

#### **Learning Material Return Process**

Students and families may now arrange to safely return items that belong to the YRDSB (including textbooks, library books, musical instruments, etc.) on **February 1 and 2, 2021**. In order to schedule a time to drop off the materials at the school, please complete the following form:

#### <u>UHS Material Drop-off Appointment Schedule for February 1st and 2nd, 2021</u>

Each student will sign up for a time slot and will only be permitted entry during this pre-arranged date/time. Please note that arrangements for the distribution of textbooks and other learning materials for Semester 2 courses will be shared at a future time. If you have questions about the return process or are having difficulty making an appointment, please send an email to unionville.hs@yrdsb.ca.

Safety protocols will be in place as you enter the school building and will include the following:

- individuals must maintain physical distancing by staying two metres apart from anyone not from your household:
- wear a mask:
- use hand sanitizer as you enter and exit the building; (Anyone wearing gloves upon arrival will be asked to remove and discard them. Applying hand sanitizer to gloves is not considered an acceptable way of cleaning hands):
- use the designated entry/exit doors only;
- a self-screening must be conducted prior to entering the building;
- students must drop off items individually (with the exception of Community Class students). No additional family members will be allowed to enter the building during the assigned time slot;
- only the drop-off of learning materials is allowed at this time. Individuals are to leave the premises as soon as they have dropped off their learning materials;
- students will be directed to one central drop off area for returning items;
- there will be no access permitted to any other rooms or locations within the school (including washrooms and lockers).

Anyone entering the building is expected to wear a personal face covering to reduce the spread of respiratory droplets to protect others. For more information about how to use face coverings properly, visit <a href="https://www.york.ca/covid19">www.york.ca/covid19</a>. Masks and gloves will not be provided.

If you *are not* returning to a YRDSB school for Semester 2, you must also return all YRDSB technology (e.g. laptop, chromebook, etc.). All students are expected to return the following items which belong to the school:

- Library books
- Classroom supplies
- Musical instruments
- Textbooks
- Anything else that is property of the YRDSB

Our ultimate goal is to provide a safe and supportive process to allow for the return of school property. We thank you for your cooperation as we facilitate a safe and organized process.

#### **Student Timetables for Semester Two**

Students, parents and guardians should have received an electronic copy of the semester 2 timetable. Students are to check their GAPPS email account. Alternatively, students can also check Teach Assist for their timetable.

Please note, second semester timetables may have changed due to a significant number of courses being cancelled and the change from a 5 period day to a 4 period day. <u>Elective course changes are not possible</u>. Timetable changes can only be considered for students who require a change in pathway (i.e. changing course type from academic to

applied or vice versa) or for students who are in grade 12 and require a course to graduate or require a prerequisite for a post-secondary program. Additionally, students who were not successful in a semester 1 course may also be considered for a timetable change. Students must contact their alpha Guidance counsellor directly to discuss potential options.

#### For Students in the Adaptive Model at UHS

We hope this correspondence finds you healthy and safe. We wish to provide as much information as possible regarding the transition from Semester 1 to Semester 2. YRDSB continues to follow the direction of York Region Public Health and the Ministry of Education regarding COVID-19 safety. Unless otherwise instructed, school buildings will remain closed until February 10, 2021. We are currently preparing to transition into Semester 2.

Students will receive their Semester 2 Timetables prior to February 3. Additional information will follow.

In the afternoon, there are no classes scheduled.

#### Feb. 4 - 10: Current School Closure - All Classes Online

• For the duration of the school closure, we will follow a revised school schedule. Students will follow a semester schedule and will attend their classes online in 75 minute periods with a five minute break between the morning periods and between the afternoon periods as per the schedule below. School start and end times remain the same. An 80 minute lunch break will occur between period 2 and 3.

Period one: 8:30 am - 9:45 am

Break: 9:45 am - 9:50 am

Period two: 9:50 am - 11:05 am

Lunch: 11:05 am - 12:25 pm

Period three: 12:25 pm - 1:40 pm

Break: 1:40 pm - 1:45 pm

Period Four: 1:45 pm - 3:00 pm

This change is based on feedback from students and families about the 150 minute period students are currently experiencing.

Once schools reopen, the schedule will return to the adaptive model as used in the fall.

Dear families.

I hope that you and your families are healthy and doing well. I want to thank all of our students, families and staff members for their flexibility, patience and perseverance during the school closures. We understand that the pandemic is creating challenges and hardships, and we will continue to prioritize and do our very best to support the well-being, learning and achievement of our students during these difficult times.

#### Anti-Black Racism

We want each and every one of our students to know that they are valued, welcome, safe and respected in our schools. We know that sadly that is not the reality for some students and that incidents of anti-Black racism continue to occur in our community and our schools. These incidents cause pain, make our students feel unsafe and affect their well-being and achievement. This is not acceptable.



#### Winners of Real World Design Challenge - UHS Grade 11 STEM Team



Congratulations to **Daphne Cheng, Iris Lin, Julia Plester, Ethan Yu, and Anthony Qiu** in grade 11, and to their coach and teacher **Mr. Brian Cho**, on Winning the 2020/2021 Real World Design Challenge!

The purpose of this year's competition was to create a proposal for an Unmanned Aircraft System that could be used for package delivery. Their proposal included a CAD design of a UAS drone, overall system design, flight paths, and fail/safe measures.

These students are currently enrolled in the UHS STEM program and used their STEM experience in the creation of this collaborative project. These students have demonstrated a significant level of skill in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. They also demonstrated innovation by experimenting with the unfamiliar, challenging familiar processes and methods, pushing the limits of current team thinking and adapting or creating tools/processes to increase efficiencies in their design.

They now have the opportunity to build on their achievement and go even further by competing in the National/International Challenge. We are very proud of them!






