

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students must earn at least two asynchronous online learning credits towards their Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Online Learning Graduation Requirement

Opting out

Parents or guardians who wish to opt out or exempt their student from the online graduation requirement must complete the opt-out form available in the Guidance Office.

Alternatively students can opt-out during Course Selection through myBlueprint.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Math Literacy Requirement

- Students will be required to score 70 per cent or higher to meet the financial literacy graduation requirement, with the first attempt to be taken during the Grade 10 math course.
- Those who are unsuccessful will be able to attempt it once more in the Grade 10 course before proceeding to credit recovery or further in-school supports.
- Credit recovery helps students who have failed a course to successfully complete only the concepts or expectations not achieved.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Tech Course Requirement

 All students are required to earn a Grade 9 or 10 Technological Education credit, which is a compulsory graduation requirement for the Ontario Secondary School Diploma.

Graduation Requirements



30 Credits: 17 Compulsory Credits and 13 Optional Credits

- 2 credits in Science
- 1 credit in Technological Education (Grade 9 or 10)
- 1 credit in Canadian History (Grade 10)
- 1 credit in Canadian Geography (Grade 9)

- 1 credit in The Arts
- 1 credit in Health and Physical Education
- 1 credit in French as a Second Language
- 0.5 credit in Career Studies
- 0.5 credit in Civics & Citizenship
- 1 credit from the STEM-Related Course Group



OYAP is a specialized program in high school that allows you to explore apprenticeship and consider careers in the skilled trades, generally starting in Grade 11 or 12 through the cooperative education program. There are 150 skilled trades in Ontario to choose from.





ACCELER ATED OYAP

Interested graduating students have the opportunity to continue to earn hours toward their Level One Apprenticeship and college level credits while also finishing their high school graduation requirements.

- Select a 4-credit co-op course during grade 12 course selection
- Co-op teacher will meet with the student to discuss interests and abilities to help secure a potential job placement with a licensed tradespeople
- Students will have the opportunity to formally register in the trade and begin an apprenticeship.



MOVING FROM A FRENCH SCHOOL TO WESTMOUNT

- Would like to attend WCI
- Live in the WCI attendance boundaries, you STILL have to fill out a transfer form.
- On the transfer form, you can state that you live in our area and you would like English programming.
- We ask that you do this so we can switch your home school over from Hodan Nalayeh Secondary School to Westmount Collegiate Institute in my My Pathway Planner.

- Grade 8 students are to request and submit a Transfer Request Form to their elementary schools.
- Students currently attending secondary schools are to submit a transfer request form to their Principal.
- Submit your transfer forms by January 31, 2025.
- You will be notified if the transfer is approved or not in early February.
- If your transfer is approved, your course selections in My Pathway Planner will be transferred to WCI.

Scenario #4: You live outside of York Region







STUDENTS WHO <u>LIVE</u> OUTSIDE YORK REGION

- Contact the Westmount C.I. Office in January of 2025 and request an Out of Area Application
- This is a separate process that requires a different level of approval
- Students from outside of York Region cannot apply to / enrol in specialized regional programs (e.g., Arts West)

You must live within the YRDSB

- If you belong to one of our Arts West feeder schools (see list on YRDSB) then you may apply to Arts Westmount.

- IF you are successful in receiving a spot at your "home" arts school and IF there is space available in the program at WCI after offers are made/accepted, you may be considered.
