Dear families,

The safety of our students remains one of our top priorities. As part of our efforts to ensure the safety of the students in our care, in the 2019-2020 school year, we will be introducing a new communications system that will send text messages to parents/guardians for emergency purposes only.

- Our safe arrivals program is in place so we can account for the whereabouts of absent students. If you have not informed the school of your child's absence in advance, the school will take steps to ensure your child is safe. This includes sending an automated text message to parents/guardians to confirm the child's whereabouts if we cannot reach you by phone.
- 2. Earlier in the year, we informed you that there may be rare occasions when emergency severe winter weather events occur and we need to close schools and Board locations. This is different from bus cancellations on inclement weather days, when schools are kept open. In our efforts to ensure that families are notified if there are closures, parents/guardians will receive a text notification. This is in addition to providing notification through Board and school websites, social media and local media.

Parents/guardians will only receive text messages for these two scenarios, and will have the ability to opt out of receiving text messages should they choose. Additional information will be shared with families in the fall, including how to opt out and how to ensure your child's school has the correct contact information.

Thank you for partnering with us to ensure we are providing a safe, caring and welcoming environment for all of our students.

School Highlights

Here are some highlights from different departments of our school for this year.

Arts Department-Drama

DRAMA went for it again, with a huge variety of shows and performances!!!



The core drama presented explored *The Anger of Ernest and Ernestine*, improv and Greek theatre all in one semester.

The grade 9's performed in Alchemy, bringing student voice to the show, while also exploring mask and movement. In May they also presented *Antigone*, performing outside for other classes.

The grade 10's ended their year with an adaptation of Mark Haddon's book *A Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* we called *"The Many Minds of Christopher"*, presented in room 106. It was a massive undertaking successfully performed by all.

The grade 11's performed *No Exit* by Sartre, a huge piece of theatre, performed at the highest levels. Sets costumes, direction all by the students. Bravo!

e grade 12's ended the year with original theatre, a huge range of comedy and drama by the grads. Amazing what they accomplished, innovative and creative! We wish them all the best in the future.

Arts Department-Visual Arts

Second semester proved to be busy and productive for all students and staff in our Visual Arts Department! The Arts Unionville collaborative, Alchemy, held at the Flato Markham Theatre, was an exciting beginning to second semester. Arts Unionville students from the visual arts, music and dance programs had the unique opportunity to collaborate with Anishinaabe artists Aqua Nibii Waawaaskone on a performance highlighting our murdered and missing Indigenous women and girls. The learning for students and staff was powerful. The entire Alchemy show was well received and established a framework for future collaborative productions.

The city of Markham commissioned vinyl traffic box wraps pertaining to the theme of Talent and Technology. The grade 12 AU class and the STEAM club was successful navigated this challenging design challenge resulting in four selected designs to be fabricated and installed. The designs will be installed during the summer month in various locations throughout the city of Markham.

The grade 12 AU class is finishing up a 120' mural for the temporary hoarding located in front of the Stiver House on Unionville Main Street. The mural is commissioned by Ledgemark Homes and Ward 3 Councillor McAlpine. The mural depicts out connection to the environment and those technologies required to affect positive ecological change in our communities. The mural is designed to be Instagramable. It is hoped that individuals will spread the message via social media. The mural will be installed by late July. An official unveiling will be held shortly after to recognize the student's contributions.

The grade 10 Arts Unionville students again participated in the Memory Project. Students, let by Ms. Gardham, created and donated portraits to 28 youth from Peru who have faced substantial challenges such as neglect, abuse, the loss of their parents or extreme poverty. Youth in challenging situations often have few personal items, the portraits provided the children with meaningful mementos. Unionville H.S. is one of five Ontario schools participating in the Memory Project this year. The project allows students to develop empathy and global awareness while enhancing their portraiture skills.

The Seven Grandfather Teachings public sculpture project will conclude this summer. The seven large woodcarvings codesigned by UHS students, Self-Identified Indigenous students from throughout YRDSB and consulting Anishinaabe artist Donald Chrétien will be installed on the grounds of the newly build Aaniin Community Centre. An unveiling ceremony will talk place in first semester.

On behalf of the Visual Arts dept. we wish to thank parents and guardians for their support and encouragement in all of our department's artistic endeavours throughout the school year. We hope everyone has a safe summer full of creative adventures. We look forward to your continued support next year.



Canadian and World Studies

Thank you to our teachers this year; Mr. Triantopoulos, Mrs. Difrancesco, Mr. Pan, Mr. Tam and Mrs. Rass. A warm welcome to **Mr. Michael Johnston** who will be the new department head in September as Mrs. Rass will be moving to Markham District High School.

We started the year by welcoming **Aqua Nibii Waawaaskone** in our **Grade 9 Geography** classes for a special workshop! Aqua is a Toronto based singer, songwriter, storyteller and activist of Ojibwe Métis with French and Scottish heritage. Through traditional indigenous teachings and songs we learned that **water is sacred**, "water is life and water is medicine". Students were also given the opportunity to participate in a sage **smudging ceremony**.





In the first semester the **Grade 12 World Issues** class learned about issues that relate to the **United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.** We had a field trip to **York University's** "Change your World" conference hosted by the Faculty of Environmental Sciences. **Students were able to choose workshops** offered by a variety of community partners and non-governmental organizations and were able to experience a day at University through a variety of seminar type workshops and lectures.

We are proud to say that we are running the **Grade 12 World Issues** for the **2019-2020 school year!** We look forward to **INNOVATING** solutions with our graduating class that will help solve issues that relate to equity and sustainability around the world!

During second semester the **Grade 11 Physical Geography - Forces of Nature** class went on our 2nd annual river study field trip! This year we decided to choose a new location accessible by public transit - Milne Dam Conservation Area! Students spent the morning learning how **Benthic Macroinvertebrates** (organisms that live in the bottom of a river) and physical and chemical water monitoring like **turbidity**, **temperature**, **dissolved oxygen** and **acidity** help us understand the health of a river. The evidence we gathered helped us make conclusions about **FLOODING**, our most common local natural disaster and how **URBAN DEVELOPMENT** can impact our ecosystems, river systems and drinking water!



It is hard to believe another school year has come to an end! Our students continue to take advantage of our newly designed resource room for extra support and a quiet place to work. Both the resource room and classroom have been **redesigned** (using plans students' created) to be more welcoming workspaces.

Our grades nines have adjusted well to life in high school and continue to work in a positive and cooperative manner with our support staff and special education resource teachers. Many of our students have developed good self advocacy skills.

The grade tens participated in inquiry based learning including preparing for the Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test, while the grade elevens researched their course selections for grade 12 and also began planning ahead for their transition from high school. In grade twelve the students were given direction and guidance in researching choices of universities, colleges and the work place. They also had support in completing their applications and resumes. In addition they were directed to apply for OSAP and to contact the Post Secondary Institution where they have accepted an offer in order to connect with the support services to find out what accommodations they can receive and what documentation they need to provide.

Sidestreets: Novel Study - Author Visit By John Choi

Ms. Caufield's grade 10 Learning Strategies classes completed a Novel Study using a series of Novels from Side-Streets. "SideStreets are edgy, fast-paced novels that combine real-world themes and believable characters to make for short, heart-stopping books — sure to engage the most reluctant reader".

At the end of the novel study Grade 10 students had the opportunity to meet one of the Sidestreets Novel authors, John Choi. John Choi wrote "Dark Side" a novel about Emerson, a boy who finds himself in trouble, is dealing with pressures to succeed from his parents, as well as his mental health.

OSSLT Preparation

This year within the grade 9 and 10 Learning Strategies courses students began to prepare for the OSSLT. Grade 10 and previously eligible students wrote the test in March, and we had a highly successful group in Special Education this year. Overall results for the school will be released in the fall.

We look forward to continuing our journey together in the following school year and wish our graduating students all the best in their future endeavors.



Second Semester PEAK East - Pathway to Education and Applied Knowledge - The

P.E.A.K East Program had another successful year. Our students worked in a total of 14 community work placements throughout the school year. This year we have 7 graduates. One has obtained full-time paid employment, three will be attending college, one is pursuing college, one will be working part-time and volunteering, as well as attending courses with Community Living, and one will be attending the Learning Academy part-time, volunteering and also be taking courses with Community Living.

To enhance their overall learning experience in the P.E.A.K East Program, students participated in a multitude of community events and programs including the Markham Fair, three Marketplace courses with Community Living (Social Connections, Creative Problem Solving and Fitness at the YMCA), the Community Safety Village, Apple Workshop at Markville Mall, the Meet and Greet(current students host an orientation for new P.E.A.K students), the Blue Jays Game on Students Day, as well as the 6th Annual P.E.A.K Bowling Tournament, where all four P.E.A.K Programs throughout the YRDSB get together to socialize and compete in a friendly, end of year celebration.
