

NEW ITEMS

Secondary School Model Change Request Form

We hope you and your families are well and we thank you for your continued support through our school reopening. As shared earlier this school year, families will have a second opportunity to request a change in their school program model. Information gathered through this Model Change Request Form will support planning for our Semester 2 Adaptive Face-to-Face and Virtual Models. We are making every effort to ensure that both in-person and virtual learning offer students safe, inclusive, supportive and engaging learning environments.

Through this Model Change Request Form, parents/guardians of secondary school students may request a change from Adaptive Face-to-Face learning to Virtual learning, or from Virtual learning to Adaptive Face-to-Face. Information about both learning models can be found on the Board website at www.yrdsb.ca/school-reopening.

On Monday, November 9, Parents/Guardians of secondary school students will be able to access the School Model Change Request Form through their child's Gapps account. Parents/guardians will work with their child to complete the Google form and once submitted, a copy of the response will be available in the student's Gapps email account.

Only families of secondary students requesting a school model change will need to complete this form. The form must be completed by Monday, November 16, 2020 at 8 a.m. to be considered. If you do not wish to change models, there is no action needed on your part.

Included in this email is a link to the Model Change Request Form.

After the School Model Change Request Form is closed, all families will receive an email to confirm their Semester 2 placement request by Wednesday, November 18, 2020. Students who are moving to a new school model can expect to start in the new model along with all students at the beginning of Semester 2 on February 2, 2021. Schools will complete student timetabling in January. As a result of program changes to support these school models, not all semester 2 secondary courses or program pathway options may be available in both models or in all schools. The Board will communicate any program and placement decisions as early as possible to support family and school planning. The home school Guidance staff will work with students and families to support timetable changes in both the Face-to-Face and Virtual models if needed.

As we indicated previously, moving between school models can only be considered at certain points in the school year. Beyond this opportunity, there will be no further opportunities to consider changes between the secondary school models this school year.

We want to assure you that we continue to prioritize the health, safety and well-being of our students, and look forward to continuing to support their learning.

Our focus this week is the unique and rich story of the Métis Nation.

MÉTIS NATION

"The Métis are a distinct Aboriginal people with a unique history, culture, language and territory that includes the waterways of Ontario, surrounds the Great Lakes and spans what was known as the historic Northwest.





Distinct Métis settlements emerged as an outgrowth of the fur trade, along freighting waterways and watersheds. In Ontario, these settlements were part of larger regional communities, interconnected by the highly mobile lifestyle of the Métis, the fur trade network, seasonal rounds, extensive kinship connections and a shared collective history and identity." LOUIS RIEL

"Louis Riel, Métis leader, founder of Manitoba, central figure in the Red River and North-West resistances (born 22 October 1844 in Saint-Boniface, Red River Settlement; died 16 November 1885 in Regina, SK). Riel led two popular Métis governments, was central in bringing Manitoba into Confederation, and was executed for high treason for his role in the 1885 resistance to Canadian encroachment on Métis lands. Riel was initially dismissed as a rebel by Canadian historians, although many now sympathize with Riel as a Métis leader who fought to protect his people from the Canadian government." ROBERT BOYER

"As a Métis artist, Bob Boyer's painting bears the mark of a dual cultural perspective, one that alternates between the Plains Indian imagery of his Native heritage and the European tradition that provides him with the vocabulary of abstraction. Boyer's work has been informed by colour field painting, specifically by the non-representational and experimental work of the Regina Five group in the 1960s. His first works were painterly, semiabstract depictions of ceremonial and everyday objects used by Native people, borrowing design elements of traditional hide painting and beadwork.

Boyer has used a variety of media throughout his career, although he is probably best known for his blanket paintings. In the 1980s he replaced the traditional canvas surface with that of a blanket, addressing the political issues of Native history in Canada, painting scenes alluding to injustice, betrayals, defeats, and environmental destruction. By the mid-1990s Boyer had shifted his focus, choosing instead to encourage the perpetuation and celebration of Native culture. He believes that the time has come for Native people to look beyond conflicts imposed by Western culture." (read more at www.gallery.ca)

Masks Update

Full Disclosure Memo

Attention Grade 12 students who have applied or are planning to apply to post-secondary institutions:

The Ministry of Education has indicated that, for the 2020-21 school year, course withdrawal dates should be determined based on the completion of approximately 75% of the total course hours. The full disclosure date for Grade 11 and Grade 12 courses is December 16, 2020. If a student withdraws from a Grade 11 or 12 course will not be rec-orded on the Ontario Student Transcript. If a student withdraws from a Grade 11 or 12 course after December 16, 2020, a with-drawal (W) is entered in the credit column, and the student's mark at the time of withdrawal will be recorded as a percentage in the achievement column of the transcript.

This year report cards are being issued one day before the OCAS and OUAC upload is to be completed. As such, if a Grade 12 stu-dent does not want to disclose their mid-semester grade on November 20th to avoid having a very low or failing mark transferred to post-secondary institutions, then they must drop the course prior to the transfer taking place. As a result, you must make an appointment with your alpha Guidance Counsellor as soon as possible, so that you can start the process to drop a course.

Students are required to adhere to the course drop process

Summary of important dates:

November 17 - deadline to virtually speak to your counsellor about dropping a course

November 18 - signed drop form due to your counsellor by end of school day November

19 - you will receive your mid-semester report card electronically

November 20 - transfer of mid-semester data to OCAS and OUAC

December 16 - official full disclosure date

Please be aware that your teachers have been asked to provide you with your mid-semester mark in all Grade 11 & 12 courses by November 12th to assist you in making any decisions relating to full disclosure.

Appropriate and Safe Use of Digital Tools During Synchronous Learning- Part A

Dear parents/guardians,

The Board requires that all teachers present the information in Parts A and B below to students as soon as possible. UHS staff presented the information below to students on Tuesday, November 10 and Wednesday, November 11 in their block one face to face class.

Similar to this year's start up package, secondary students received an electronic form via their Gapps account and parents/guardians received a notification. Parents/guardians are asked to ensure that their child completes the Google form. Once the student submits the form, a copy of the response will be sent to the student's Gapps email account. Translated versions have been provided.

If you have questions about the policies below, please contact a member of the administration team.

Part A: Expectations for Use and Behaviour

When participating in "real time" synchronous teaching and learning, students and families are agreeing to the

following:

- Use only YRDSB approved tools for digital learning.
- Follow YRDSB Appropriate Use of Technology Policy and Procedures including Information Technology Acceptable Use Agreement
- Adhere to all rules of conduct and behaviour for the regular classroom, as they also apply to the virtual classroom;
- Participation in synchronous sessions is limited to students only. Parents/Guardians may assist and support
 their child logging into or accessing learning platforms or digital tools. In all cases, parents are reminded of the
 im-portance of student independence in learning.
- Parents/Guardians and students are to refrain from:
 - Recording any aspect of a Google Meet or Zoom session (including pictures, voices or video) using internal or external recording devices;
 - Distributing/posting any recorded, copied or distributed materials in any way, including to all social media platforms;
 - Taking photos or screenshots of anything other than when given explicit permission or direction by the teacher to do so (e.g. a visual used for instructional purposes that won't be reposted later);
 - o Editing or manipulating materials in any way; and
 - Sharing/distributing links to Google Meet and Zoom sessions provided by the teacher.

Failure to comply with these expectations may involve student discipline, which could include suspension or expulsion.

Part B: Informed Consent for Participation

Parents and students need to be aware that:

- Portions of synchronous sessions may be recorded by the teacher:
 - Recordings that are made for learning purposes (e.g., the ability for students to access learning material at a later date) will be posted/accessible within the digital classroom and may include student voices, but no student pictures, names or other personal identifiers;
 - Where teachers record a segment of a synchronous learning session for individual assessment purposes, or for classroom management purposes, the recording will not be shared, posted or accessible to students; and
 - All one-to-one synchronous interactions (video and/or audio) between a teacher and a student will be recorded, but not shared/posted or accessible to students.
- At times, transcripts of closed-captioned notes are needed to support students with Individual Education Plans.
 In these instances:
 - There is a written record of what was said during a lesson or class discussion;
 - There is no personal identifiable information captured (i.e. no student pictures or names or other personal identifiers);
 - The transcript is not posted to the learning platform, but shared only with the students who require it;
 and
 - These notes are used by the student who requires them in accordance with their Individual Education Plan and are used for concept attainment and executive functioning purposes only.
