# **Library**

The reopening of the UHS Library Learning Commons this school year has been a welcome development for students and staff alike.

The <u>Library Learning Commons</u> provides our school community with a beautiful and functional place to read, work, and collaborate in addition to supporting access to quality information through a variety of print and digital sources. Teacher-Librarians regularly host classes to support their work with lessons targeted to their assignments.

UHS students know that the library's databases are a reliable way to research online. This school year, they conducted 39,456 GALE database searches. In the EBSCO databases, some of our school's top search terms this year included the following:



Students are also accessing books to support their learning. This school year saw 1,730 checkouts, with non-fiction books accounting for 41% of total books borrowed. The UHS community also loves to read for pleasure, evident in the 1,026 works of fiction checked out between September and June.

To continue reading this summer, take advantage of Sora, which is the YRDSB's online reading platform. Many great fiction and non-fiction titles are available through Sora, and there is often a shorter waiting list there than through a public library. 

# **Science**

As always, we have worked hard to deliver an engaging and challenging curriculum to all of our students in the Science this year, both in-person and on-line. Our hands-on lab activities have been up and running once again and we look forward to upholding that tradition in 2022-23.

Congratulations to all of our participants in the University of Waterloo chemistry contests this year. For the Avogadro grade 11 contest, three of our students placed among the top 200 students in Canada: Jasmine Ran, Karen Zhu and a special mention of Ruimian Zheng who placed 86<sup>th</sup> in Canada out of 2290 participants. For the grade 12 Chem 13 News contest, Benjamin Zeng placed 7<sup>th</sup> in Markham out of 27 participants and Anya Guo placed 62<sup>nd</sup> in Canada out of 885 participants. Well done, chemists!

Ms. Wong and Mr. Chan invited our SHSM students to participate in an "Agar Art" event in which students learned sterile technique and designed with phosphorescent bacteria. What fun to combine biology, technology and creativity!





Our grade 10 STEM students participated in a hands-on cross-curricular day delving into a little botany and its indigenous connections along with some coding applications. We hope to stimulate some future IT experts along with some green thumbs!





Yifei Wang, Rachael Harper and team did a fantastic job running our Science Club this year. A standing room only crowd enjoyed on Wednesdays after school, a fascinating dive into the wonderful world of science.



#### Math

We in the Math Department have learned many new things in the 2021-22 school year. We have explored many ways in which technology can improve the way we teach and learn, and have used our collective imagination, creativity 2sin<sup>3</sup>52°= and technology skills in order to design fun and engaging math lessons for our

students. More importantly, we have seen first-hand the enormous impact that a caring adult can have on the well-being of our students. This year has underscored the importance of human connection and community, something we shall never take for granted going forward.

We ran four Waterloo Math Competitions this year, Pascal, Cayley, Fermat, and Euclid, for students in grades 9 through 12, respectively. Club members had the opportunity to work together, share ideas, and explore creative approaches to solve challenging math problems. # **English**



Despite the extremely challenging circumstances of this school year, UHS students demonstrated that they are capable of deep learning and rich critical thinking, regardless of the situations they find themselves within. Please take a look at some of the learning and work that they got up to this term!

#### Media

Our Grade 9's finished their respective terms by working on their "Messed Up Ads" analyses. After learning about foundational media literacy concepts, as well as conventional advertising techniques, our Grade 9's dove into analysing print, television, and web ads that contained some type of problematic messaging, usually connected to discrimination and/or implicit biases. The Grade 9 crew worked to not only analyse the ads to identify these messages, but taught one another about them via group presentations. They also made sure to offer each other "actions for change", recognizing that being a critical reader of media is inherently tied to a responsibility to be a critical communicator about how we make our media "work better" for all!

The Grade 10 students took their media learning in a different direction. Our Grade 10's did a deep dive into a specific medium of communication - podcasting - that serves as evidence for that old maxim, "What's old is made new again!" Studying conventions first made popular via radio broadcasting, now repopularized, as well as remixed, within the world of podcasting, our Grade 10s actually learned how to create and publish their own podcasts.

At the senior level, our Grade 11 thinkers and learners excitedly engaged in learning about what filmmakers consider when trying to impact an audience. Similar to what our Grade 10's did with podcasting, our Grade 11s studied the conventions of filmmaking in order to position themselves to engage in their own creation. Ranging from short film remixes of popular productions to original films that tie into current socio-political issues, our Grade 11 filmmakers proved that they can communicate via multiple modes.

Last, but certainly not least, our Grade 12 students dug meaningfully into various schools of literary criticism. They demonstrated their learning around these schools and what comprises them via formal academic writing, group seminar discussions, novel study analysis, and the writing of a "feature article". We are confident that our Grade 12 graduates are leaving UHS with the critical thinking skills required to understand the texts they encounter in sophisticated and nuanced ways, and to make the world a better place for all who happen to walk upon it!

We sincerely hope that this offers some insight into the deep learning that continued to be offered, and the deep understandings that continued to be achieved, while we traversed various models of learning this school year. Have a wonderful summer and stay safe!

# Co-Op

Co-operative Education provides an experiential learning opportunity for students to **earn high school credits** and gain valuable experience by exploring a potential career choice. Students can earn 2 or 4 credits!

This semester, Unionville High School students explored careers in a wide variety of occupational areas including: physiotherapy, chiropractic care, automotive service, accounting and finance, teaching, pharmacy, public relations, graphic design, web design and digital media, medicine and related health care professions, veterinarian and animal care, computer programming, app development, IT and networking, early childhood education, marketing, digital marketing, video production, event planning, and real estate.




# **Communications Technology**

Grade 10 Communications Technology students learned about and applied the design principles, colour theory, typography and creating vector graphics. They worked through the Design Process and used Adobe Illustrator to create a Google Doodle with a focus on Self Care.



Gr. 10 Communications Technology students learned about the elements of photography composition and the exposure triangle. They shot many unique photos using a DSLR camera in manual mode.



Gr. 11 Communications Technology students learned about visual design and more advanced techniques in Adobe Illustrator. They utilized the Design Process to create a poster to promote technology and skilled trade careers with a focus on diversity and inclusion.





Gr. 11 Communications Technology students learned about publication design and combined their skills in photography, graphic design and desktop publishing to create a magazine. Each design includes a front and back cover, as well as a 2-page spread. Students used professional design programs in this project, including Adobe Illustrator, Adobe Photoshop, Adobe InDesign and Adobe Acrobat to create a press-ready file.

Gr. 12 Communications Technology students worked in small groups to create a 3-5 minutes short film. They collaborated closely with their peers in all stages of


the design process including brainstorming, storyboarding, filming and post production video-editing.








# **Drama**



Theatre is immediate, evolving and always different. The 2021/22 Arts Unionville drama year leveraged these constructs of theatre into a student centered exploration of setting through neighbourhoods and worlds.

Grade 9 AU Drama shared an original contact improvisation piece using only mime, sounds and music to create a view of the universe for AU grade 12 mentors as audience in Studio

106. Theatre history jumped off the page in group seminars researched, written, directed, produced and performed by students who transformed classrooms with learned stage conventions that involved fantastic attention to detail in audience interaction. A final culminating piece in Alchemy 2022 at Flato Theatre staged poetry in a choralization through movement exploring identity and equity in education with the poem "About School".

Duality of character was the starting point for AU Drama Grade 10s and led to further study of animals as inspiration for character. A"voice over" audio script was created and shared after research of animal habitat and traits of "spirit animals" chosen by students. An investigation into the importance of intuition started with legendary Native American Wesegachuk in an investigation of the roots of comedy. Our Clown unit sharpened the lens on relationship to audience and introduced students to Canadian clown pioneer Richard Pochinko technique. A final workshop of script analysis and acting intentions was produced in a workshop for the audience in Studio 106 of Edward Albee's *Zoo Story* for the public. This production marked the 10s first for since joining Arts Unionville and was delivered with great success!

Acting techniques and intentions were further developed in the AU Drama grade 11 year and an exploration of what makes theatre - *theatre*? Students were exposed to classic body and voice exercises to increase connection of *impulse* and served to inspire a student view of performance that entails warm-ups, characterization and script analysis. Shakespearean sonnets offered a taste of the universality of classic text and focused relevance of authenticity in acting. Breath and body work further manifested into Vocal Masque and offered students a chance to direct their own work in an effort to showcase learning throughout both semesters.

Wrapping up their final year, AU Grade 12s created a simulated "Kinark" experience for their leadership piece in the small auditorium welcoming grade 9s to the program in Pirate theme. A big shout out to the Phys-Ed Department for allowing us to share space! A playwriting unit introduced 12s to individual voices and the constructs of playwriting at the start of year and brought all efforts to stage with final productions. AU 12s opened our drama department theatre season with John Cariani's "Almost, Maine" and ending with excerpts from student playwriting works. Every detail was managed with great efficiency from tech to tickets to and programs to poster! BRAVO!!

#### **Dance**

The UHS Dance Department would love to share some of our highlights from this year! What a year it's been!

We welcomed guest artists for in class workshops offering students insight and experience in various genres of dance as well as an opportunity to work with professional dance artists within our community. We would like to thank the following guests for sharing in their knowledge, artistry, and expertise: Jade Whitney, contemporary; Queenie Seguban, hip hop; Tracee Smith; Indigenous workshop; Chantelle Good,



contemporary; Ria Aikat, Bollywood; Lua Shayenne, African; Alex Pollard, Jazz Funk.

Our grade 9 AU Dance students participated in a unit pertaining to Indigenous Storytelling and worked in partnership with the Native Studies class to create original work inspired by Indigenous stories. They learned from Tracee Smith, a Cree artist who shared her work relating to her founded charity "Outside"

Looking In"; an incredible program for Indigenous high school students to participate in and we learned further about the role dance plays within their experience.

In the latter part of semester 2, all focus was on preparing for the big step in returning to the theatre. We were fortunate enough to produce our annual "Alchemy" performance on May 10th and "Dance Highlights Returns" performance on May 11th at Flato Markham Theatre. What a wonderful opportunity this was to come together as a department, with a shared goal, and perform for a live audience once again. The dancers put so much energy into developing quality performance works and the results were outstanding. A true reminder of the power of dance in bringing communities together!

Congratulations to everyone and thank you for your perseverance, determination, artistry, and dedication.



For our "Alchemy" performance on May 10th, we worked alongside other arts disciplines as we collaborated to create original work. It was great to be reminded of and, for some, learn about, the talent we have access to within our artistic community at UHS. Thank you to all the incredible artists who we had the opportunity to work with. Looking forward to more collaborative work next year!

On June 2nd, we were able to take our first field trip in more than 2 years and although just up the road, it did not disappoint. Our excursion to Main St. Unionville provided the full dance department a chance to connect, to work alongside one another, to collaborate with photography students, and to challenge their creative thinking using physical space and boundaries to capture dance on camera as well as film. Over our time during covid learning, without an outlet for live performance, a lot of our work had to be shared through digital media. It was clear that the dancers developed digital media experience over that time period, and it is exciting to see where it may take them!

As part of the curriculum, students learned: Programming (grade 10-Python, grades 11 & 12 – Java), Algorithm Design, Project Management, Overview of Computer Hardware, Inquiry Based Learning on topics in Computer Science, and explored the impact of computer technology on society.

Students at the school were offered the extra-curricular opportunities to be part of the Computer Club, which met weekly, where they learned: programming, app development, algorithm design; and also prepared for programming contests. # **History & Social Studies**

The History and Social Science Department was excited to welcome Carly Donaldson, Evan Mallin, Julia Fong and Michelle Teh to our team in September. We are a growing department that continues to develop innovative and challenging curricula for UHS students. Carly, Evan, Julia and Michelle have brought tremendous knowledge, experience and energy to our program and we are grateful to have them all with us next year!

We arrived back in September determined to respectfully acknowledge and help students understand the on-going trauma of the residential school system. To this end, a number of classes were able to join live online events hosted by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation honour Truth and Reconciliation Week and the first ever statutory holiday recognizing The National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, which is also called Orange Shirt Day. Led by Mr. Struk, our department has also offered Grade 10 Indigenous History for the last few years. This course enriches students' understanding of how Indigenous peoples across Canada have maintained distinctive identities and cultures through time in spite of genocidal colonial practices. Further, our focus on weaving



Indigenous ways of knowing through the curriculum included adding <u>Braiding Sweetgrass</u> by Robin Wall Kimmerer to Grade 12 Philosophy: Questions and Theories, with Ms. Donaldson.



The YRDSB as an organization has spent the last few years reflecting deeply on how historical school names often have difficult colonial histories of oppression that may still impact our students today. Recently renamed <a href="Hodan Nalayeh">Hodan Nalayeh</a>
<a href="Secondary School">Secondary School</a> and <a href="Nokiidaa Public School">Nokiidaa Public School</a> provide important conversations about the meaning of names. To this end, Ms. Damji and Ms. Faulkner participated in a board project developing learning materials for history classes to research the names of schools in their area and determine the significance of those names. This research will eventually be used to create a resource that provides a comprehensive history of each school name in the YRDSB. They worked with curriculum, equity and Indigenous education consultants, and the York Region Museum and Archives, to curate primary and secondary sources,

and learn how to interpret these sources. A visit from Curator Rebekah Mitchell and Educational Coordinator Christina Blake launched our inquiry!

Our Grade 11 and 12 Law classes resumed their ever-popular mock trials in person this semester. As Grade 11 student, Logan Chen (pictured here with Mr. Struk) explained, "For me, the mock trial is the ultimate way to build up one's (legal) ability since it requires not only a solid understanding of legislation, but also critical thinking skills to pick out flaws in logic within the materials given. Most importantly, participants (especially judges and lawyers) need to be able to jump out of the argument and see the

bigger picture and improvise on the spot." Thanks to Mr. Struk and Mr. Cash for ensuring authentic learning experiences for students in their inspiring senior law courses!

Finally, we wrapped up the year by participating in <u>Student Vote 2022</u> the provincial edition. Students from several history classes ran the election simulation, taking on roles as poll clerks and ensuring each voter followed election protocols. 
