Lunch is on UHS

Welcome to Semester 2 UHS!!

During the week of February 22 to February 26, 2022, we will be providing one free lunch to each in-person learner. In order to adhere to York Region's Public Health safety protocols, your brown bag lunch will be pre-packaged and delivered to you in your Period 2 class. All lunch options are nut/peanut free; however, they are not prepared in a nut-free facility. Although we would like to treat all our students to a free lunch, we will recognize and celebrate our remote students at an appropriate time when they return to in-person learning at UHS.

Please note that only students who complete the form will receive a free lunch. The form will close at 9:00 pm on Wednesday February 16, 2022.

Course Selection Information

Students can begin submitting their course selection starting on Wednesday February 16 at 9am and course selection will close on Friday February 25 at 4pm using My Pathway Planner. Please note this is not first come, first serve, so we ask that students carefully consider their course selections and consult with teachers, Guidance Counsellors and their parents/guardians prior to submitting. Once they submit their course, they are locked in.

To support students with the course selection process, the Guidance Department has put together pre-recorded presentations and PowerPoints for each grade. This past Thursday in Period 2 classes, students were provided time to view these presentations. They were also provided an enrolment key to a Google Classroom where they can revisit the presentation if required (enrolment key: us43vmc). These same presentation can also be accessed here, (select the left side bar tab: course selection).

In addition, to help students learn more about specific courses offered at UHS, departments have shared dates/times and google meet links for students to virtually meet with them. This link can be found on the google classroom (students must be logged into their GAPPS account).

Students who are graduating this year and not returning to UHS must select 'Not Returning' in my Pathway planner.

A new feature this year requires parents/guardians to approve their student's course selection. Upon submitting courses in My Pathway Planner, students will be required to enter in the email of a parent/guardian. Parents/guardians will have be able to view the student's course submissions and can either approve or reject the courses. Guidance Counsellors will be reviewing these submissions on a daily basis.

Should your student require support with course selection, please have them schedule an appointment in teach assist with their alpha Guidance Counsellor.

Dear Parents/Guardians,

As part of a partnership between YRDSB and Renewed Computer Technology (RCT), families with children enrolled in our Board have the opportunity to purchase quality-refurbished computers at a reduced cost. Applicants must live in Ontario, have a student enrolled at the school and either receive government assistance payments or qualify as a limited income earner under the limited income cut-off standards*.

Below is a limited income grid for your reference.

4 people	\$45,206

This year, there are different packages available for purchase. Please reference the RCT flyer for the current available package offerings. Please note that there are two options for delivery. If you would like the computer to be delivered directly to your home, there is a \$40 charge for laptops and a \$50 charge for desktops. Families who choose this delivery option will have their order shipped when it is ready. If you would like the device shipped to your child's school there is a \$20 delivery charge and you will need to wait to receive your computer until after the application period closes and it will be delivered to your child's school.

Parents and legal guardians may apply for one computer per student, with a limit of two per household. Please see below for a full list of device specifications.

If you are interested in applying, please complete an online application at https://form.jotform.com/210054491659255 using the group code on the attached program flyer. The application period is from February 8 - March 4, 2022 with delivery to schools taking place prior to the end of the school year.

Please note - There are sections in the RCT Online Application that are no longer applicable:

- Requirement of Proof or Documentation of Income
- Requirement to participate in training prior to receiving your computer/laptop

The Section on Course of Study can pertain to elementary or secondary. If you do not have access to a computer or the Internet, please contact the administration team at your school for assistance.

Accessing Online Classrooms

- Students will receive information from their classroom teacher outlining how to access their online classroom.
- Online Learning Platforms Resources for accessing and using Google Classroom and Brightspace/D2L can be found on the Board website in addition to other <u>family resources</u> and <u>student tools and resources</u>. If your child does not know their GAPPS login information, they can contact the teacher.
- **Technology** If your child requires technology to access remote learning, please contact the main office.

We appreciate that families have many questions. We will continue to share information with you, and work with you to support your child. Additional information is also available on the Board website, including health and safety measures, frequently asked questions and resources at www.yrdsb.ca/school-reopening.

We look forward to seeing our in-person and remote learners next week.

Report Cards

We hope this message finds you and your loved ones healthy and safe. York Region District School Board believes in the importance of assessment, evaluation and communication of student learning and achievement. They form the basis of an effective educational program.

Final reports are part of our ongoing communication to support student achievement and well-being. We hope that the final report will provide valuable feedback for your child while supporting conversations about learning at home. Your child's final semester one report card will be distributed between February 10 to February 14, 2022. These reports will be distributed using the same process used for mid-semester via student Board Google GAPPS accounts.

Thank you for supporting your child in adapting to the shift to remote learning and the subsequent return to in-person learning. We recognize that some students, staff and families may have concerns about student learning and achievement. Teachers continue to review all student assessment data and use their professional judgment to gather evidence of student achievement to support evaluation through the culminating days. Staff will continue to support and prioritize conversations with families and students and will take into account the effects of learning

model changes on student learning. To address concerns and to ensure that fair, valid and accurate assessment data is gathered, our semester schedule was designed to:

- provide students with equitable opportunities to demonstrate understanding in an in-person (face-to-face) and remote (online) setting
- provide increased support for student well-being and mental health
- provide increased opportunities for student success, and
- maintain fair, valid and accurate evaluation of student achievement

Student assessment is mandated by the provincial Ministry of Education. YRDSB has implemented several supports allowed by the Ministry to provide greater flexibility and opportunity for students, including:

- No formal exams are being held. Culminating days replaced formal exams.
- Culminating days allow students to complete culminating activities, engage in student-teacher conferencing, and engage in other activities that support student achievement and well-being.
- Flexibility was provided to teachers to change the weighting of the term (70%) and final evaluation (30%) of a course. This may result in various weighting such as 80/20, 90/10 or 100/0.
- In review of student data, teachers continue to exercise their professional judgment to gather
 evidence of student achievement for evaluation. As noted in <u>Growing Success</u>, a report card grade
 will involve teachers' professional judgement and interpretation of evidence and should reflect the
 student's most consistent level of achievement.
- Returning after the winter break provided additional challenges for students, families and staff. The
 later part of the semester, January 5 February 4, 2022, offers continued opportunities to improve
 student learning, the primary purpose of assessment and evaluation.
- Teachers continue to use their professional judgement to review students' achievement given the
 additional pressures school startup presented in 2022. Families are also encouraged to connect with
 their child's teacher directly about their challenges to ensure the teacher is aware and can address
 concerns.

Thank you again for helping keep our schools safe and open to in-person learning by screening your child/ren and encouraging them to follow the COVID-19 protocols. As always, student mental health supports are available regardless of the learning model. Please reach out to your school principal for assistance and mental health resources. We remain committed to supporting students and families as we continue to navigate the effects of the pandemic on student learning.

The Michael Smith Challenge - Science Competition

The Michael Smith Challenge is a national competition written by students in Grade 10 Science or lower. It emphasizes logical thinking and covers material in the Science curriculum common to all provinces. The challenge

fosters an appreciation of Science as a career for talented young people and promotes national excellence in STEM related fields.

This challenge will be a one-hour, timed contest to be started and completed on **Tuesday**, **February 15**, **2022**. Students will complete the challenge individually at home and not during school hours. The recommended time to complete the one-hour challenge is after 6:00 pm when school work has been completed for the day. The challenge will consist of eight timed sections of randomized questions on the following topics:

- Astronomy
- Earth Science
- Biology
- Physics
- Chemistry

Each question will be randomized in some fashion so that each student's set of questions will be unique.

The cost is \$6.18. Please pay using <u>School Cash Online</u> and complete the permission form by Wednesday February 9, 2022. Both are required to participate in the contest.

Dr. Brenda Wastasecoot, Assistant Professor of Indigenous Studies, Arts & Science Faculty at University of Toronto. Brenda is Ininu (Cree) and a member of the York Factory First Nation. She was raised in Churchill, Manitoba, in a little village known as The Flats. After studying and teaching at Brandon University in Brandon, Manitoba, she came to Toronto to do her PhD at OISE - Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. Her thesis dissertation tells the story of her family and the impacts of Indian Residential schools. "Showing and Telling the Story of Nikis; Arts Based, Auto-Ethnographic Journeying of a Cree Adult Educator."

Gen-Ling Chang is the deputy executive director with ALPHA Education committed to social justice, humanity and global peace; after she retired as associate director, Toronto District School Board. With years of experience on addressing the impact of systemic racism in policy and practice on individuals and communities, Gen-Ling continues to work with youth, educators, leaders, and communities on authentic inclusive participation, representation, and diversity.

Dr. Ann E. Lopez, is a professor of educational leadership and policy in the Department of Leadership, Higher and Adult Education, Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, University of Toronto. She is the Director of the Center for Leadership and Diversity and Provostial Advisor, Access Programs. Dr. Lopez is the immediate past president of the National Association for Multicultural Education (NAME). Her research and teaching focuses on antiracist education, school leadership across contexts, decolonizing and socially just leadership, issues of equity in education and schooling, and most recently developing concepts of what she describes as "ProLovePedagogy". Dr. Lopez has published several articles and written 5 books including her most recent book entitled Decolonizing Educational Leadership: Alternative Approach to Leading Schools. Dr. Lopez is co-Editor-In-Chief of the Journal of School Leadership, Co-Series Editor, Studies in Educational Administration, and the recipient of the 2020 Award for Distinguished Contributions to Teaching at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education.
