Dear families,

The past semester at UHS has been busy and exciting. Our Grade 9 Orientation on the first day of school followed by a day at Camp Robin Hood helped our incoming students build relationships that will support them in the years to come. Arts Unionville students also built relationships across all four grades in excursions to Kinark, Geneva Park and Medeba retreats.

Our Arts Unionville and Grade 7/8 Information Sessions showcased our outstanding Music, Art, Dance and academic programming. Besides featuring student work and performances, we shared information about our thriving STEM program, which is now in its second year.

As always, our staff and students have been busy facilitating and participating in school community events including Autumnfest, the Terry Fox Run, Clubs Fair (featuring more than 30 clubs), our live streamed Remembrance Day Ceremony, Alumni Panel, and Lunar New Year Market. In addition, the high calibre of student work in our AU program was shared with the Markham community in performances held at Flato Markham Theatre including *Winter Fantasia*, *Clara's Storybook*, and *The Drowsy Chaperone*. Our students have also participated in experiential learning opportunities within the greater community including trips to Stiver Mill Community Centre, Markham Fair, The Science Centre, McMichael Gallery, The Distillery, Speakout Conference, DECA Regionals, Crimestoppers Symposium, and Algonquin Park.

Just as our staff and students have been engaged in school, local, and greater community events, the theme of 'community' has been the central topic at our School Council meetings where parents and guardians have been engaged in defining what 'community' means, why 'community' is important, and how we develop a community that is healthy, safe, and inclusive.

As February comes to a close, we at UHS have much to celebrate. Most recently, our Senior Girls Volleyball and Senior Boys Basketball teams have advanced to the regional playoffs. As well, our team of 80 DECA students earned a combined total of 66 awards at the Provincial Competition held at the Toronto Sheraton Centre on February 6, 7, and 8. Moreover, 15 of our UHS competitors have qualified for the DECA international competition and will be travelling to Nashville, Tennessee at the end of April.

We are proud of the work and accomplishments of our staff and students whose optimism and enthusiasm continue to make Unionville High School an exciting place to learn, share, and grow.

Message from Our Trustee

As we enter another month of winter, this is a good time to be thinking about our health, well-being and the importance of self-care. We know that, like all of us, our students can focus better when they feel better. Our schools play an important role in health and mental health promotion and education, and fostering well-being and mental health is one of our priorities as a school board.

There is a lot of work taking place in our schools and board to create healthy schools and promote mental health and well-being, including:

- Providing training and resources for educators on strategies to support mentally healthy classrooms for all students, including holding a mental health conference.
- Hiring identity specific mental health workers and developing partnerships with community partners to serve the diverse needs of our students.
- Developing a Student Suicide Intervention Protocol to help keep students safe in the event of suicidal thoughts or actions.
- Educating students about the risks of substance use and misuse, including vaping and cannabis.
- Providing strategies and supports for students in preparing for exams and managing stress.

This commitment is also reflected in Board policy like the Healthy Schools and Workplaces policy and procedures. Setting policy, which governs the operation of the Board, is one of the roles of trustees, and we greatly value the input provided by students, staff members, family and community members. I encourage you to look at the policies under review and share your feedback.

We have a lot to look forward to in 2020. At the Board meeting in December, trustees unanimously approved the addition of new permanent Indigenous Trustee and Indigenous Student Trustee positions. We are committed to Indigenous Education in our Board and it is important that these voices are represented at the table. We hope to fill the positions as soon as possible and will share more information as it becomes available.


DRAMA

UHS students had a phenomenally rich first semester of learning in their English classes; check out some of the wonderful examples below!

In our Grade 9 classes, deep thinking and learning were on display in the form of critical meaning-making through both reading and writing poetry. Students read a variety of poems from a diverse group of authors and deliberated about the value and purpose of communicating messages figuratively, as opposed to literally.

In our Grade 10 classes, students weighed the pros and cons of a technocratic society and tapped into both their creative and logical sides in order to imagine how they might shape the world of tomorrow for the betterment of humanity. We can safely report, after viewing the projects the Grade 10s produced, that the future could not be in better hands!

At the senior-level, our Grade 11 thinkers and learners dove into how they could reimagine and remix texts. Specifically, our 11U students created short film adaptations of texts they had previously dealt with in their learning program. The results were beyond impressive and truly demonstrated that Unionville students are deep thinkers and mindful creators.

Last, but certainly not least, the Grade 12s began to try on different "lenses" through which they could view, critique, understand, and make better the spaces they move through in their current and future lives! Additionally, traffic control box wraps created by the same group of students have now been installed at various locations around Markham. Last year's theme was talent and technology.



AU audition numbers are up and interest in the Arts Unionville, Visual Arts, program remains strong. One hundred and eighty parents and guardians attended the info session.



SHSM Arts and Culture Club students are in the process of creating design concepts for a proposed 200' mural for the Thornhill Community Centre. The designs will be finalized early in second semester.


Students become critical thinkers who can understand and navigate the complex issues that face the world, and they become problem-solvers who will ultimately make positive social, political and economic changes that will shape the future.

Last semester, the Humanities and Social Sciences teaching team, comprised of Ms. Faulkner, Ms. Damji, Ms. Wong, Mr. Cash, Mr. Tsang and


Mr. Sanchez, engaged the students at Unionville High School in the Student Vote program. This gave students their first taste of active citizenship as they voted in a mock election that paralleled the 2019 Federal Election.

While the results for Unionville High School elected the Liberal Candidate, Alan Ho, who took 34% of the vote, the overall results for the riding of Markham-Unionville echoed the actual federal results and elected Conservative Candidate Bob Saroya.

Meanwhile, our Civics students held their own elections! In a new assignment, the students create their own parties, run their own campaigns and compete for votes in their classroom mock elections. LIBRARY



Students frequently used the Library Learning Commons during semester one to support their studies, accessing both online and print resources. UHS students know that the library's databases are a reliable way to research online; they conducted 213,731 GALE database searches first semester. In the EBSCO database, our students' top search terms included cancer therapy, social media algorithms, net neutrality, and identity theft.

Students are also accessing books to support their learning. Semester one saw 2,263 checkouts, with non-fiction books accounting for 60% of total books borrowed. UHS students also love to read for pleasure, evident in the 863 works of fiction they checked out.



It was a beautiful crisp fall day and we all had a fantastic time in the beautiful surroundings of the district. Shortly into the semester, preparations were underway for our yearly December production of "Clara's Storybook...An Imaginative Winter Tale". The performance highlighted a magical take on a few beloved fairy tale classics represented through dance. With the

The semester wrapped up with each of the classes sharing their individual research assignments. ELL

In September, the department welcomed two new members, Don Pan and Daniela Panacci. We also held our ELL Parent Network meeting. Members of the administration team, Guidance, Student Success and ESL departments welcomed parents and guardians of English Language Learners (ELLs) to share questions they had about school for their children. Parents and guardians also had an opportunity to build a network of support amongst themselves. On January 21 and 22, we welcomed new international students. They got the chance to tour the school, meet some fellow students and participate in activities to learn about their new school.

Lunar New Year was celebrated in the atrium on January 20 and 21 with food, drink, music and activities with help from Ms. McMullen's food and nutrition class and Ms. Yu's Mandarin class. Students baked and decorated tasty New Year's cookies and conducted activities in calligraphy and origami. Students were also encouraged to make wishes and set goals for the new year.

In the upcoming semester, we have an exciting project that will involve all the students in the ESL department: "Gone Through the Maple Forest" - an anthology of newcomer voices. ESL students will have an opportunity to submit a piece of writing or artwork that expresses their thoughts and feelings about coming to Canada to live and study. Those submissions will be edited and compiled into a published book for students to share with friends and family. Members of Ms. Kapeluch's ESL E class are working in teams to handle the marketing, editing, design and layout, logistics and event planning for the project. GEOGRAPHY

Grade 9 Canadian Geography students have been busy throughout the semester striving to understand the intricate processes that have built this vast nation. They have developed; geologic history timelines, inquiry based research presentations on resource development, researched Canada's treatment of indigenous people, and planned cities of the future considering livability and sustainability. Students have been using various technology platforms such as Instagram, google mapping tools, and others to communicate their findings.

Grade 12 World Issues students were very busy throughout the semester trying to determine their impact, place, and role in the modern world. Students worked to create new measures for human development, uncovered the story of colonialism, and examined the need for renewed strategies for managing the global commons. Students also created an integrated installation project throughout the school to share knowledge about consumer behaviors and the impact of globalization.

MODERNS

The FSL & International Languages Department at UHS is in the midst of another busy & exciting year! During the first semester, our classes engaged in several linguistically & culturally enriching activities.

For instance, grade 9 French students created a profile of themselves (Autoportrait) which they shared with their classmates, they learned how to express their opinions and give suggestions on a number of topics and they explored a number of aspects of everyday life in Madagascar, Sénégal, Vietnam and Lebanon (Liban). Grade 10 French students reenacted scenes from *Le petit Nicolas*, recited poems, presented fun stories from their childhoods and learned about French and Belgian culture. Meanwhile, grade 11 French students planned and shared cultural itineraries in French-speaking regions, wrote critiques of famous paintings, conducted and analysed surveys on the use and impact of media on their peers and they did extensive character and thematic analyses through their reading and study of *Le Fantôme de l'opéra* and *Le petit prince*. Lastly, our grade 12 French students participated in debates, discussing engaging and relevant topics, wrote and studied poetry, read two plays set in historically significant contexts and wrote 1000-word researched essays and presented their topics to the class including the planning of interactive activities.

We had a section each of grade 10 and grade 12 Spanish running first semester and they participated in a number of cultural activities such as a Flamenco dance workshop, in which students learned about the history of the dance, as well as its various cultural origins. Our students also learned about the meaning and importance of flamenco in the work of Federico Garcia Lorca's "Bodas de Sangre", a play that the grade 12 students were studying. Students were able to dance while singing in Spanish to the Flamenco music. In addition, students also learned and participated in Day of the Dead celebrations. Many activities led up to the celebrations. Students learned about indigenous origins and connections related to the Day of the Dead. In addition to artistic (Papel Picado) and linguistic activities around the festival, we were also able to sample foods - in particular "Pan de muertos", a traditional bread eaten during the festival. Towards the end of the semester, we had another successful dance workshop. This time, students actively participated in three types of dances: bachata, salsa and merengue. During our food unit for Spanish-speaking countries, students researched specific cultural dishes, how to make them and their importance to that specific region. Students cooked delicious meals and desserts, created videos explaining how to make them, gave a history of their dishes, and explained where one can try these dishes within the GTA, thereby making community connections.



MODERNS CONT'D

Our Mandarin classes have been quite interesting as we introduced one-on-one oral conferencing for individual tasks across the grades. These activities allow students to communicate and work on their rough copies with their teacher before submitting their written work. We also introduced indigenous teachings and compared them to traditional Chinese philosophies in the Grade 11 Mandarin class. Meanwhile, Grade 12 students created some short videos introducing current social issues using the FlipGrid platform. Finally, Grade 10 classes participated in Chinese New Year celebrations by hosting two booths in the school atrium this year.

As was inaugurated last school year, all language students participated in the Cultural Expo on December 5th, 2019 with several live performances, including musical performances in French, Spanish and Mandarin, skits and scenes from plays and interesting informational presentations. Students displayed their learning and learned from other students as they visited booths during the Expo, sampled traditional food dishes, played games and engaged in cultural activities.

We look forward to another exciting semester of language learning in Semester 2!



PHYS ED

The first semester was, once again, a very busy time in the Physical and Health Education department along with UHS Athletics. Students have demonstrated year after year with their selection of healthy active living and fitness courses their interest in becoming more physically fit. Our fitness classes continue to be extremely popular with our senior level students. The combination of team activities, loud music, and lots of encouragement, has allowed UHS fitness students to always meet their goals!

Out of the gym, our grade 12 leadership class ran some amazing school wide events. They facilitated the annual Terry Fox Run, spirit wear sales, marketing for home games, updating the athletics display cases and hosting a 2-day elementary school volleyball tournament.

Unionville Athletics had another amazing fall and winter season. Our boys volleyball and girls basketball seasons ended with losses in tough playoff matches. Each team was comprised of competitive and hard working student athletes. We had an OFSAA qualifier in Cross Country as grade 10 student Alissa Chi travelled to Sudbury to compete on a snow filled course. Our swimmers had another strong showing at each of the YRAA swim meets.

Currently our Senior Boys Basketball team is entering their third playoff match as they travel to perennial powerhouse Vaughan SS to compete in the YRAA Quarter Finals. They've already upset the 5th ranked Stephen Lewis, and are looking to continue their run. The Senior Girls Volleyball team finished their season undefeated in league play. In their first playoff match, they easily handled the visiting team from St. John de Brebeuf in 3 straight sets. They now travel to play the second ranked Aurora HS team hoping for another big upset. The Math Club, which meets every Tuesday after school in Room 245, is a very active club where senior students lead the exploration of mathematical concepts that are beyond the school curriculum. We would like to acknowledge the many students who participated in various math contests this past semester and recognize their initiative and ability to take risks through their involvement. Thank you to Mr. Wong for his continued organization of the Math Contests. The Canadian Open Math Challenge was written by 56 students. Congratulations to **Cindy Zhu** Gr.11 (97.62 percentile), **Thomas Liu** Gr.12 (97.31 percentile) and **Ruimian Zheng** Gr.9 (95.02 percentile) for their Ontario awards. Twenty-seven of our students received honours and distinctions.



The University of Waterloo's Canadian Intermediate Mathematics Contest was written by 48 students. Congratulations to our top student, **Ruimian Zheng**, as well as to **Yifei Wang & Runze Zhao** for placing on the Honour Roll. Sixteen of our students received the top 25% certificate.

The University of Waterloo's Canadian Senior Mathematics Contest was written by 77 students. Congratulations to our top student, **Cindy Zhu**, as well as to **Miaoxian Wang & Joline Cheng** for placing on the Honour Roll. Twenty-eight of our students received the top 25% certificate.

We look forward to the upcoming Math Contest Celebration Party to once again be held at the end of the school year. Details to be announced at a later time.






TECHNOLOGY

Course Selection:

As we look ahead to completing the course selection process for September, we encourage all students to take advantage of what UHS Music has to offer. An article from the Toronto Star on February 7, 2015 outlines the results of a study published in the Journal of Neuroscience that promotes the benefits of taking music in school. The study's lead author, Gavin Bidelman, says "musical activities are an engaging form of cognitive brain training." The team concluded that "engaging in formal music training before the age of 14 and continuing for at least a decade produced the most positive changes in the brain." This study is only one example of a growing list of results that scientifically explain how music helps develop the brain's ability to promote everything from cognitive development and motor skills to sensory perception, management of anxiety and emotional balance. We look forward to seeing our students next September in our band, choir, strings, guitar and musical theatre classes. Please do not hesitate to contact a music teacher for further information.



SPECIAL EDUCATION

This first semester in Special Education was very busy. The staff worked hard to reach all of our students throughout the semester to support their needs, follow their progress and ensure they understand and are receiving their accommodations.

We recently redesigned our office and classroom to make the environment more appealing for the many needs of our students. These changes have provided our students an inviting and comfortable space to do homework, come for extra help, relax and have their lunch.

Strategies for Success - Grade 9 Learning Strategies GLE101 - Semester 1 We have had a very busy semester in the grade 9 Learning Strategies class. The course has helped our students transition smoothly to high school by supporting them in their coursework and focused on teaching them strategies they can use for success in all their courses. We also focused on mindfulness and wellness in our daily work. Students also started exploring the OSSLT (Ontario Secondary School Literacy Test) by looking at past tests and practicing different parts of the test. It was a busy semester and we look forward to working with these students again in their grade 10 year!

Grade 11 Learning Strategies - In the grade 11 Learning Strategies class students continued to work towards self determination (knowing themselves as learners) and self-advocacy (communicating their learning needs). We continued to strengthen Literacy skills this semester by reading the award winning Novel "The Woo Woo" by Canadian author Lindsey Wong. This was a novel that all students could find a connection with as the themes of the novel include family, relationships, coming of age, culture, race, immigration, mental health as well as being a Special Education student. Throughout the course students were also supported with their other coursework, and they continued to learn strategies to promote their success at school. We hope to see many of these students back in grade 12 Learning strategies where we will focus on being ready for their post secondary transition.



Grade 12 Learning Strategies - In the grade 12 Learning Strategies class, the students were engaged in learning about career pathways and options, applying to post-secondary institutions and how to budget for the future. In addition they researched and presented information on specific mental health disorders, which culminated in informative and relevant presentations to their peers. As students begin to receive their acceptances they should be coming to see Ms. Caufield to further discuss how to identify themselves to the Post Secondary Institution. DD Program (Life Skills)

The Community Class is staying true to its name by exploring some of the great things that the Markham Community has to offer. We have spent time with other YRDSB Community Classes at different events such as the Magna Hoedown and SNAP basketball and showed our independence when going to Markville Mall and Markham Library. The students performed at the UHS Winter assembly with a routine that warmed out hearts!

Second semester is sure to be exciting with many more community explorations and yoga and drumming sessions to name a few!

P.E.A.K.

The P.E.A.K. (Pathways to Employment and Applied Knowledge) Program had a very busy and successful start to the 2019/20 school year, with a focus on Workplace Health and Safety, Job Preparation, Transit and Travel, and Health and Wellness. P.E.A.K students work in a total of 14 community work placements. Along with learning new routines, work skills, and transit routes/schedules, students continue to adjust to the newly implemented Presto Program.

Some Community outings included the Markham Fair, Special Needs Magna Hoedown, Remembrance Day Ceremony at the Markham Civic Centre, Special Olympics Basketball Tournament, Community Living Healthy Relationships course, and weekly outings to the YMCA. In Second Semester, we will visit the College Vocational Program at George Brown College and go to the Community Safety Village. We will also participate in the Community Living Day at Queen's Park, a bowling tournament, the end of the year outing to the Blue Jay's School Day Game, the Best Buddies Prom, and P.E.A.K. Graduate lunch.

FAMILY STUDIES

Many exciting things happened in our courses this semester. Here are some highlights.

Grade 9 Exploring Family Studies

Students learned many practical skills that they can put to use in their everyday lives. Students learned how to hand sew and express themselves by making emoji pillows. Some students learned how to use a sewing machine to sew pillowcases. Students learned about healthy eating and had a chance to challenge their cooking skills in a 'zero food waste' food lab. Students also had fun completing a 'Family Meal' assignment where they went to No Frills, shopped for themselves and cooked a healthy delicious meal on a budget.



Grade 10 Food and Nutrition


Students in Food and Nutrition semester one were very busy cooking delicious meals and learning about how our food choices impact health and our planet. One of the highlights in semester one was working with Mr. Guldemon's Grade 10 Business students. We helped them plan and prepare foods to be sold in a pop-up restaurant in the atrium. The money made went to charity. Mr. Guldemon's class helped Food and Nutrition students by being a part of a client/ nutritional consultant assignment. Food and Nutrition students collected information on their client's diet, analyzed it and made recommendations for change. Another highlight was learning from a representative from AgScape - an organization that informs students on a variety of agri-food issues. We learned about important issues impacting food security and recognized the role we all can play to make our food system more sustainable.



Grade 11 Food and Culture

This semester brought out some inner chefs in our Food and Culture classes. This grade 11 course is designed to explore how food is influenced by culture and the various factors that impact what we eat. The students explored a variety of cultural foods and food practices from areas such as the Mediterranean, Middle East and French Cuisine. Some highlights of the semester included learning about Indigenous foods and incorporating those foods into a food lab. The semester also included a Chopped Challenge. Students worked in groups and were given mystery ingredients to create a meal connected to one of the countries that were studied. In

this Chopped Challenge, dishes were presented to 'celebrity' judges from our staff. Valuable feedback was provided. The semester ended with an International Food Hall where homemade food was brought in and new understandings of different cultures were shared.

Grade 11/12 Fashion



Students in this course quickly went from not knowing how to work a sewing machine, to sewing infinity scarves, tote bags, pillows and shorts in only a couple of months. A major theme in this course was re-thinking our fashion choices to become more sustainable. Students were given a re-fashion challenge. As a result, many creative, clever and sentimental re-fashion pieces were created. Students learned how to read patterns and ensure steps were followed carefully. Many developed a new appreciation for all of the work that goes into making the clothing we wear. As well, many students expressed how they are now making more environmentally conscious fashion choices.
