February 16th Reminders

We are looking forward to welcoming you back to school. Please read the following reminders so that you are prepared for the reopening of UHS.

Screening

As always, our primary concern is safety. Given the new directives from YRPH and the Ministry of Education, we need to make you aware of the items below that will take effect as of Tuesday, February 16:

- There will be ONLY TWO entrances to the school: Town Centre Blvd. (Main Entrance) and Warden (Cafeteria Entrance); the other entrances to the school will now be closed.
- Students may start entering the school as of 8:15 a.m.
- Students are required to complete the online self-assessment prior to entering the school on a daily basis: <u>COVID-19 School and Child-Care Screening Tool</u>.
- Upon completion of the self-assessment, they need to respond to the question "Have you completed the self-screening test?" in the Confirmation Form for which they will receive an email receipt.
- Upon entering the school, students will show staff the email on their phone or provide a printout. Alternatively, students can review a hard copy of the screening tool at the entrance and provide a verbal confirmation.

<u>Dismissal</u>

- We will continue with our staggered dismissal by grade commencing at 10:50 a.m.
- Students may exit from all five designated exits.

Returning Resources

Students who have textbooks, library books, technology, music instruments, and other YRDSB property from semester one can drop them off on their way into school on **Tuesday, February 16 and Wednesday, February 17**. There are two drop-off locations set up in the school: at the main entrance in our front foyer and in the atrium under the trees.

School Reopening Guidelines

On Wednesday, February 3, 2021 the Minister of Education announced schools in York Region will re-open for in-person learning on Tuesday, February 16, 2021. York Region Public Health reassures you it is safe to return to school. York Region District School Board and York Region Public Health are working closely together and taking all appropriate steps for the health, safety and well-being of our school community. This includes updating our screening guidance and implementing more stringent protocols.

Please visit <u>vork.ca/safeatschool</u> for up to date information on public health measures related to school reopening.

Updated Screening Guidance

Effective immediately, all students and staff are required to complete a <u>York Region Public Health school and</u> <u>child-care screening tool</u>. Daily confirmation of screening will be required for staff and secondary students.

Effective immediately:

- If a student or staff member has **ONE** symptom of COVID-19 they are required to stay home from school and child-care and get tested for COVID-19 at an Assessment Centre
- If anyone in a household has travelled outside of Canada, everyone must stay home from school and child-care until the 14-day quarantine period has finished, except for essential reasons
- If anyone in your household is sick and has not tested negative for COVID-19, or does not have an alternative diagnosis from a health-care provider, all others in the household must stay home from school and child-care until the results are known or an alternative diagnosis is provided
- If someone in the household is identified as a high-risk/close contact of a confirmed COVID-19 case, the whole household is required to stay home from school for the 14-day quarantine period, except for essential reasons.**

** Please note: Individuals in a dismissed cohort do not need to have the rest of their household stay home from school or child-care unless contacted by Public Health. Public Health will work with the affected school or child-care setting to identify individuals within cohorts that may be at increased risk of exposure to provide further direction.

Health and Safety Measures

As we have previously communicated, there are some new health and safety measures in place, including:

- Masks are now required for students in Grades 1-12. Students in kindergarten are strongly encouraged to wear masks.
- Masks are now required outdoors, during recess as well as common areas, in addition to in-class.
- Students are discouraged from congregating before and after school.
- York Region Public Health is recommending that students wear <u>three-layer masks</u>. Two layer masks are permitted if they are clean and fit appropriately.
- Families dropping off and picking up their children at school are reminded to wear masks and not congregate while on school property.
- Please continue to reinforce hand hygiene practices
- What happens if there is a case of COVID-19 in my child's class?

Any staff or children who have had close contact with a probable or confirmed COVID-19 case in a school will receive a letter from York Region Public Health advising them to stay at home for 14 days. Certain individuals may receive more instructions from Public Health if the investigation reveals the student/staff/essential visitor is at increased risk of exposure. These individuals will receive a phone call from Public Health to outline any additional requirements, including isolation of household contacts. The identity of any person who contracts COVID-19 is protected under privacy legislation and cannot be shared. You would want this same privacy if your family was affected. We remain committed to respecting the privacy of all students and staff.

Inclement Weather

Families are reminded that, in the event an inclement weather day is declared, schools will be closed to in-person learning and learning will take place remotely. Virtual School students are not affected by inclement weather days.

March Break

The <u>Minister of Education announced that the government would be **postponing the March Break to April 12-16**. This means that students in both virtual and in-class learning environments will continue to attend class through the previously scheduled break March 15-19.</u>

This decision was made by the government in an effort to reduce the spread of COVID-19 that the province saw following the winter break. The government continues to encourage families not to travel outside the country.

We appreciate that this may be disappointing for staff members and families, and recognize the importance of taking a well-earned break after the challenges of the past few months.

Semester One Report Cards

Report cards are part of the ongoing communication from our school to support student achievement and well-being. Distribution of your child's final report card for the first semester began on February 10, 2021. These reports are being distributed via student GAPPS accounts.

Our reports provide you with information about your child's achievement throughout the first semester. Of note is that this reporting period reflects learning that has occurred in a modified learning environment as required by the provincial public health guidelines. As a result, the rate of progress described on this report may differ from previous years due to the ongoing impact of COVID-19 on student learning. We hope that this report will provide valuable feedback for your child while supporting conversations about learning at home.

Attendance

As we begin Semester 2 and welcome students into their new classrooms, we are asking all families to continue to assist us to ensure that our attendance records are accurate. In order for us to provide appropriate supports for students and ensure that our class lists are accurate, it is important that we receive timely communication regarding all student absences in courses.

The following is taken from the <u>YRDSB Guide to the 2020-2021 School Year</u> (page 16):

Regular and punctual attendance affects school success and is expected of all students. It is important that students, families and school staff work together to ensure regular attendance.

Parents/guardians are expected to:

- Notify the school as soon as possible if their child will be absent or late.
- Provide medical documentation to confirm their child's illnesses if requested by the principal.
- Ensure the school is aware that they approve all absences from school.
- Provide a note for their child (under the age of 18 years) when they need to leave school early for an appointment.

We are required to document, with a reason, ALL student absences. Parents/guardians should contact us via email at <u>unionville.hs@yrdsb.ca</u> or call us at 905-479-2787 prior to 9 am in the morning regarding a student absence.

Students attending Secondary Virtual School (SVS) are required to follow SVS procedures for recording their attendance daily. Admin and Guidance at UHS will continue to work collaboratively with SVS staff to support our students who are learning virtually this year.

For any student over 18, they are responsible for reporting their own absences unless they have completed a <u>Consent Information Sharing For Students at the Age of Majority</u> form.

Michael Smith Challenge: Grade 9 and 10 Students

The <u>Michael Smith Challenge</u> is a national competition written by students in Grade 10 Science or lower. It emphasizes logical thinking and covers material in the science curriculum common to all provinces. The challenge fosters an appreciation of science as a career for talented young people and promotes national excellence in STEM related fields.

This challenge will be a one-hour, timed contest to be started and completed between 09:00-23:00 on **Wednesday**, **February 24**, **2021**. Students will complete the challenge individually at home and not during school hours. The recommended time to complete the one-hour challenge is after 18:00 when school work has been completed for the day. The challenge will consist of eight timed sections of randomized questions on the following topics:

Astronomy

Earth Science

Biology

Physics

Chemistry

Each question will be randomized in some fashion – mostly the numerical input – such that each student's set of questions will be unique.

Students may seek information during the contest from existing content in books or on the web, but may not seek assistance from another individual in person or remotely. If any contest questions are found to appear on social media platforms or on one of the many tutorial/homework help sites (e.g. chegg.com) the student associated with the question (which will have numerical parameters unique to each student) will be disqualified from the contest.

Black History Month Resources

Celebration of Black History Month has been a part of Canadian society since the 1950s. Lieutenant Governor Hal Jackman declared February as Black History Month in Ontario in 1993, and in 1995, the Honorable Jean Augustine made the same declaration in the House of Parliament in Ottawa. These declarations set the stage for acknowledging the contributions of Black people of African Heritage to the cultural, economic, political and social fabric of Canada dating back to the early 1600s. They have also increased our awareness that people of African and Caribbean Heritage are an integral part of Canadian history. During the month of February, we deliberately reflect upon the legacy of African history in all its diversity, and we join all Canadians in celebrating Black History Month. During this month we are able to appreciate the significance of African people in world history by centering people of African, Caribbean, and Canadian heritage, famous and not so famous, who have influenced the nation and the world through their ideas, words and actions.
