From Your Administrative Team!

We have had a strong start to 2015! As we begin Term 2 we are encouraging students to persevere with their learning. Teachers are looking for students to use class time wisely, to complete activities to their personal best and to actively participate and engage in their learning during class time. Report cards will be coming home on Tuesday, February 17th. Please spend a few minutes with your child, reviewing the comments on the report card, highlighting and praising all the things they are doing well. This is also a good time for your child to reflect on their achievement and to set goals for the remainder of the school year—"What did you do well?" and "What are you going to work on next?". The continued support of families at home is most appreciated!

We have had many cold days with temperatures below -20, resulting in indoor recesses. We closely monitor the weather conditions during inclement weather and decide when it is appropriate for students and staff to be outdoors. Whenever possible we try to be outside so students have an opportunity to expend excess energy and to have fun playing in the snow. It is especially important in cold weather that students are warmly dressed for the weather, including snow pants, hats, boots, and thick 'ski type' mittens. Families are asked to send these items to school everyday and we will remind students to wear them.

Every February, we recognize the legacy of Canadians of African Heritage, past and present. The celebration has been a part of Canadian society since the 1950's, honouring the significant contributions of peoples of African Heritage to the cultural, economic, political and social fabric of Canada. Throughout the month, students are involved in a range of classroom activities in accordance with the curriculum, raising awareness of the importance of these contributions to our Canadian history.

We would like to extend a warm welcome to Ms. Visvalingam who will be joining our Kindergarten team, supporting the children in Ms. Bassel's classroom.

Finally, we remind you that Monday, February 16th is Family Day - a provincewide statutory holiday. Family Day occurs the third Monday of February each year. It is a day for families to spend time with each other and to celebrate the importance of family values. We wish all our families a memorable day!

Kindergarten Registration Open Now !

Kindergarten Registration is well underway for the 2015-2016 school year.

Registration forms are available on YRDSB's website: www.yrdsb.ca.

Children who turn four or five years old during 2015, live within the school boundary and whose parents are public school tax supporters will be eligible to register for kindergarten.

All documentation must be submitted and completed before your child can be enrolled. Documents required for registration include:

- Proof of child's age (birth certificate/passport)
- Proof of residency (child and parent/guardian)
- Citizenship and immigration status (if applicable)
- Direction of school support form (school office)

A kindergarten information session for parents is planned for spring. For information please visit the YRDSB website or contact the school office.


Current Junior Kindergarten students do not need to register for Senior Kindergarten, as they are already enrolled.

Safe Schools for Children with Allergies

School staff and parents are responsible for creating safe environments for students and staff. This is an additional challenge for schools that have children and staff with allergies, especially life threatening allergies. While we take every step to create a risk-free environment, school staff and parents can take steps to minimize potentially fatal allergic reactions.

It is especially important parents communicate information about their child's life -threatening allergy to the school as soon as they are aware of it. Please notify the school office and your child's teacher so that we have accurate records and can jointly establish the protocol to follow with your child.

Dressing for Recess

During the winter, students are expected to come to school warmly dressed to play outside during recesses. <u>Students need to wear a winter coat, snow</u> pants, boots, hat, and thick "ski type" mittens.

As children may get wet while playing during the snowy season, we suggest children keep an extra set of clothing at school, especially pants and socks. These can be kept in a labeled bag in the classroom.

All students, Kindergarten to Grade 8, go outside at recess. If your child is not well enough to go outside they need to be resting at home until they are feeling better.

Being physically active during our Canadian winter is an essential part of a healthy and fulfilling lifestyle.



School Visitors

ALL parents and visitors are required to sign in at the office and wear a visitor's pass. Parents may not go through the hallways or out onto the school yard. At entry and dismissal times, we remind families to wait outside for their children. If you need to speak to your child's teacher, please send a note or call the office for an appointment.

Following these procedures fosters independence in our students and ensures a greater degree of safety for all. We appreciate your support in keeping our students safe!

Chess Sets Wanted!

Many of our students are developing their math strategy skills by playing chess at recesses. As so many students are interested in playing we are looking



for more chess sets. If you have a chess set at home that is no longer being used, we would be happy to have it at school. Please drop them off in the school office or send them with your child.

Absences—Call Us !

When your child is absent, please call the office. The answering machine is always on so you can leave a message any time - day or night. Press 1 to leave a message so we know that your child is safe.

When a student is not accounted for we will :

- Call home to see if the child is there, then
- Call the parent/guardian at work/mobile, then
- Call the emergency phone numbers, and finally (if we are unable to confirm the child's safety),
- Call the York Regional Police.

This call is a safety check; in accordance with the YRDSB Safe Arrival Policy #665.

Cold Weather

During the winter, we closely monitor the weather conditions, including temperature and wind chill. We consult a variety of weather information sources, including Environment Canada and then decide when it is appropriate for students and staff to be outdoors.

We try to have students outside at recess for fresh air and an activity break, as they need a chance to play and burn off energy.

When temperatures or wind chill reach -20°C, we strongly consider an indoor routine for recess. When temperature/wind chill reach -18-19°C, we consider a shortened outdoor recess.

Over the announcements students are reminded to wear EVERYTHING sent from home. Staff also watch to make sure jackets are zipped, hats are on and boots are worn as students head outdoors.




French Immersion Registration January 16th-February 13th, 2015

French Immersion (FI) registration has begun (January 16 to February 13, 2015). In order to streamline the registration process, parents or guardians of current Senior Kindergarten students (entering Grade 1 in 2015), and wishing to enroll in the French Immersion program, can visit or call the school office and request an *Office Index Card - short version*. The Office

Index Card must be signed by the principal of the home school. Parents or guardians then take this form, along with one piece of identification showing their address to Michaëlle Jean P.S. to register, between January 16 and February 13, 2015.

YRDSB's FI Accommodation Plan provides long-term consistency and equity of access to all students in York Region and will enable YRDSB to continue to offer the FI program to all who wish to enrol. The FI program will be offered in Dual Track or Single Track settings, in a variety of configurations. In order to meet community needs and optimize available space in our schools, a community's Grade 1-8 FI program may be provided over more than one school during the course of a student's FI education. This will allow flexibility in addressing community needs and the opportunity to use existing space in schools. More information is available on the Board's website: www.yrdsb.ca. Please note: Some of the FI accommodation plans will require facility modifications or the development of new schools and will require short-term transition plans that might include overflow while we work toward the long-term vision. Overflow refers to situations in which the Board directs students to attend a school other than their community school or optional program for a specific period of time, as defined in Policy #108.



Bus Cancellation

To ensure the safety of students, school bus service may be cancelled from time to time due to inclement weather, extreme temperatures and/or poor road conditions. In these cases, parents and students should develop alternate care/transportation arrangements.

Since some busing schedules begin by 7:00 a.m., cancellation decisions must be made by 6:00 a.m. to allow time to communicate this message to bus drivers. Cancellation decisions will only be made after thorough consultation with the Safety Officers of school bus companies servicing York Region and are based on several factors including precipitation, air temperature, road conditions and weather forecast.

Please note the following;

- A decision to cancel school bus service will be **region-wide** meaning all school buses, vans and taxis will not operate.
- School bus routes may be cancelled when severe weather is not affecting all municipalities in York Region. Both the YRDSB and YCDSB operate many regional educational programs. Students attending these programs are transported over large attendance areas encompassing several municipal boundaries. This limits the ability to cancel bus service using a municipality or zone methodology.
- Unless otherwise stated, schools will remain open and parents can make arrangements to transport their children to and from school even if school bus service is cancelled. If buses are cancelled in the morning, they will not operate in the afternoon. Therefore students transported to school by parents will require the same transportation home.

Please note that school bus charters will not operate when home to school bus service is cancelled (e.g. busses for fieldtrips).


00000 **Positive Parenting TIP**
