We have a number of students in our school that have a life-threatening NUT allergy. We ask that all parents help to keep our school community safe.

Basic PERSONAL SAFETY TIPS that children need to know:

- Their name, age, telephone number, address, city and province. This can be done through rhyme or song.
- How to contact their parents at any time, by memorizing cell or work numbers.
- How and under what circumstances to call 911.
- To never approach or enter a stranger's vehicle. A responsible adult would never ask a child for directions or any other question for that matter.
- Make sure they know they have a right to say "no" to an adult, especially when the adult is asking them to do something they have been taught is wrong or feels uncomfortable. Reminding children of this right is important because children are taught from a young age to respect adults.
- To always tell parents where they will be and to never enter someone's home without their parent's permission.
- If home alone, never admit it when answering the phone. Never answer a knock at the door or speak through it. Adults can be very persuasive. Teach your child to call you if there is a knock at the door and if they fear for their safety, teach them to call 911. Make sure they know that police officers are there to help them and would not get mad if it were a false alarm.
- If they think they are being followed or are in danger they should run home or to a public place. If someone grabs them, they should try to get away, yelling and screaming while doing so.
- It is important to play in safe areas, never take shortcuts and stick with a buddy whenever possible.

It is never too early or too late to teach children the importance of personal safety. Common sense, communication and consistency are key. Remind children to alert a responsible adult if something strange happens that makes them feel uncomfortable. Remember, crime prevention is everyone's responsibility.




At WBPS, our staff are your LEAD LEARNERS —

As a professional learning team, the staff at William Berczy are engaged in purposeful, intentional on-going learning. In alignment with our Board Improvement Plan for Student Achievement (BIPSA), we are focusing on deepening our learning in the 3 key areas of Mathematics, Modern Learning and Mental Health.

Mathematics: Students will be confident problem solvers who use mathematical knowledge, skills and processes to be contributing members of a changing society;

Modern Learning: Modern Learning is authentic, relevant, deep learning that enables learners to create, to connect, to communicate, to share their learning with the world and be future ready;



Mental Health: A healthy school / workplace climate provides opportunities for all students and staff to make healthy choices in a learning and working environment that is respectful of their social, emotional and physical well-being.

As a school staff, after an analysis of our schools' perceptual, contextual and assessment data, we have determined that our greatest needs lie in supporting and enhancing critical thinking and risk-taking as

a method for our students to increase their levels of achievement. As such, each member of our school team has chosen a 'Point of Passion'. This passion project aligns with one of the three board and school foci and directly relates to how we can increase the opportunities for critical thinking and/or risk taking in our everyday programs. We are working collaboratively in teams to plan, implement and reflect upon our daily lessons. There is a large component of this professional development that integrates opportunities for students to co-plan, co-create and coreflect on their work as well. 

This is an exciting time for the York Region District School Board. Through our commitment to inspire learning in deep and relevant ways we have created our first online, five-year Board Improvement Plan for Student Achievement and Well-Being (BIPSA 2016-2021). As a five-year plan, it is a living document; not meant to sit on a shelf or be used as a checklist.

The BIPSA has been structured to align and support our system, our schools and our classrooms as we learn, plan and take action. This structure has been guided by a belief that, "When large numbers of people have a deeply understood sense of what needs to be done - and see their part in achieving that purpose - coherence emerges and powerful things happen." (Fullan and Quinn. Coherence: The RightDrivers in Action for Schools, Districts, and Systems. 2015)



The evolution in thinking represented by this BIPSA creates district coherence while recognizing individual school contexts. This BIPSA makes clear our commitment to improve student experiences and outcomes in each of our identified focus areas: **Modern Learning, Mathematics** and **Mental Health**. The foundational practices of **Equity, Innovation,** and **Leadership** are evident throughout the actions of each strategy.

The BIPSA is aligned with the Ministry of Education's Achieving Excellence: A Renewed Vision for Education in Ontario, and informed by the School Effectiveness Framework. It is designed to reflect YRDSB's Mission, Vision and Values and supports both the Trustees' Multi-Year Plan and the Director's Annual Plan. The BIPSA identifies strategic actions to support alignment and continuous improvement while complementing ongoing work in key areas. We remain committed to a coherent and focused path to achieve clear alignment in our planning processes. The BIPSA makes explicit that students and their experiences in our schools and classrooms are at the centre of all we do.

Skiing, Snowboarding, Skating, & Snowshoeing

Berczy is excited to announce that once again we will be offering ski and snowboard opportunities for our junior and intermediate students. The purpose of these trips is to offer enrichment opportunities through physical education. Ski & snowboard trips allow students to experience outdoor activity during our winter months.

Students in grades 3-6 have the opportunity to ski or snowboard at Dagmar for two days on Wednesday January 11th & 25th.

Students in grades 7 & 8 have the opportunity to participate in a field trip to Horseshoe Valley Resort on February 23rd. Students will have one of four choices: skiing, snowboarding, skating + tubing (half day of each), or snowshoeing + tubing (half day of each). These programming options facilitate participation for students of all abilities by offering them snowshoeing which is a low-risk, social activity.

For both the junior and intermediate trips, students who have never skied or snowboarded previously will be supported by an instructor, and kept on suitable terrain for their abilities.

We require **parent volunteers** for both of these trips, and Dagmar & Horseshoe provide a lift ticket and rentals for parents who are comfortable skiing or snowboarding. Please contact Mr. Kitching if you are able to volunteer. Payment via School Cash Online will be set-up in the coming weeks.


We have moved to an **online calendar** that can be viewed on our school website – rather than the month at a glance hard copy calendar.

Ontario's Well-Being Strategy for Education

Fact Sheet for Parents

Well-being is fundamental to overall student success. Students can't learn if they don't feel safe and welcome at school, if their mental health is at risk and if they don't have the tools or the motivation to adopt a healthy, active lifestyle, both inside and outside of school. Children and students who have strong relationships and a positive sense of self are most likely to reach their full potential.

There are four key components to the ministry's well-being strategy:

- Positive Mental Health involves helping school boards develop and implement mental health and addiction strategies and working with staff to support positive mental health for all students, including supporting those with mental health needs or addictions.
- Safe and Accepting Schools set out expectations for all school boards to provide safe, inclusive and accepting learning environments that support the achievement and well-being of every student. These expectations include addressing and preventing bullying and creating a positive school climate.
- Healthy Schools are key to establishing the learning conditions necessary to help students reach their full potential. With these conditions in place, students are more likely to adopt healthy, active habits and continue with them throughout their lives.
- Equity and Inclusive Education involves identifying and removing discriminatory biases and barriers in the system to support student achievement and well-being - by demonstrating respect for our diverse identities and strengths.





What is Well-Being?

Well-being is a positive sense of self, spirit and belonging that we feel when our cognitive, emotional, social and physical needs are being met. Well-being in early years and school settings is about helping children and students become more resilient, so that they can make positive, healthy choices to support learning and achievement, now and in the future.

What Makes up Well-Being?

The ministry is focusing on four domains of well-being, which include:

- Cognitive the development of abilities and skills such as critical thinking, problem solving, creativity, and the ability to be flexible and innovative.
- Emotional the ability to learn about and experience emotions, and understand how to recognize, manage, and cope with them. It includes developing a sense of empathy, confidence, purpose and resilience.
- Social the development of self-awareness, including the sense of belonging, collaboration, relationships with others, and communication skills.
- Physical the growth and development of the body, affected by physical activity, sleep patterns, healthy eating and healthy life choices.



Promoting well-being is about fostering learning environments that encompass all four of these domains of well-being. Educators and staff who are motivated and enthusiastic about their work are an essential part of promoting well-being and achievement.

Next Steps

We plan to work together with our education partners, such as school boards, to determine what well-being looks like, what is needed to support it and how best to measure it. We also want to learn from the good work that has already been done to promote well-being in Ontario's education system. By determining how best to measure well-being, we can also understand more clearly what is needed to create positive learning environments and focus on how this supports everything we do. It also allows us to figure out how to improve student well-being across the province.

In addition to our work with students in elementary and secondary schools, in the future we will also be expanding our focus to include children in the early years system, as well as educators and all staff.

Our goal is that all children, students and staff will feel supported in the areas of cognitive, emotional, social and physical well-being. We know that children and students will be more successful when they have a positive sense of self, spirit and belonging, and the skills to make positive choices.

Ontario is committed to helping students build the knowledge and skills associated with positive well-being, so they can become confident, capable and caring citizens.
