Dear Families and Community Members:

Semester II is about to begin! We are on our way to the end of the school year. The expression is that "time flies when you are having fun" so it must mean that we are having lots of fun!

Many students in grades 11 and 12 are going to want to change their timetables and all students (and parents) must remember that we have a process for timetable changes and it is very important that all students follow this process. Patience is necessary and I can tell you from experience (a lot of experience!) that most often things work out exactly the way the students want it to happen.

I recently went out with our Guidance team, and have now visited all of our elementary partner schools to help incoming grade 9 students learn about Westmount CI; and to help with course selection decisions. Current WCI students must choose and submit their courses on My Blueprint by Monday, February 24th. The "submit" button will be active as of Wednesday, February 12th. It is very important that students choose their courses wisely, as this information is used to determine our timetable and course offerings for next year. Both courses will run from 3:30 pm to 5:00 pm on their assigned days. These courses will be beginning next week on either Wednesday February 5th or Thursday February 6th. If you have not yet signed up your grade 10 student, and you wish to do so, please have your child come by the main office and/or please contact Vice-Principal Barb Caravella or our Literacy Teacher, Ms. Alice Sitt.

Next weekend, February 6 to 8, members of Westmount's DECA team will be participating in the provincial business competition at the Sheraton Centre in Toronto. We wish them much success!

Semester I final report cards will be mailed home on February 11th. Please look out for the report card and take some time to talk to your child about their progress during the first semester

Do you have a child writing the OSSLT this year?

One of the many supports Westmount is putting into place to support our students is to offer an After School Literacy Program. The goals of this program are to build the literacy skills of students who need additional support; to build their confidence in reading and/or writing skills; and to provide some extra help in literacy. Developing a <u>Student Suicide Intervention Protocol</u> to help keep students safe in the event of suicidal thoughts or actions.

Educating students about the risks of <u>substance use and misuse</u>, including <u>vaping</u> and <u>cannabis</u>.

Providing strategies and supports for students in preparing for exams and managing stress.

This commitment is also reflected in Board policy like the <u>Healthy Schools and Workplaces</u> policy and procedures. Setting policy, which governs the operation of the Board, is one of the <u>roles of trustees</u>, and we greatly value the input provided by students, staff members, family and community members. I encourage you to look at the <u>policies under review</u> and share your feedback.

We have a lot to look forward to in 2020. At the Board meeting in December, trustees unanimously approved the addition of <u>new permanent Indigenous Trustee and Indigenous</u> <u>Student Trustee positions</u>. We are committed to Indigenous Education in our Board and it is important that these voices are represented at the table. We hope to fill the positions as soon as possible and will share more information as it becomes available.

NOVEL CORONAVIRUS - FAQ

January 23, 2019

What is coronavirus?

Coronaviruses are a large family of viruses that are known to cause illness ranging from the simple common cold to more severe diseases such as Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) and Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS). We see many different types of coronaviruses here in York Region, Ontario and Canada.

What is novel coronavirus?

The type of coronavirus found in Wuhan, China is a new (novel) strain, and not found here in Canada. Information about its ability to spread from person to person and the seriousness of this infection are still emerging.

What are the symptoms associated with this illness?

Common symptoms of coronaviruses vary based on the type of coronavirus, but can often include symptoms like fever, cough, runny nose, sore throat and headache.

So far, authorities are reporting that the most common symptoms of the novel coronavirus include: fever, new or worsening cough or shortness of breath.

How are coronaviruses spread?

<u>Known Coronaviruses</u>: These types of coronaviruses are responsible for causing the common cold and can spread from person to person, usually after close contact with an infected person (e.g., in a household, workplace or health care setting) through respiratory secretions (e.g., a runny nose or saliva) and droplets present in the air from coughing or sneezing; or through touching surfaces contaminated with respiratory droplets, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes before washing your hands.

<u>Novel Coronavirus</u>: As this is a new disease, much about it is still unknown. While there is evidence of some person-to-person transmission, it is yet to be confirmed how *easily* the disease spreads from person-to-person; for example if the spread is limited to only close or prolonged contact with a case.

What do we know so far?

As seen in recent media reports, on December 31, 2019, Chinese authorities reported an outbreak of a novel coronavirus originally associated with a local live seafood market in Wuhan, China involving many cases, as well as some deaths. New information on the number of cases and deaths continues to be received on an almost daily basis.
