Entrance

• If a student arrives late, they are to proceed directly to their class. It is expected that students share with their teachers the reason for their lateness or previous absence.




- Please expect communication from teachers if students are repeatedly late or absent.





30 Credits*

18 Compulsory Credits + 12 Elective Credits

Online learning graduation requirement

Beginning with students that entered Grade 9 in the 2020-21 school year, students must earn at least two online learning credits to get their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

The online learning graduation requirement also applies to adult learners that will be entering the Ontario secondary school system starting in 2023-24 school year.

What do you need to graduate from high school?

18 compulsory credits

Students must earn the following compulsory credits to obtain the Ontario Secondary School Diploma:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in science
- credit in Canadian history
- credit in Canadian geography
- 1 credit in the arts
- 1 credit in health and physical education
- 1 credit in French as a second language
- 0.5 credit in career studies
- 0.5 credit in civics

In addition, students must complete

- √ 12 optional credits¹
- 40 hours of community involvement
- / the provincial literacy requirement

Plus one credit from each of the following groups:

Group 1:

- English or French as a second language**
- a Native language
 a classical or international language
- a ciassical or international language
- social sciences and the humanities
- Canadian and world studies
 guidance and career education
- cooperative education***

Group 2:

- · health and physical education
- the arts
- business studies
- . French as a second language**
- · cooperative education***

Group 3:

- science (Grade 11 or 12)
- technological education
- French as a second language**
- computer studies
- cooperative education***
- A maximum of 3 credits in English as a second language (ESL) or English literacy development (ELD) may be counted towards the 4 compulsory credits in English, but the fourth must be a credit earned for a Grade 12 compulsory English course.
- ** In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a second language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.
- *** A maximum of 2 credits in cooperative education can count as compulsory credits.
- ¹ The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved dual credit courses.

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Community Involvement

40 hours of community involvement activities = OSSD Requirement



- Must be in service of the community or individuals in the community who are not able to perform the activity for themselves
- Cannot be in service of a for-profit-business performing duties that would otherwise be performed by employees
- Students may start earning hours after their grade 8 graduation Those hours need pre-approval by Guidance before the student begins!




COVID 19 Protocols & Daily Screening

On a daily basis, students and their parents are responsible to review and adhere to the COVID-19 School Screening Tool. Symptoms of COVID-19 include:

- Fever
- New or Worsening Cough
- Shortness of Breath
- Sore Throat or Difficulty Swallowing
- Altered Taste or Smell
- •Nausea, Vomiting, Diarrhea, Abdominal Pain
- Runny Nose, Nasal Congestion

If you are feeling unwell or if you have any of the symptoms of COVID-19, please do not come to school, inform the school and get a test.

The use of a mask is not an acceptable measure to attend or remain at school for those who are symptomatic.



Daily Screening

Does your child or someone in your home have COVID-19 or symptoms of COVID-19?



Students and staff MUST stay home if:

- . They are sick even if symptoms are mild
- They are not fully vaccinated and a household member is sick with a symptom on the screening tool
- They are not fully vaccinated and a household member is COVID-19 positive or waiting for text results



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If your child starts to feel sick at school...

- Don't panic. It can happen.
- •Immediately let a staff member know that you are not feeling well.
- •If you are not with a teacher please go to the office and let them know.
- •There will be a space in the school (Isolation Room) where you can stay until someone can pick you up.



Face Coverings

If you are choosing to wear a mask:

- •Students are expected to provide their own face covering but school has some that we can supply until we run out of stock
- Masks are not to be shared
- Masks can be non-medical or cloth.
- •The use of a mask is not an acceptable measure to attend or remain at school for those who are symptomatic

HOW TO PUT ON A FACE MASK Cloth or non-medical face coverings are required inside all commercial establishments in York Region. Just as you cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze, wearing a mask provides an extra layer of protection to others. Medical and surgical masks, including N95 respirators, should be saved for our front-line health professionals. Do not touch the front of the HOW TO REMOVE YOUR MASK Do not touch the front of your mask to remove it Remove the elastic loops of the mask from water for at least 20 seconds or use around your ears or until the strings from alcohol-based hand sanitizer. behind your head. If you are wearing a disposable Wash your hands with soap and water for mask hold only the loops or strings at least 20 seconds or use alcohol-based and place the mark in a garbage bin hand sanitizer after taking the mask off and lined with plastic. Cloth masks. disposing of it or throwing in the laundry. should be washed after each use A few tips to keep in mind . Ensure the right side of the mask is facing outwards. . Do not leave any discarded masks in places where others. can come in contact with them such as shopping carts, . Do not share masks. Do not reuse single-use masks. bus stops, or on the ground . Do not use masks on children under the age of 2, anyone . Wearing a non-medical mask is NOT a replacement for who has trouble breathing or is unable to remove the mask physical distancing. Keep a 2-metre distance whenever without assistance possible to help stop the spread of COVID-19 · Replace a disposable mask once it becomes damp or soiled. Wash a cloth mask in the laundry after each use

Hand Washing & Sanitizing

Students are to wash hands using soap and water or use hand sanitizer immediately before:

- leaving home,
- •leaving the classroom,
- eating, touching one's face
- •leaving school.

Students are to wash hands or use hand sanitizer immediately after:

- arriving at school/entering the classroom,
- •finishing lunch,
- touching shared objects,
- using the bathroom,
- coughing, sneezing, and blowing one's nose,
- arriving at home.

A hand sanitizing station will be placed in the front lobby of the school and in classrooms. It is recommended that students not bring their own hand sanitizer to school for issues of quality, fragrance and management of potential hazards.
