good posture is crucial, and the potential impact of poor posture. They also received useful information on how to do an "ergonomic check" when they are texting or working on a computer. The proper way to load and wear a backpack was also shared. Finally, the students learned the best ways to protect their still-developing spines, and to prevent spinal issues as they age. This presentation was especially meaningful because Dr. Astorino was recommended to us for her knowledge and enthusiasm by one of our own students, Mingze Hong.

Thornlea Library Contests

In terms of contests, the Library started the ground running this year. These are the contests we have run so far:

- a. **ThornleaReads T-Shirt Design Contest.** In cooperation with Ashley Gilkes of the Art Department, the Library invited students to submit a design for this year's ThornleaReads t-shirts. Many students submitted wonderful proposals. We narrowed these down to three, and the student body was invited to choose a winner from these. The votes have been counted and the winner will be announced on Monday, November 13th.
- b. **The Mystery Bag of Swag Giveaway.** The names of students who submitted Twitter-length book reviews were collected, and for the last 2 weeks we've drawn winning names. The prize was a bookish bag of goodness from the publisher HarperCollins Canada. The first winner was Gr. 11 student, Gabby Laws, and the second was Gr. 10 student, Michelle Lee. The name of the third and final winner will be drawn next week.
- c. Students have been invited to fill out a ballot to guess the winning book for the upcoming **Writers' Trust Prize**. The names of the students who chose the winner (to be announced Nov. 14th) will be put in a draw to win one of the nominated titles.
- d. Students have been invited to do the same (as d.) for the **ScotiaBank Giller Prize**, the winner of which will be announced on November 20th.



Flu Season is on its way – are you ready?



Flu season is nearly here. Be prepared by getting the flu shot as early as possible.

How can the flu be avoided?

- Get the flu shot!
- [Wash your hands](#) well and often with soap and warm water. If soap and water are unavailable, use an alcohol-based [hand sanitizer](#)
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze and throw the tissue out immediately. Wash your hands afterward. Cough into your upper sleeve if you don't have a tissue.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Avoid large crowds and stay home when you are sick
- Keep common surfaces and items clean and disinfected

Need a Safe Place to Sleep Tonight? Do you want to avoid a shelter?

Talk to your Guidance Counsellor to see if the
Nightstop Program is right for you.

What is Nightstop?

Nightstop provides a bed for the night to youth between the ages of 16 – 26 who are in a housing crisis and have nowhere safe to sleep tonight. If you are eligible for the program, we match you with a host volunteer who has been extensively screened and trained. They have a spare bedroom, a warm heart and a listening ear. They provide you with meals, an opportunity to wash your clothing, you can have a shower and a safe place to sleep for the night.

As soon as you join the Nightstop Program, we wrap our services around you to either help to reintegrate you with your family or to assist you with longer term goals. *(Family mediation, counselling, employment and housing are among the services we can assist you with.)*


