#### School News and Information

#### **Exams and Culminating Assessments**

#### Please Note that the first day of grade 12 exams will be on June 20

**DO NOT** make plans for travel, appointments, etc. during the exam period (June 20-27) students are required to write ALL exams at the scheduled time. Failure to report for an examination may result in a mark of "0". If a student is absent from an exam for medical reasons, documentation is required. Illness or emergencies will be dealt with on a case by case basis. Please note that students missing exams for reasons approved by the administration will be required to write all missed exams at the earliest possible date.

#### **Extended Absences**

Regular attendance is closely connected to academic success and we expect that students will attend school every day except in the case of illness. However, we understand that there may be circumstances when it is <u>necessary</u> for students to be away from school for family or personal reasons. Extended vacations are not considered necessary. If a student will be absent for an extended period of time he/she must consult with their teachers, **at least two weeks** prior to the absence to

- Understand the potential impact of the extended absence on learning;
- Identify missed learning goals and assessments;
- Create a plan to complete missed work identified by the teacher. The student is responsible for catching up on all missed work during their absence;
- Schedule a time to complete/submit missed assessments upon return.
- Sign off on the plan- students are responsible for picking up an Extended Absence Form from the main office at least 2 weeks prior to an anticipated extended absence from school.
- A meeting with an Administrator may be scheduled if the absence is expected to interfere with the successful completion of a course.

Absences longer than 15 consecutive days require additional documentation and procedures in accordance with Board Procedure #NP 681.0. Failure to follow these procedures will lead to a student being removed from the school's register. In these circumstances, please speak directly to an administrator prior to completion of this form.

#### Program overview

**The Come Up** summer program is a unique in-person course offered to self-identifying Black students in the York Region District School Board. It also includes guest speakers, field trips, lunch and swag.

**Students entering grade 9** will earn a Civics and Careers (GLC2O/CHV2O) credit.

**Students entering Grade 10** will earn a Black History (CHE3O) credit. This credit can be used to fulfill the grade 10 compulsory history credit.

- Are you entering Grade 9 or 10 in September 2023?
- Do you self-identify as Black?
- Are you a YRDSB Student?
- Are you interested in earning a high school credit?

# Horses, students, team up for Trailblazer program

A local farm is proving that horses do, indeed, have hearts. Big ones.

Horses at Heart celebrated its Trailblazer Program with a demonstration by students at the WasterStone Estate and Farms recently.

The students demonstrate horseback riding skills and their progress was demonstrated to parents and visitors.

The Trailblazer Training program is a program that has been running for 4 years and is funded through a grant from Employment and Social Development Canada (their Canada Service Corp program). The program is for atrisk youth and they come once weekly for 12 weeks to learn about horses and riding, and each week we facilitate emotional wellness activities that help them develop social and interpersonal skills.

Executive director Deborah Weiss said there is a wide range of benefits, from developing self-confidence (as each group participates in helping the next group), as well as the empowerment of learning how to take care of, and ride horses.

The organization is Horses At Heart Therapeutic Equestrian Inc. The recent event was a presentation of the Tommy Douglas High School Community Class (in Vaughan), which is a special ed class of ASD students (autism spectrum). They participated in a 12-week program which included horseback riding lessons and daily wellness journalling.

Weiss founded Horses at Heart in 2003 as a way to combine traditional therapeutic modalities with equine assisted therapy.

The response has been very positive, she said.

"Horses are a wonderful animal to partner with in experiential therapies. They're big enough to be intimidating to children, but under the right guidance they are patient and kind. Riding a horse is extremely empowering to a child – particularly if they are children who have not had a lot of empowering experiences."

She added the program is a great way to see the kids have a wonderful time grooming and riding the horses, and at the same time flourishing in their self-confidence and developing really positive social skills.

Weiss noted they will be starting a new group with the Huron Heights High School special ed class in May, and she wants to bring awareness of their mental wellness program across the York Region District School Board.

Councillor Avia Eek, who attended the recent event, noted "it was beautiful to watch. These kids felt so empowered and confident."

Councillor Jennifer Anstey noted she was delighted to watch the event.



"From my own experience, I know how therapeutic spending time with horses is, so it's great to see them being used as part of an Equine Assisted Therapy program. I loved watching the huge smiles from the students as they were riding, and I spoke to their teachers later who shared how impactful these kinds of experiences are for the kids. The work with the horses empowers the students and helps them build self-confidence, a powerful combination of life skills that can be of benefit to anyone."

"Horses at Heart was a great opportunity for our students. Having the chance to attend an extended program like this (thanks to the generous funding) really allowed our students to get comfortable with the horses and take risks at their own pace," said Kim Weston of the York Region District School Board. "We were able to gradually move them out of their comfort zones little by little and their staff-were so supportive in the process. There was never any pressure to do it. Which I think made each step, from simply petting or feeding a treat to grooming, mounting and eventually riding such a celebration. We're all so proud of the progress they've all made and I'm so glad that some of the parents got to see them all in action this week as well. The smiles we've seen throughout the 12 weeks speak volumes about how proud they are of themselves, too. Which is just the best part of it all."
