Activities Leading to Possible Suspension–Education Act s.306 (1)

- uttering a threat to inflict serious bodily harm on another person
- possessing alcohol or illegal drugs
- being under the influence of alcohol
- swearing at a teacher or at another person in a position of authority

Activities Leading to Possible Suspension - continued

- •committing an act of vandalism that causes extensive damage to school property at the pupil's school or to property located on the premises of the pupil's school
- bullying/cyber-bullying
 - \cdot at school
 - \cdot at a school-related activity
 - or where the activity will have a negative impact on the school climate

Activities Leading to Suspension Pending Possible Expulsion –s. 310 (1)

- •possessing a weapon, including possessing a firearm
- using a weapon to cause or to threaten bodily harm to another person
- committing physical assault –causes bodily harm –medical practitioner
- committing sexual assault



Activities Leading to Suspension Pending Possible Expulsion –s. 310 (1)

- •trafficking in weapons or in illegal drugs
- •committing robbery
- •giving alcohol to a minor
- Board determined activity leading to expulsion at a schoolrelated activity or where the activity will have a negative impact on the school climate

The Grade 10 Literacy Test



- A Diploma requirement. Administered in March of the grade 10 year
- A test based on language and communication (reading and writing) expectations of curricula up to and including grade 9
- Accommodations, deferrals and exemptions may be appropriate for some students
- If standard not met in first attempt, schools will provide support; test is re-administered until student successfully completes the test or the Grade 12 Literacy Course

34 Credit Threshold

- Most students will complete 30 credits within four years.
 If needed, students may earn up to 34 credits within five years.
- While enrolled in their first four consecutive years of secondary school, students may go beyond 34 credits (e.g., music repetoire, summer school, night school, e-learning)
- After secondary school, going beyond the 34 credit threshold is possible with:
 - \circ E-learning
 - Night School
 - Summer School
 - Independent Learning Centre
 - Adult Day School



The 34 Credit Threshold <u>does not</u> apply to:

- Students with an IEP
- International (VISA) students
- To English as a Second Language (ESL) core language courses and/or English Literacy Development core language courses
