

Federal Election Voting Location

Woodbridge College will be a polling station for the upcoming federal election on April 28, 2025.

This is a valuable opportunity to highlight the importance of the democratic process for our students. Please be assured that school operations will continue as normal. We will take all appropriate measures to ensure student learning is not disrupted. This includes:

- Voters will use one access door, closest to the location of the polling station.
- The voting access door will be monitored at all times by an Elections Canada representative. Hallways between the access door and the polling station will be also monitored by Elections Canada staff.
- Elections Canada staff will be made aware of their responsibilities regarding school access.
- School administration and staff will also remain visible in the hallways throughout the day.

The majority of voting occurs after school hours; school parking and traffic should not be significantly affected on Election Day. However, we thank you for your patience as there may be some minor delays during arrival and dismissal due to additional pedestrian and vehicle traffic on April 28.





CO-OP & Pathway Opportunities

Young Women in Trades Bootcamp – A Day of Hands-On Learning

On Friday, March 21, thirty young women from grades 9 through 12 had the incredible opportunity to immerse themselves in the world of skilled trades at Enercare's training facility, located at 30 High Meadow Place (Finch & Weston). This unique experience provided students with direct, hands-on exposure to the fields of HVAC, electrical work, and plumbing—guided by experienced Enercare technicians.

Throughout the day, students engaged in a series of practical workshops designed to spark interest and build confidence in the skilled trades:


- **HVAC Workshop:** Students worked with measuring and fabrication tools to understand natural gas and propane piping and tubing systems.
- **Electrical Workshop:** Students were given an outlet box and a light fixture and were carefully guided through the wiring process—culminating in the moment they successfully turned on a light bulb.
- **Plumbing Workshop:** Students learned the fundamentals of assembling a toilet and installing a faucet by attaching water lines and assembling drainage fittings on a bathroom vanity.



The day was not only educational but also deeply inspiring. Each participant had the chance to explore potential career paths, develop new skills, and gain a better understanding of the vast opportunities within the trades industry. The enthusiasm and engagement throughout the bootcamp reflected the growing interest in skilled trades among young women—an important step toward breaking barriers and diversifying the industry.



Full Disclosure Date for Semester Two - May 6, 2025

The Full Disclosure date for Grade 11 and Grade 12 courses is May 6, 2025. If a student withdraws from a Grade 11 or 12 course on or prior to May 6, 2025, then the course will not be recorded on the Ontario Student Transcript. The full disclosure date for YRDSB Fall Session night school is Tuesday, April 29, 2025.

Potential graduates who are applying to an Ontario college and/or university who are planning to drop a course are encouraged to connect with their guidance counsellor in advance of these dates. Guidance appointments can be booked via teachassist.

Important dates

- April 15 - night school report cards
- April 24 - This is the date that Grade 11 and 12 marks are uploaded to OUAC
- April 25 - This is the date that Grade 11 and 12 marks are uploaded to OCAS
- April 24-28- report cards are e-transmitted
- May 6 - This is the date any Grade 11 and 12 courses will permanently appear on your transcript. Courses dropped by this date will not show on a student's transcript



Summer School - Continuing Education

Acceleration Courses (18 days)

For students who wish to earn a credit in a subject they have not previously studied or those who wish to upgrade a mark in a course that they have successfully completed. Students are encouraged to register early to avoid disappointment. Course offerings are not guaranteed as they are based on sufficient enrollment and teacher availability. Students can only take one acceleration course during the summer session. Transportation is not provided for this program.

Registration opens April 15, 2025.

Option 1 : Online Learning (formerly elearning)

Courses that are specifically designed to be taught in a fully online format. Online learning does not require pupils and teachers to be face-to-face with each other. Classes occur online using an asynchronous model, with check-in opportunities with the teacher. The learning platform is Brightspace by D2L.

Hours: Flexible (6 hours per day minimum)

Courses will be offered in a face-to-face learning model.

Option 3: Remote Synchronous Learning

The learning platform is Google Classroom. Classes will be a mix of synchronous (real-time) and asynchronous learning. The teachers will be expected to be online for most of the day. A majority of the day will be spent in synchronous learning experiences (Google Meet with whole class or small groups, phone or video chats, individual conferencing – a combination of many tools to engage in synchronous learning).
