A few interesting facts about William Berczy – the man!

- -William Moll Berczy was born Johann Albrecht Ulrich Moll in 1774 in Wallerstein, Germany
- William Moll Berczy conceived the plan to lay the foundations for a better society in the new world
- William Moll Berczy was equally gifted as a scholar and as an artist
- -John Graves Simcoe, First Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada, persuaded Moll Berczy to settle his Germans in the Town of York and part of the agreement was the construction of a road from Lake Ontario to Lake Simcoe by the Germans (Yonge Street!)
- -The winter of 1794/95 saw the first white inhabitants of Markham Township, approximately 200 men, women and children.
- -Berczy left York in 1804, and went to Montreal where he established himself as a portrait painter.
- -In 1813, Berczy disappeared in New York under mysterious circumstances and was found dead at the age of 67. If you are ever travelling to NYC, Berczy is buried in Manhattan in the Trinity Cemetery.



How can I help my child with French? This is a question that is most





a very "needy" subject, in that, it needs to be practiced as often as possible, and for many, this can be a challenge.

For many families who don't speak French, French homework can be a way to allow your child to have some autonomy over their own learning. This can be a very positive change for many students, especially for those in the younger grades; to begin learning how to take charge and be responsible for their own learning while having your support.

TOP 10 TIPS ~ on how you can help your child be successful learning French (and other subject areas too)!

- 1. Be enthusiastic. Learning a new language can be scary for many students, so as parents if you show a positive attitude, your child will also feel at ease.
- 2. **Be patient.** Learning a new language is not easy. It takes time and practice. Encouraging your child along the way and understanding their learning pace can make a big difference in their attitude towards French.
- 3. Celebrate success. Not every child will be an 'A' student in the beginning. It is important to remember that (especially in grade 4, but also in grade 5-8) your child is learning something new which, at times, can be daunting and sometimes leaving students to feel discouraged. Rather than frustrating your child by having high expectations, celebrate the things that they have already achieved in such a short time.
- 4. **Don't compare.** At William Berczy, we understand that each student learns at a different pace and in different ways. Just because the kid next door is excelling in French, that doesn't mean that your child is behind. With a little time, patience, and encouragement, every student has the potential to learn.
- 5. **Reverse the roles.** Have your child read in French or speak to you in French and then translate what he or she said or read. This will greatly empower your child by letting them teach you something new!
- 6. Make screen time French time. Allow your child to explore French television and apps. By watching familiar shows in French, your child will "build an ear" for the French language, and will also be able to connect French with English words.
- 7. **Encourage the use of dictionaries.** If your child is struggling with finding the right word, encourage them to use a dictionary and not a translator. The problem with translators is that they will often use sentence structures that are inaccurate or, quite the opposite, too advanced for your child's level. By using a translator, your child will not learn how to structure sentences on his or her own, which becomes counter-productive in the learning process.
- 8. Communicate with the teacher. Don't wait until it's too late. If you notice that your child is struggling with French, contact his or her French teacher as soon as possible. Better yet, have your child speak to his or her teacher. Catching up in French can be difficult but always possible.
- 9. Consider extra help. If you and your child's teacher feels that he or she would benefit by having more practice, consider hiring a French tutor for your child or sending them to reputable after-school French classes.
- 10. The key to helping your child is to remain consistent. Your consistent effort and support, combined with their desire to succeed, will give them the encouragement to stay positive and always put in their best effort.

- Light or low-fat popcorn.
- · Applesauce.
