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### **Self-Screening process**

We are looking forward to seeing everyone on Tuesday morning! Please ensure you complete the self-screen process every day before coming to school. You will enter the school through the front doors **only**. Line up outside, ensuring you are physically distancing from each other. An administrator will be checking that you have completed the self-screening tool upon entry to the building. Please review the steps below.

- 1. Secondary students to complete on-line self-assessment COVID-19 School and Child Screen Tool prior to entering the school on a daily basis.
- **2. Upon completion of the self-assessment**, complete response to the question: "Have you completed the self-screening test?" in the Confirmation Form.
  - Student receives an email response when they respond "Yes".
- **3. Upon entering through the school designated entrances**, student to provide confirmation of completion of the self-screening by way of: show email response to staff by way of:
  - On phone email or picture of email from their computer
  - Hard copy print of email.
  - If neither option is available, they can provide verbal response confirming completion
- 4. Supervising staff member checks with students upon entry.
  - Students who indicate they "did not" complete the self-assessment are to be directed to the posted COVID-19 School and Child-Care Screening tool to review the questions and provide verbal response to staff member
  - if "no" to all, direct to class, or
  - if "yes" to any, direct to the designated isolation room for pickup and will be advised to attend an assessment center.
  - The Administration will be notified of any students who refuse to complete the self-assessment

### **Dismantling Anti-Black Racism Strategy Launch Event**

The York Region District School Board is committed to championing equity and inclusivity. In response to continued evidence of anti-Black racism in Canadian institutions, including in education, the Board has co-developed an <u>anti-Black racism strategy</u>.

The Dismantling Anti-Black Racism Strategy: Creating anti-racist and Black-affirming learning and working environments was co-developed by York Region Black community leaders, YRDSB staff and in consultation with students. The launch of the strategy marks a coordinated effort to address anti-Black racism at the Board.

On March 8, 2021 from 5 p.m. - 7 p.m. students, staff and families are invited to the virtual <u>Dismantling Anti-Black Racism Strategy launch event</u> featuring guest presenter <u>Robyn Maynard</u>.

The program will examine anti-Black racism in educational institutions and unveil the Board's strategy. The strategy is designed to dismantle anti-Black racism in all its forms in our schools and workplaces.

The systemic nature of anti-Black racism requires that school boards act proactively to support equitable access to quality education and opportunities for all students, and to challenge the marginalization of Black students, staff and families.

We are committed to ensuring that this strategy is more than a piece of paper and are committed to doing the work to create more equitable learning environments.

I also want to acknowledge that February is Black History Month, and while we take this opportunity to highlight and celebrate the incredible contributions made by Black Canadians, we will also be looking forward to launching our Dismantling Anti-Black Racism Strategy.
