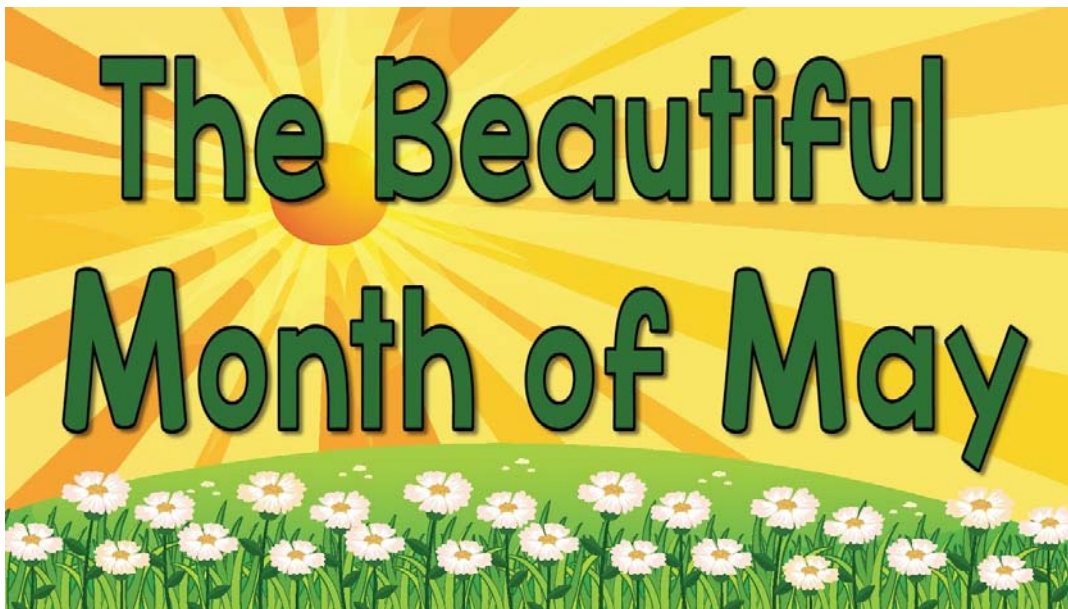

## **DECA INTERNATIONALS**

DECA Internationals, 2018, took place between April 20th and 26th in Atlanta, Georgia, where 20,000 students from across the world attended to compete in a series of business competitions in marketing, hospitality, finance, management and entrepreneurship. Accompanied by Mr. Coates, Benji Saltz and Matthew Paulin competed in the Entrepreneurship Independent Business category while Sydney Perez competed in the Hotel & Lodging Management event. Having successfully advanced through the regional competitions in November and provincial competitions in February, the students, along with 800 others, represented Ontario in competitions against students from other provinces, the United States, China, Korea, Germany, Switzerland, Honduras, Mexico and Guam. Sydney Perez advanced to the final rounds as one of the Top 10 in her category. Congratulations Ms. Perez, Mr. Saltz and Mr. Paulin on a very successful week. Westmount is proud!

## Final Exam Considerations

Students now have access to the Final Exam Schedule, available through TeachAssist. They will need to log into the system with their GAPPS account to be able to view and print the exam schedule. As changes may occur, the online copy will be the most current version and students are encouraged to check it regularly.

In light of the early date for our graduation ceremony this year (June 26<sup>th</sup>), the **last day of Grade 12** classes is June 15<sup>th</sup>. Additionally, Period 4 Exams will occur outside of the regular exam schedule, between 8:40 and 10:40 on the morning of June 18<sup>th</sup>. Period 3 Exams will also occur outside of the regular exam schedule, between 8:40 and 10:40 on the morning of June 19<sup>th</sup>. For most classes, both Period 3 and Period 4 Grade 12 Exams will write in the cafeteria. Students requiring extra time and accommodations, as per their IEPs, will write in the library at the same time. Once students taking a Grade 12 Exam have completed their final exam on June 18<sup>th</sup> and June 19<sup>th</sup>, they are encouraged to return home to continue to prepare for their upcoming exams.

Exams for all other courses (Grade 9 – 11, and Grade 12 Period 1, 2 and 5 Exams) will commence on June 20<sup>th</sup>, beginning at 10:00 a.m.

While we can appreciate that circumstance may arise, it is the expectation that all students complete their final exams as required. To this end, if a student is unable to write their final exam as scheduled, please notify the Main Office so that an alternate time during the Exam Schedule can be arranged.

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## National Denim Day

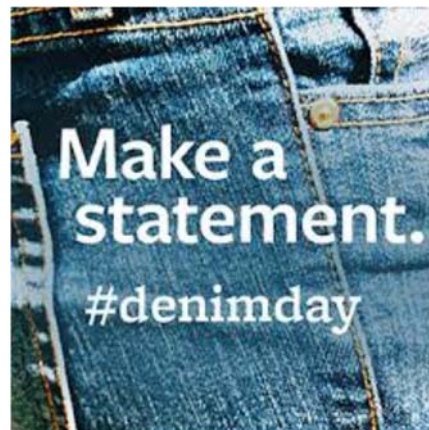
Tuesday, May 15 is National Denim Day! This event is held annually on the Tuesday following Mother's Day.

## Science Olympics

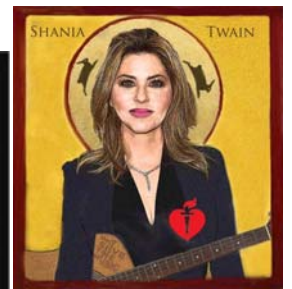
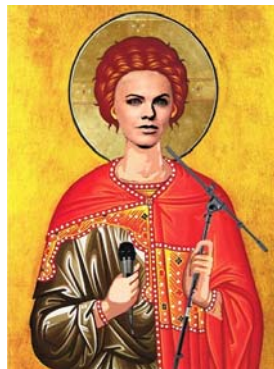
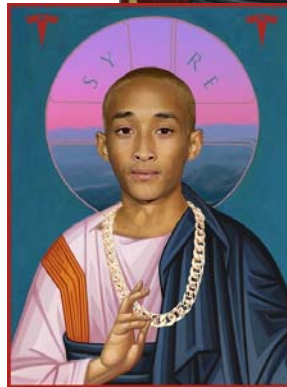
On Wednesday May 2nd, the WCI Science Olympics team, along with their coaches, Ms. Wodlinger and Ms. Nguyen, travelled to Seneca @ York to compete at the YRDSB 2018 Science Olympics. Our team was made up of 20 students divided up into two junior teams and two senior teams. This year's theme, Science Olympics goes to Hollywood, led to events that required students to create timed "explosions", supportive booms for microphones, and more. After a long day competing against teams from 20 schools across the board, in the areas of biology, physics, and chemistry, WCI walked away as winners!

### Available Positions

A. York Region District School Board (YRDSB) invites parents/guardians of students attending schools in the following areas:

- Central – ONE Elementary Position
- North – ONE Elementary Position
- West – ONE Elementary Position and ONE Secondary Position
- East – ONE Elementary Position

Membership is available for one-year or two-years on the Parent, Family and Community Engagement Advisory Committee (PEAC) to commence in November 2018. The Board will approve membership terms, as required. There are currently five (5) positions available. (To check the respective areas that schools are in use our [school locator](#).)

B. York Region District School Board invites one (1) community member from any part of the region to participate as an advisor for a term of up to four (4) years.

- Regional – ONE Position – Not required to have child/ren in school

PEAC supports encourages and enhances parent engagement at the Board level in order to improve student achievement and well-being. PEAC does this by providing information and advice on parent engagement to the Board, communicating with and supporting school councils and undertaking activities to help parents support their children's learning. The Committee's mandate is to:

- a) develop strategies and initiatives that the Board and the Board's Director of Education could use to effectively communicate with parents/guardians and to effectively engage parents/guardians in improving student achievement and well-being.
- b) advise the Board and the Director of Education on ways to use the strategies and initiatives referred to above.
- c) communicate information from the Ministry to school councils of schools of the Board and to parents/guardians of pupils of the Board.
- d) work with school councils of schools of the Board and, through the Board's Director of Education, with employees of the Board to;

- i. share effective practices to help engage parents/guardians, especially parents/guardians who may find engagement challenging, in their children's learning.
  - ii. identify and reduce barriers to parent engagement.
  - iii. help ensure that schools of the Board create a welcoming environment for parents/guardians of its pupils.
  - iv. develop skills and acquire knowledge that will assist the Parent, Family and Community Engagement Advisory Committee and school councils of the Board with their work.
- e) determine, in consultation with the Board's Director of Education and in keeping with the Board's policies and procedures, how funding, if any, provided under the Education Act for parent involvement is reported.

The Parent, Family and Community Engagement Committee (PEAC) is established according to Ministry legislation and members must be prepared to attend each meeting. PEAC meetings are generally scheduled on the second Tuesday of the month. Members are required to attend a minimum of six meetings and will have opportunities to participate in other workshops and events. The first meeting date for the new membership is November 13, 2018.

PEAC is composed of:

- 12 parents/guardians (2 Elementary and 1 Secondary for each Community Education Center)
- 1 Director of Education or Designate
- 1 Trustee and 1 alternate
- 1 Special Education Advisory Committee member
- 1 Equity and Inclusivity Advisory Committee member
- 1 Community Member at Large

Members are selected based on principles of representation that include diversity in all its manifestations, a variety of skills, experiences, location and knowledge. The contents of the Membership Applications are kept strictly confidential.

Two references are required, one of whom should be any YRDSB staff member. Parents/guardians who are also employees of the Board are asked to self-identify when applying. References are kept strictly confidential.
