# Dismantling Anti-Black Racism: Student Videos and Lessons

YRDSB is committed to dismantling all forms of racism. To support this work, the Board is releasing two videos to affirm our commitment to anti-racism with emphasis initially being placed on anti-Black racism. <u>Video one is intended</u> for primary grades and video two is intended for junior to secondary grades. UHS teachers will show the secondary video to students prior to presenting a series of four lessons called "Our Actions Online Have Impact."

All incidents of anti-Black racism will be taken seriously, and it is expected that all must be reported, investigated and addressed. In response to ongoing anti-Black racism within Canadian educational institutions including the YRDSB, the Board, in collaboration with the community, has co-developed the <u>Dismantling Anti-Black Racism Strategy</u>. A core objective of this strategy is to "proactively...achieve the goal of 'education for all' and create schools free from racism...and to ensure equitable outcomes for Black students." This is achieved by "a coordinated effort" to dismantle anti-Black racism and engage in practices that affirm the Black identity. This includes the intentional creation of "anti-racist and Black-affirming learning and working environments in which Black students and staff can be their full-selves, contribute their best, and become their best selves."

It is imperative that we address and respond to all acts of racism, anti-Black racism, discrimination and hate experienced by students, staff or any member of our school communities. These videos and lessons have been created for all YRDSB students to clearly understand that discrimination and hateful acts and language including, but not limited to, racial slurs and racist jokes will not be tolerated. Schools will be required to respond and take action accordingly.

## Cap & Gown Orders - A Message for Graduating Students and their Families

As we approach spring, we want to update you on our planning for the year-end celebration of our graduating students for the 2020-2021 school year. This is an important milestone, and we look forward to recognizing the achievements of our graduates.

## Scheduling and Format:

We can confirm that our graduation celebration will still take place in June. However, due to the ongoing impact of the pandemic, we are unable to confirm what format the ceremony will take. Depending on the conditions in June, the ceremony could be a virtual celebratory event, an in/at-school smaller event or some form of hybrid event. Our priority continues to be the health and safety of our students, families and staff members. The format of our graduation ceremony in June will depend upon the direction and advice we receive from York Region Public Health. We want to assure you that we will continue to work with Public Health closely throughout the next few months, and we will

confirm our plans for graduation when we get closer to the month of June with a clearer understanding of what is feasible and safe.

Please note that students attending the Secondary Virtual School (SVS) will graduate with their homeschool peers.

# Graduation Photos:

Understanding the importance of being able to offer an opportunity for graduation photos, we are working with Public Health to establish a protocol which will ensure the safety of our students and staff in the process. Each school will work with their vendor to share the protocols as required by Public Health and determine how the photos may be facilitated on site. More information is forthcoming.

# Caps & Gowns:

While at this time we are unable to confirm if we can hold any kind of formal, in-person graduation ceremony, we understand that you may wish to purchase a cap and gown for family pictures, celebrations and as a memento. It is recognized that this decision is challenging with so many unknowns, but we wanted to ensure the opportunity to purchase a cap and gown was available to each student.

The cost of a cap and gown package is \$17 and includes a gown, cap with maroon tassel and silver year charm, and a V-stole in maroon. Once the graduation cap and gown packages are received by the school, students will be notified of the distribution model. We are working to arrange for graduation photos on site after delivery of these packages. More information is forthcoming. To order a cap and gown package, please visit School Cash Online. # Education Career Fair Student Event for Grade 10 & 11 Students

Dear Parents/Guardians:

Education Career Fair (ECF) events are national initiatives that provide grade10 and 11 students with the opportunity to engage in pathways planning for one day with exhibitors from Ontario: national post-secondary institutions, career training institutions, industry associations, local employers and volunteer/non-profit organizations. As suggested by the Premier's Highly Skilled Workforce Expert Panel Report, the ECF event will support students to begin planning their future career path by participating in seminars, engaging in one-on-one discussions with school recruiters and industry experts, and reflecting on their experience and learning in MyPathways Planner. Due to COVID restrictions, on **Thursday, March 25, 2021**, students will take part in virtual opportunities that will support them with pathways planning. The day will provide new, dynamic and engaging experiences delivered virtually by the Education Career Fair in partnership with the YRDSB Pathways Team, Curriculum and Instructional Services.

# Students will participate in a virtual education career fair event that features:

- A pre-fair day for students to see the opportunities available and plan their experience;
- Opportunities to connect with exhibitors, download brochures, live chat with representatives, watch videos and eniov virtual tours:
- Seminars from speakers on a multitude of topics such as paying for school to work/life balance: and.
- Information about volunteer opportunities.

# Students will be excused from classes if they choose to participate in some or all of the sessions. Parents/Guardians must complete this permission form in order for their child to participate in the Fair. Please be advised that there will be no teacher supervision for students who are participating in the event.

Parents/Guardians take full responsibility for their child, if they choose to participate in the Education Career Fair.

Parents/Guardians will need to complete a separate permission form for each of their children who are eligible to participate.

# **Registration Information**

Once parents/guardians complete the google permission form, they will receive information on how to register in the ECF platform. ECF will then send parents/guardians information on how students can access the event.

When students are scheduled to attend an ECF event, they will be asked to register.

At that point, the following data will be collected:

- First Name
- School Email Address
- Grade of study

The first name and school email address will only be used to send log-in information. This will allow the students to access the ECF events. Grade of study will only be used for ECF Management data records.

# ECF Privacy Policy

This privacy policy pledges the following:

- We do not use the personal information of K-12 students for any marketing or targeted advertising.
- We store all data for K-12 students on dedicated servers located in Canada.
- All data storage will be managed utilizing technical and administrative safeguards designed to protect against unauthorized access to, or disclosure or use of, such data and against reasonably anticipated third party threats to the security of such data.
- We do not sell information to third parties.
- We do not own personal information.
- All data will be wiped within (1) one month of completion of event interaction.

# **Report It**

Our schools should be safe, welcoming and inclusive places for everyone. It is important that students know what to do if they witness or experience inappropriate behaviour or incidents of hate or discrimination.

- There may be situations when you can safely step in and intervene and help.
- Talk to an adult at school, family member or other trusted adult.
- Report the event without the person involved knowing using our online reporting tool, Report It.

Report It lets you share information about inappropriate student behaviour or incidents of hate or discrimination. You can use the online form to report:

- bullying, drugs, cheating, vandalism, harassment, violence or any other inappropriate behaviour
- incidents of discrimination or hate, including anti-Indigenous racism, ableism, anti-Asian racism, anti-Black racism, antisemitism, classism, homophobia, Islamaphobia, sexism, transphobia or other forms of hate

You can report events that happen at school, at school-related events, online or off school property if it negatively affects a student or the school climate. You can also choose to make a report anonymously.

Complete reports are shared with the school to investigate and respond. Acts of discrimination, hate and bullying are never acceptable. Using the Report It tool is a way of standing up for each other and for ourselves.

# **COVID-19 Student Self-Assessment and Confirmation**

## Message to all UHS students:

Each day, you are required to complete...

a) the **REVISED** Online Self-Assessment: <u>COVID-19 School and Child-Care Screening Tool</u>.

AND

b) the Confirmation **Form** for which you will receive an email receipt.

Before you come to school every morning, read the self-assessment tool. If you answer 'yes' to any of the questions, do NOT come to school.

Once you complete the self-assessment, then complete the Confirmation Google Form. It asks you, "Have you completed the self-screening test?" Answer 'yes.' You will receive a receipt that is sent to your gapps email once you have completed this confirmation form.

Scroll down to the bottom of the receipt which shows the <mark>colour-coded day of the week and have this ready</mark> <mark>as you approach the entrance</mark>.

When you get to the **Town Centre** or **Warden** entrance (**these are the only two entrances**), hold up your phone and have the bottom of your receipt ready to show the staff member at the door. We want to see the colour-coded day at the bottom of your receipt.

If you do not have a phone, you can provide us with a **printout**. Alternatively, you can read a hard copy of the self-assessment that has been posted and give us a **verbal confirmation** that you have completed the screening.

Students may start entering the school at 8:15 a.m.




Newmarket Anti-Black Racism Task force Survey

# **HOW DOES THIS WORK?**

A step in the right direction for a more inclusive and diverse future. Big picture thinking with a strategy and support in place.

Rightsline would like to establish meaningful working relationships with various organizations that are community-motivated with anti-racism at their forefront. # HOW DO WE DO THAT?

Application Process: work with leaders in the community to establish the Rightsline Scholarship. Pilot 2021: Newmarket African Caribbean Canadian Association (NACCA) The application process is collaborative and geography-specific. Computer Science programs are an important criteria when selecting the recipient of the Rightsline Scholarship. We want to encourage students to apply into this ever-growing industry which has ample employment opportunities.

Paid Internship/Co-Op: Support in securing summer internship/co-op in the field of Technology. Depending on the program the recipient would work either with Rightsline or leverage their network to help in the search.

Mentorship and support: Quarterly mentoring session with CEO and executive leadership team throughout the program and quarterly mentoring session with Leaders in the field ((Technology/Entertainment) industries.
