

Graduation Requirements



30 Credits: 18 Compulsory Credits and 12 Optional Credits

Compulsory credits are comprised of the following:

- 4 credits in English (1 credit per grade)*
- 3 credits in Mathematics (1 credit in Grade 11 or 12)
- 2 credits in Science
- credit in Canadian History
- credit in Canadian Geography
- 1 credit in The Arts
- 1 credit in Health and Physical Education
- 1 credit in French as a Second Language
- 0.5 credit in Career Studies
- 0.5 credit in Civics

In addition, students must complete:

- 12 optional credits†
- 40 hours of community involvement activities
- the provincial literacy requirement
- earn at least two credits through Online Learning ****

Plus ONE compulsory credit from each of the following groups:

- ** In groups 1, 2 and 3, a maximum of 2 credits in French as a Second Language can count as compulsory credits, one from group 1 and one from either group 2 or group 3.
- *** A maximum of 2 credits in Cooperative Education can count as compulsory credits.
- **** Families who wish to opt out their child from the Online Learning graduation requirement should speak to their child's school.
- † The 12 optional credits may include up to 4 credits earned through approved Dual Credit courses.
- * Student's achieving an OSSD Red Seal Specialist High Skills Major (SHSM) diploma will have additional requirements based on their particular program.





SPECIALIST HIGH SKILLS MAJOR

- All YRDSB secondary schools have one or more SHSM programs
- <u>SHSM programs at WCI</u>: Arts and Culture Business Health and Wellness
- Students may enroll in SHSM for Grades 11 & 12
 - A specific bundle of courses must be completed
 - Plus a 2 credit co-op
 - Required Certifications
- SHSM students benefit from specializing in specific industry sectors while in secondary school
- Students will enrich their learning and have many additional secondary school experiences available to them
- Students make informed transitions to post-secondary

OYAP

Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program

OYAP is a specialized program in high school that allows you to explore apprenticeship and consider careers in the skilled trades, generally starting in Grade 11 or 12 through the cooperative education program. There are 150 skilled trades in Ontario to choose from.



ACCELERATED OYAP



Interested graduating students have the opportunity to continue to earn hours toward their Level One Apprenticeship and college level credits while also finishing their high school graduation requirements.

- Select a 4-credit co-op course during grade 12 course selection
- Co-op teacher will meet with the student to discuss interests and abilities to help secure a potential job placement with a licensed tradespeople
- Students will have the opportunity to formally register in the trade and begin an apprenticeship.



- **If Approved:** you will be contacted by WCI to set up a registration appointment where your documents will be verified and your child's course requests are selected with you, and you must bring the following documents with you to that meeting:
 - **Proof of Residency:** Tax Bill or Legal Lease Agreement
 - **Birth Verification:** Students Birth Certificate or Passport
 - School Records: Transcript or Latest Report Card from current school
- **If Not Approved: SENDING SCHOOL** will connect with their students to notify you.



MOVING FROM A FRENCH SCHOOL TO WESTMOUNT



- If you attend Ventura or Frechette and you would like to attend WCI and you live in our school boundaries, you **STILL** have to fill out a transfer form.
- On the transfer form, you can state that you live in our area and you would like English programming.
- We ask that you do this so we can switch your home school over from Hodan Nalayeh Secondary School to Westmount Collegiate Institute in my My Pathway Planner.

- IF you are successful in receiving a spot at your "home" arts school and IF there is space available in the program at WCI after offers are made/accepted, you may be considered.
