Kiss and Ride and Parking Lot Expectations

We believe strongly that UMPS students benefit from walking to and from school! However, for those parents/guardians who choose to drive their children to school, we would like to remind you of the procedures to follow at the beginning and end of the day to ensure everyone's safety.

Front Loop:

Safety pylons will be placed in the two left lanes so that only one lane is operable. When you enter into the loop, drive up along the inside curb lane as far up as the car in front of you. We expect a single file line with no passing. Please drive all the way to the east end of the kiss and ride loop. All students must exit from the passenger side of the car, directly beside the curb. No one shall let their child(ren) out of the car from the middle lane or the driver's side of the car, where they would need to cut in between cars. Your child(ren) will be directed to go to the playground and /or their proper entry door. No one shall enter the main doors. Please continue, by signaling, checking your blind spot and proceeding into the exit lane once the drop off has been made. Please do not get out of the car.

Parking Lot Entry: For Kindergarten Parents Only

Drivers will enter the parking lot and continue along the sidewalk area, close to the Kindergarten playgrounds to drop of their children.

Children will get out of the car on the passenger side (Like a Kiss'n'Ride) at the Kindergarten area and staff will direct them to their kindergarten yard. Please continue, by signaling, checking your blind spot and proceeding into the exit lane once the drop off has been made. Please do not get out of the car. When entering the parking lot to pick up kindergarten students, please do not block our handicap parking spots. Parking in the middle of the parking lot in the aisle also makes it difficult for cars to enter and exit the parking lot safely. The school bus and school transportation vans also enter to drop off /pick up students at the Kindergarten area. These vehicles have priority for entering and exiting. Please respect their "right of way".

Please always be extra careful as you enter and exit the parking lot and drive or walk down the street. The safety of our children is imperative.



Visitors in the School

We welcome families and volunteers at Unionville Meadows Public School.

To ensure the safety of students, families and visitors are asked to use the main entrance and report to the office at all times. You will be asked to sign in and wear a visitor or volunteer badge if you are visiting the school for any reason (volunteering, appointments with teachers, etc.).

We also remind parents to drop off their children before entering the school yard or playground. For the safety of all of our students, the only adults permitted on the UMPS playground are UMPS staff and lunch assistants. Supervision in the yard begins at 8:15.

Safety Drills

We will be reviewing safety issues and practicing some specific safety procedures/drills with all of our students. As you know from previous years, schools across the province have engaged in Lockdown Procedures which prepare students for occurrences such as an armed intruder. Schools are required to practice 2 Lockdowns in addition to 6 Fire Drills per year. Our first Lockdown will take place later in the month and our fire drills will randomly occur throughout the year, with the first one occurring within the first 2

weeks of school. Our teachers do a great job of preparing our students for these drills so that anxiety levels are kept to a minimum.



Keeping valuables safe

Valuable possessions, such as electronic games, toys and smart phones may interfere with the learning environment. Personal music players (M3Ps, Cell Phones and iPods) are not to be used inside the school building. Students are discouraged from bringing these items to school. If they are brought to school, it is at the students' own risk. If an item is confiscated, parents will be asked to pick it up at the school office. We are not responsible for loss or damage to personal effects that are not required for programming.

BACK TO SCHOOL TIPS		
	Elementary School	High School
School Supplies	Check to see what supplies you still have available from last year. Check the dollar store for bargains or take advantage of back-to-school sales. Use a checklist to avoid duplication.	Check to see what supplies are usable from last year, work out a budget and then let teens buy their own supplies. Buy supplies just before school starts, to take advantage of back-to-school sales. Use a supply checklist and don't forget to get lock for their lockers.
Bedtime	About a week before the beginning of school, start a routine where children are going to bed earlier, especially if they have been staying up later over the summer holidays.	Establish acceptable hours for school nights that you can both live with. Despite what teens think, they do need a good night's sleep.
Healthy Living	Children need good food, daily physical activity and a healthy environment that supports learning and growth. Through Healthy Schools initiatives, such as 20 minutes of daily physical activity and having healthy food in vending machines, the Ontario government is working with schools to ensure kids maximize their potential. Look for crunchy fruits and vegetables and low-fat food choices to tuck into lunch boxes and enjoy family walks, biking or hikes so everyone gets exercise.	Buy a variety of healthy food choices and ask your teens what they want to eat, so that lunches are enjoyable and nutritious. Breakfast is the most important meal of the day, so encourage teens to take time to eat in the morning. And remind them that daily physical activity is an important way to maintain their ideal weight and have a positive body image. A family run is a great way to spend quality time together and burn calories.
School Year Priorities	Figure out the ground rules for after-school activities, chores, home- work, television and Internet use. By discussing priorities early, you can set a schedule and avoid confrontations later on.	Set priorities for after-school activities, job and chore hours, home- work and leisure time. Encourage your teen to stick with the list, and revise it if priorities change.
Homework	Set up a well-lit, quiet place with a good work surface for your child to do homework. Encourage a regular homework time and discourage distractions.	Encourage a regular homework time with limited distractions. Establish appropriate times for phone calls, instant messaging, electronic games and other activities.
Bullying	Bullying is a serious problem, can be verbal, social, physical and electronic and needs to be dealt with promptly through dialogue. As well, children can speak directly with Kids Help Phone. The Ontario government recently provided funding to the helpline so additional counsellors are available to help with bullying problems. The government will also be producing a booklet on dealing with bullying that you can order from www.edu.gov.on.ca.	Bullying is a serious problem, can be verbal, social, physical and electronic and needs to be dealt with promptly through dialogue. As well, children can speak directly with Kids Help Phone. Learning at Home	Parents can support the government's literacy and numeracy programs by incorporating learning into everyday life - for example, by having kids read package labels and weigh produce during grocery shopping trips. Reading to your child for just 20 minutes a day can amount to more than 1,420 hours by age 12.	Encourage reading for pleasure in the home and provide a variety of reading materials, from novels to magazines, you know your teens will enjoy. Your local library is a great place to start.
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
