#### Message From the Vice-Principal

Dear Families and Community Members,

As we approach the end of the first month of school, I'm amazed by the many activities and programs run by staff, students, and parents at Thornlea Secondary School. In less than three weeks, we have caught up with old friends, made new friends, set personal goals, and begun what will be an awesome school year. In addition, we have: welcomed our Grade 9 students and their parents during Transition Day; tried out for and formed teams in girls' field hockey, boys' rugby, girls' basketball, boys' soccer, coed swimming, cross country, and tennis; dutifully reported to practices; attended Grade 9 Movie Night; worked with one another during Grade 9 FIT Day at Camp Green Acres; campaigned for a position on Student Council (TSAC); joined new clubs; relaunched our successful Breakfast Club; and hosted our first School Council meeting. Having so many activities in such a short amount of time is evidence of a very vibrant, thriving, and busy school.

If we consider just the next two weeks alone, we'll see:

- Safety Week when students and staff will participate in a variety of activities including safety assemblies and a lockdown drill. Teachers will review instructions for drills with each of their classes so that students are prepared and aware of the expected response in the event of an emergency.
- The 35<sup>th</sup> Annual Terry Fox Run commemorated at Thornlea on Wednesday, October 30. All Period 2 classes will participate in the run, occurring on the back field. Our goal is to raise \$1,500. The class that raises the most money will be treated to breakfast in the cafeteria.
- TSAC visiting the Youth Leadership Camp Canada (YLCC) camp in Orillia with our administration for a fun-filled weekend to learn more about leadership.
- Our annual Club Fair on Friday, October 2. Students will have an opportunity to speak to members from the various clubs at Thornlea. A variety of clubs and groups will have booths set up in the hallway and be available to answer questions and promote their clubs and groups. Encourage your child to visit the booths and to consider joining one of the many groups at Thornlea.
- Photo Retake Day on Wednesday, October 7 for those students who haven't already taken their photos or those who are not pleased with the results of the first photo.

Beyond the next two weeks, you can look forward to:

Interim Report Cards being issued to students on Wednesday, October 14. Teachers continue to collect and respond to assessment data. Parents are reminded to review the information on the report and to connect with their child's teacher should they have any concerns.

Parents' Night on Thursday, October 29. More information about scheduling an appointment with your child's teacher will be available at the time the interim reports are issued.

Grade 8 Family Night. We invite all parents and students who are interested in becoming members of the Thornlea community to the school on Thursday, October 15, when you can learn more about Thornlea and all that it has to offer you.

On a final note, if you are willing and able to assist us in offering breakfast to our students at the start of each day, we gratefully accept your donations. Currently, we offer a cereal and oatmeal breakfast on Monday and Wednesday, a bagel breakfast on Tuesdays, and a waffle breakfast on Thursdays. We hope to continue with a hot breakfast on Fridays. If you would like to donate food such as yogurt, cereal, oatmeal, milk, bagels, or frozen waffles, we invite you to drop them off in the main office and we will ensure that they are used by our Breakfast Club.

Once again, Thornlea SS is pleased to be hosting its annual Terry Fox Run/Walk during period two (10:15 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.) on Wednesday, September 30, 2015. Of note, this is the 35th Amilyersary of the original event. All monies raised through our event will be forwarded to the Terry Fox Foundation to further the cause of cancer research.

Our walk/jog/run route will be entirely on school grounds and will consist of a 5 km circular course. Teachers, students, and parents will be on band to supervise and assist participants along the way.

All students will be taking part in this worthwhite event. A pledge sheet will be provided via your son/daughter's PERIOD 2 teacher and we ask that you sign the sheet as permission for your son/daughter to participate. 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#### Thank You For My Life

When I was 10 years old, I was diagnosed with a brain tumor. When they told me I couldn't believe it, I remember being really scared. I needed surgery to insert a shunt to relieve the pressure in my brain and had to have 70 chemotherapy treatments for more than two years.

The chemo, though awful, was given in small dosages so I had very mild side effects and I only had to replace my shunt just once. Most importantly, my tumor has not grown which is great news. I will probably have to live with it for the rest of my life...but I can live with that.

Today, I feel great. I have an amazing family and friends. But I often think about Terry Fox - what if he hadn't raised money for cancer research? Would my treatments have been worse? Would they have even been able to treat my cancer?

I am here today because Terry Fox dedicated his life to helping people like me. And you do too. Thank you so much for fundralsing for cancer research. You change lives for the better every day.

Salutations from the Guidance Department! Our team has been very busy since registration day on September 1<sup>st</sup>. We would like to thank you for your patience in our efforts to support your child for this school year. The Guidance Team this year consists of Mr. Paul Stephenson (Counselor/Student Success),

Ms. Andrea Tse (Counselor & Head of ESL), Ms. Joan Walker (Counselor & SHSM Co-ordinator),

Mr. Nizam Alkins, Head of Guidance (Counselor) and Ms. Gail Burdett (Guidance Secretary).

The team has been trying its best to support every student that "requests" a timetable change this school year. To date, we have seen approximately 150 grade 12 students, 105 grade 11 students, 75 grade 10 students, 30 grade 9 students and 65 new international visa students, plus 35 new registrations. This process was completed on Friday Sept. 18<sup>th</sup>. We thank you for your patience and understanding through this busy time.

We also would like to announce the new process for making guidance appointments. #### 101 Fees

All fees are non-refundable. Your application will not be forwarded to your university choice(s) until you submit full payment to the OUAC. Fees for withdrawn university choices are not refunded.

#### Summary of Fees

All fees are listed in Canadian dollars. These fees are for fall entry 2016.

Base Application Fee: \$150

For the initial 3 university/program choices.

International Service Fee: \$10

If the mailing address is outside of Canada.

Additional Choice Fee: \$50/choice

For each university/program choice beyond the initial 3 (e.g., if 2 additional university choices are added, you must pay \$100 in addition to the base application fee).

Note: You may apply to as many Ontario universities/programs as you wish; however, you are limited to a maximum of 3 program choices at any one university (including its affiliates). Some universities may further limit the number of programs you can apply to.

#### Methods of Payment

Payment for online applications is accepted by:

- Credit card (VISA, MasterCard or American Express). Prepaid credit cards and VISA debit cards are not accepted.
- Online banking (Canadian banks and credit unions only). Normally takes 1-3 business days.

#### 101 Important Dates

These are important dates in your application process. Please check them carefully and keep them in mind as you apply.

#### 2015

#### Late August 2015

The eINFO site goes live. Visit the eINFO website to start your research.

#### September 25-27, 2015

All 21 Ontario universities are in one place at the <u>Ontario Universities' Fair (OUF)</u>. Just for you! Faculty, academics and knowledgeable representatives are ready to answer your questions.

#### October - November 2015

Gather information about Ontario's 21 universities at the <u>University Information Program (UIP)</u>. The UIP travels across Ontario after the OUF, offering fair- or presentation-style events in most Ontario regions.

#### By the end of November 2015

You will receive your Application Access Code Letter from your guidance counsellor with your school number, student number and temporary PIN. Keep this letter for your records. You will need this information to apply.

#### 2016

#### January 13, 2016

Deadline to submit your completed application to the OUAC.

Note: The OUAC still processes applications received after this date and distributes them to the universities. However, specific university deadlines will apply.

The initial application includes all final grades from completed Grade 11 and 12 courses and a list of all currentyear courses in progress.

#### January 21, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all application data and grades from the OUAC for all applications submitted by January 13, 2016.

#### February 5, 2016

Recommended last date for you to submit all information to the OUAC to be considered for early admission. This information includes university and program changes and additional active choices.

Note: This is not a deadline. The OUAC accepts and processes changes at any time.

#### March 2, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive all final first-semester and current full-year grades for 4U/M courses from the OUAC.

#### May 5, 2016

Target date for Ontario universities to receive second-semester midterm and interim grades for full-year courses from the OUAC. Grades that the OUAC receives earlier will be sent to Ontario universities when received.

#### May 27, 2016

The latest date by which you can expect a response from an Ontario university. This includes:

- an offer of admission;
- a refusal; or
- a deferral, pending the receipt of specific information.

#### June 1, 2016

The earliest date you may be required to respond to an Ontario university offer of admission and give a financial commitment (e.g., registration deposit, residence deposit, etc.).

All other admissions-related elements, including scholarships, other forms of student assistance or financial incentives, and offers of residence are considered part of the offer of admission. Therefore, you may accept these other offers prior to June 1, 2015, but Ontario universities will not compel a student in any way to make a decision earlier.

#### July 14, 2016

Target date for the OUAC to transmit all remaining final grades to the universities.

#### Early June to August 2016

The <u>Admission Information Service (AIS)</u> allows you to determine which Ontario universities still have spots available in first-year undergraduate programs.

#### Early October, 2015

The online application is available at ontariocolleges.ca.

#### November 23, 2015

First date that 2016 / 2017 application data is sent to the colleges. This is also the earliest date that colleges may notify applicants that their application has been received.

#### February 1, 2016

The deadline for applying to highly competitive programs.

Applications received and paid for before this date will be given equal consideration by the colleges.

NOTE: Applicants for all programs are encouraged to apply before this date, as website volumes are highest at this time.

#### OFFER.

#### February 1, 2016

Ear lest date the colleges may release offers to applicants. Offers will continue to be issued until programs are filled or waitlists are established.

NOTE: Applicants who have not met admission requirements for a program may be notified at any time during the application process.

#### ACCEPT

#### February 1, 2016

Earliest date that applicants may confirm an offer of admission.

#### May 1, 2016

The most common deadline for confirming offers of admission but not the only one. Applicants should check their offers of admission for exact deadline dates.

#### June 15, 2016

Earliest date that colleges may require payment of tuition fees.

Data files from school boards and / or high schools are due at OCAS on the following dates:

#### October 5 - 9, 2015

#### August 19, 2016


