Include all available elements in the order given below:

Authority(s) (eg. Author). "Part of Complete Work" (eg. "Article Title"). <u>Title of Complete Work</u> (eg. <u>Title of Publication or Website</u>). (Medium - if required to avoid confusion) (eg. DVD). Location: Publisher / Producer / Distributor (eg. Toronto: Random), Copyright Date [n.d. if no date]: Pagination (eg. Pages used (or) URL (or) Document ID doi:xxxxx if online followed by month and year accessed). [if URL or DOI then do not use the colon ":" before the pagination field]

- **skip any unavailable elements** and proceed to next element
- **hanging indent** (first line not indented but subsequent lines are)
- **surname first** for author name
- alphabetize by first entry
  - use quotation marks "..." around article/essay title
- underline main title
- The bibliography is then arranged alphabetically by the <u>first available element</u>
