PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

May 2014 Spring is finally here!

As we approach the last two months of school, we are excited about the many events and initiatives that are still to come.

On April 24th in honour of Earth Day, our student participated in a cleanup of the school grounds. Students could be seen working in pairs and gathering small branches and shrubs. They filled their buckets and carried them off to the bunker area where the caretakers were stationed to empty the buckets.

As part of the new social studies curriculum the grade three, four, and five students showcased their Heritage and Identity projects with a museum storefront where they shared their learning with the rest of the school. Synervoice and SchoolConnects

To enhance our existing absence check procedure, Unionville Public School is one of a number of schools participating in a pilot project to introduce *a new, more efficient* student absence or late arrival reporting system. This new system will reduce the time it takes to verify student attendance making it easier for you to report your child's absence and easier for staff to respond to unaccounted student absences.

This new reporting system is called *Safe Arrival* and it will allow parents to report their child's absence or late arrival quickly and conveniently.

Parents can call into an automated interactive telephone system via a toll free number

(1-855-203-2994) through which absences and late arrivals can be reported. You will receive a confirmation number and a follow up email confirming your child's absence or late arrival.

The system will be available 24 hours/day, 7 days a week. Future absences can be reported at any time.

In addition, we will also be introducing an automated notification system already used by our High Schools to contact parents who have not reported their child absent. The automated notification system will contact parents at multiple contact numbers until one of the designated contacts is reached. If our system is unable to reach a designated contact after 30 minutes, office staff will follow up.

By reporting your child absent in advance using the Safe Arrival toll free number, you will NOT receive a call.



OUR VOICE CONFERENCE

On Wednesday April 30th, Clara, Justin and Ms. Dyer were selected to go to this year's "Our Voice Student Conference". Student representatives from each school in the York Region District School Board gathered in a large conference room at the 'Sheraton Hotel' in Richmond Hill. Two students from grade 6, 7 or 8 were chosen to participate in the conference. One teacher from each school is chosen to go as well. At the conference, the students vote for next year's student trustee. They also got a chance to listen to this year's keynote speaker 'Lights'. Unionville Public School Family Fitness and Health Evening

On Thursday April 17th, 2014 Unionville Public School (UPS) opened its doors to our over 180 parents, caregivers, students, and staff by hosting an evening targeted at health and fitness. This evening was funding by a Pro-Grant submitted by school council. We were fortunate to have three interactive sessions provided by community resources. Beginning at 6pm families took part in a community walk around the neighboring streets of the school and upon returning to the school received a handy bag with a mini first aid kit and bottle of water. Families were then invited into the gymnasium to participate in a circuit class where Carolyn Smith from Jack It Up fitness demonstrated that you do not need fancy equipment or facilities to exercise in a fun and safe way. After getting the circulatory system pumping, students were taken on a journey of jungle animals while embracing some of the unique and often challenging moves of yoga by Laura Gardash of Ahhsana Yoga. To wind the evening down the audience was then privy to a motivational talk and fitness demonstration by Kary and Uche Odiatu, North America's #1 fitness motivators and founders of Fitspeakers.com. Families who chose not to participate in the active part of the evening or who wanted to learn more about our local community partners were able to peruse the halls of the school visiting and collecting information. Active and Safe Routes to School Update

The Active and Safe Routes to School Team and many volunteers have been working hard to put some initial project plans into action. We are very fortunate to have the support of so many parents who are contributing their time and energy. We are also working with enthusiastic and supportive community partners who are sharing their expertise and tools. This collaborative effort will help to decrease the traffic and congestion around the school at the start and end of the day so that it is safer and healthier for walking and cycling.

The traffic surveillance in which we collected information and observations about the traffic was completed by mid-April. Thanks to so many enthusiastic parent volunteers for their time and insightful feedback. This information will provide us with some benchmarks so that we can evaluate whether more students and parents are walking and cycling to school after we have promoted the benefits of walking and cycling. It will also help to gain insights so that if there are further opportunities to alleviate traffic and congestion around the school, then we can explore initiatives and/or create tools to address those opportunities. To further evaluate the traffic, annual data collection will be planned to understand the longer-term nuances of traffic patterns and hopefully improvements, around the school.

The data collection did reveal some interesting observations. As we know there are a number of cars which park illegally each day and the City will be out shortly to ticket those offenders. Rolling stops at the stop signs, particularly the Bridle Trail and Main Street stop are unfortunately, very common. We are working with the police to work towards some improvement with respect to rolling stops and speeding in these areas. Please come to a full stop at these corners as there is considerable pedestrian traffic.

We have almost completed our "communication blitz" in which we have been delivering information on the benefits to walking and cycling. Thanks for all your questions and inquiries about the project and your support of this project.

Parking,

as per the City's by-law:

"Parking" means the halting of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except when halting temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading goods or passengers.

Our next step will be directed to getting more students and parents walking and cycling. We will be delivering actionable tools and ideas to help you get started. If more people walk and cycle to school the area in and around the school will be both safer and healthier.

As you know, we still have the need for long-term, dependable crossing guards. These crossing guards help keep our routes safe as we cross busy intersections during both the start and end of school each day. There is currently an opening for an Adult School Crossing Guard, with a particular need for the Kennedy Road and Bridle Trail crossing. If you know of someone who might be interested in this paid position, please let the Principal, Helen Hart or Vice Principal, Robin Cockburn know.

Now that the weather is starting to warm up, we hope that everyone thinks of walking or cycling to school as a way to get out and be active!

New Construction has started

There will be accommodations made to our site due construction and to keep our students safe at all times.

A bunker (picture A) was delivered that will store materials that may need to be moved during the construction. The gate located at the north side of the school will be locked at all times to prevent vehicle/equipment access to the construction site, unless authorized and controlled by a flagman. The double door exit at the portapak will be visually blocked (with removable temporary panels or chain) to prevent students from exiting to the school yard without supervising personnel. The area of the new construction will be hoarded only at the south side of the school around the new addition, with provision for space for excavation/removals and equipment needed during construction (Picture B). Due to interior plumbing work that needs to be executed early in the project, the existing storage room and girl's washroom located across from the Library will be included in the construction area. Hoarding will be installed in the existing corridor accordingly, leaving the existing fire extinguisher and drinking fountain accessible to the school staff and students (Picture B).

The bull dozers and excavators have arrived and the excavation has begun (Picture C). All work will take place either before students arrive for the day or during the day while students are inside the building. During both recess breaks the work will stop and students can engage in play outdoors while supervised.

STUDENT PLACEMENT PROCESS 2014-2015

Our primary goal at Unionville Public School is to develop balanced classes. A balanced class reflects the diversity of our community and allows the variety of interests and talents of our learners to emerge and be appreciated. Like your family, the class unit provides a balance of opportunities for a range of learners to succeed through appropriate challenges. The learner develops the feeling of belonging and the feeling that in a variety of ways he/she makes a noticed contribution. The family, the school and the community provide opportunities for children to socialize. Each new year brings opportunities to meet new friends and expand our circle of acquaintances. School becomes more comfortable and familiar and accordingly our potentials have great possibilities of realization. The following are the criteria we use to guide our placements:

Balance of Ability, Interests and Talents

All children are unique and different. The teacher's task of providing meaningful learning programs is enhanced when classes are created to accommodate instructional groupings.

Balanced According to Gender

We attempt to balance the number of boys and girls to ensure many friendship opportunities.

Learning Style

How does the learner go about the process of learning? What kind of environment allows that style to be utilized effectively?

Teaching Style

How does a teacher go about the teaching/learning process? What type of learners might best flourish with this teacher?

Social Blending

What is the best cluster of individuals to effectively and efficiently learn? This should not be viewed as a grouping of friends. At particular stages, some close friends learn best in separate classes.

Parent Requests

A number of additional considerations are included in our decision making when creating classes. Regrettably, we are unable to accept specific teacher requests for the 2014-2015 year. Rather than suggesting a teacher, please indicate the learning style or classroom structure which would be most appropriate for your child. When teachers get together to create new class lists, we will use this information to help make our final decisions. Should you have information to share with us, please send a letter to your child's homeroom teacher.

The staff at Unionville care deeply about student needs. Years of meeting the learning needs of children give them the unique qualifications to recommend placement decisions. It takes hours of discussion, reflection, revision and consideration of alternatives to arrive at the best organization for our school. Rest assured that the organization will include our best opportunities for student achievement
