








Dance



Family Studies



Welcome to Family Studies

Hello UHS! Check out what Family Studies has been up to this past school year. With so many hands-on courses offering real-world life skills, students were able to show their personal style and flare in unique and inspiring ways.

Grade 9 - (HIF) Exploring Family Studies

Classes practiced their sewing and embroidery skills and made stuffed sock monkeys and felt stuffed animals. The Grade 9s also learned all about shopping on a budget and were able to make delicious meals for 4 all for under \$20.




Grade 10 - (HFN) Food and Nutrition

Students made some delicious chocolate chip cookies as well as beef tacos, mini cheesecakes and pancakes with real whipped cream. They completed a "Meal at Home" assignment where they were able to plan, shop and prepare an entire meal for their loved ones. They made sure that their meals were nutritious, delicious and all made from scratch. Parents and guardians were so pleased with the results! The Grade 10s were part of an Iron Chef competition where they showcased a 'secret ingredient' and made tasty bites for our teacher judges. Congratulations to the winners!



Grade 11 - (HFC) Food and Culture

Classes explored foods of the world and made dishes from Europe, Asia, Africa, the Caribbean, and Latin America. Chef Candace from Candace's Catering joined us for the day and worked with 3 HFC classes who made bison meatballs, wild rice and strawberry juice as part of the 'Food From This Land' unit.



Grade 11 - (HPW) Working with Infants and Young Children

Students started the semester off with an exploration of the theories associated with child development. Later in the semester the class participated in a sleep study that included a sleep lab. Outside of the classroom we investigated the importance of play and the students were given the opportunity to experience and evaluate through participation in movement activities. Finally, we also got the chance to put our culinary skills to the test and complete a full food lab centered around baking nutritious snacks for young children.

Grade 12 - (HFA) Nutrition and Health

Grade 12 students learned about how to make healthier food choices by examining and questioning existing big food and big farming rhetoric. They learned about the nutritional needs throughout the life cycle stages. They were also able to expand their culinary skills throughout the course during food labs that included a vegetarian lab, animal protein and fats labs. For their culminating cooking projects - each homemade, from scratch dish - was carefully chosen to provide maximum nutrition while highlighting a specific nutrient.



Grade 12 - (HNB) The World of Fashion

Students expanded their sewing skills, making fashion items such as tote bags and hoodies. Each one a work of art - stylish and functional! The students also created a bulletin board with their thoughts and ideas on what fashion means to them. Their inclusive and personal responses showed that fashion is not just a great way to express oneself but also a way to demonstrate our uniqueness and build confidence. 


Grade 12 - (HHS) Individuals and Families in Canada

Classes explored how different agents of socialization (i.e. family, friends, media, government, school) impact their values, beliefs and overall development. We took a deep dive into this phenomenon by examining how celebrity culture can create severely negative outcomes for those in Hollywood. We also got real and honest about what qualities we look for in our "significant other" through exploring relationship and mate attraction theories. Lastly, we examined the components of healthy and unhealthy romantic relationships as well as parent-child relationships in order to prepare us for a smooth and relatively harmonious entrance into adulthood.

Grade 12 - (HHG) Human Development Throughout the Lifespan

Classes learned about changes and challenges throughout the lifespan. A course highlight was using new understandings of brain science to deepen connections with those in our lives. Another highlight was the emphasis placed on learning about resources and strategies to build resilience. Students journaled almost daily, tried yoga, meditated and sourced books and podcasts that celebrate human strength and perseverance.

Geography

The 2022-2023 calendar year has been an exciting one for the Geography department. Teachers have been working hard throughout the year to create new teaching materials for the de-streamed program. Students have been busy designing cities using urban design techniques, understanding natural resource principles, breaking down Canadian demographic information, and building critical research analysis skills. It has been a great semester for students who are honing their skills to become lifelong learners.

History & Social Science



As the year draws to a close we have many achievements to celebrate across our classes. Our Grade 10 history classes were excited to be able to visit the Ontario Science Centre this past semester as part of a new unit on the history of Canadian science, technology and innovation. The Ontario Science Centre hosted a traveling exhibition called Indigenous Ingenuity: An Interactive Adventure which focused on the history and contribution of First Nations, Métis and Inuit science and technology in Canada.

A special shout out to Mrs. Donaldson for coordinating this trip, and to our amazing teaching team Ms. Damji, Ms. Fong, Ms. Wu, Ms. Teh and Mr. Wang for pulling together this unique learning experience for our students.

Our grade 10 history team continues to look for innovative ways to bring history to life for students. We also hosted "hands on history" outreach kits from the Canadian Museum of History both semesters. Students were able to investigate Canada's contributions to both World Wars by working with reproduction artifacts from these eras. Thanks to Mrs. Damji for facilitating the arrival of these very engaging learning kits!

Students got to try on reproduction uniforms learning about Canadian experiences while at war.

Thanks to Mr. Struk and Mr. Cash, our law classes were able to participate in a variety of experiential learning opportunities, too! Through mock trial competitions and guest speakers, and a visit to the Ontario Courts, our Grade 11 and 12 students were able to understand Canada's legal system and what it looks like in action.

Volunteers from Ms. Faulkner's philosophy class were privileged to work on an interdisciplinary project with the Visual Art Department in partnership with ALPHA Education and under the leadership of Mr. Clodd, to create works of art for the exhibition "Voices Unheard" that will be on display in Fall 2023. This grant based project is designed to build knowledge about the impact of racism on youth and to celebrate the lived experiences of our students. More details to come.

As we prepare to wrap up the school year, we are already planning to create even more engaging learning opportunities for students in all our humanities courses.

Library

It was wonderful to see the Library return to its usual hive of activity this year. The **UHS Library Learning Commons** provides our school community with a beautiful and welcoming place to read, work, and collaborate.

This year the Library hosted Coding and Chemistry contests, EQAO and OSSLT tests, grad photos and gown distribution, Guidance presentations, an ESSAC meeting, and guest speakers for Careers, Co-op, Law, SHSM, and the Black Excellence Club. Additionally, each period of the day saw upwards of 130 students spend their spare or lunch in the Library.

The Library Learning Commons also supported access to quality information through a variety of print and digital sources. Teacher-Librarians regularly supported students by teaching lessons targeted to their assignments. During an average month the Teacher-Librarians collaborated with more than 40 different classes.

This year the Library staff supported students researching a wide variety of topics. We helped students to learn about Indigenous activism, treaty rights, ecology issues, household toxins, social justice, Canada's natural resources, Indigenous entrepreneurship, sociology issues, French artists from Africa and Asia, and modern Scientists, to name just a few of the areas researched this year.

When it comes to research, UHS students know that the library's databases are a reliable way to research online. This school year, they conducted 97,292 GALE database searches. In the EBSCO databases, some of our student's top search terms this year included the following:

Students are also accessing books to support their learning. UHS patrons borrowed 1,445 books this year, excluding renewals. Of those checkouts, 632 were non-fiction. The UHS community also loves to read for pleasure, as fiction titles accounted for 56% of the total books borrowed.

To continue reading this summer take advantage of Sora, the YRDSB's online reading platform. Sora has many great fiction and non-fiction titles, as both ebooks and audiobooks. Students sign in to Sora using 0+ their student number. You may sign in to SORA here.

Math


