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Positive Climates for Learning Update—Mme Cherid

Mme Cherid has been working hard to support a number of initiatives to ensure a positive climate at Woodland P. S. A huge thanks to Mme Cherid, as well as all of the students on the PC4L team. Merci also to our parent team members, Cindy C., Darrelle M., Cheryl A., Duessa D. and Deborah M who help support the work we do.

- 1. First Nations Communities Our community donated many winter items for our Keep Warm! initiative, including gloves, scarves, hats, etc. for the communities of Webequie and Attawapiskat.
- Milk Bag Campaign Students are making announcements every morning and the collection box gets filled up every few days. Collected milk bags will go to Markham, where they will be used to make mattresses and bags as a temporary solution for communities in need.
- Gardening/Greening Trees planted last fall have survived, and leaves are starting to come out. The pots at the entrance of the school will be redone, and students will care for these plants.
- Eco Certification We are silver certified, and are aiming for gold certification this year. The application was submitted last Wednesday, and eco inspectors will be coming on Wednesday, May 7 to meet with the school Eco Team and conduct the audit.
- Class Presentations PC4L student members have shared their Eco and Positive Climate activities with Grade 3, 4, 5, & 6 classes with great success!
- Equity and Inclusivity Conferences These were held during the month of April. Six Grade 7 & 8 students attended "Together We are Better" conference, while two attended the "Our Voices" conference. Students are organizing their postconference notes to be delivered to classmates.
- Vow of Silence With the support of Mme Valenzuela and Roxana Jam (a student), our students participated in the "Day of Silence" campaign. Students had the opportunity to reflect on how fortunate they are to have the freedom of speech and voices that matter in Canada.
- Walk/Wheel to School Thanks to Janet M., one of our parents, this campaign begins on May 9th. Please encourage your child to walk or wheel to school - it's good for one's health as well as the environment.
- PC4L Communication A bulletin board has been created at the front of the school to keep our community up to date with PC4L work.

Girls on the Run - Girls on Track is off to a great start at Woodland. Thanks to our coaches Mme. Valenzuela, Mme. Brion, Mme. Moussay and Mme. Kotliarova, we were able to accommodate all girls in Grades 6-8 who wanted to participate. No girls had to be wait-listed! The Girls on Track mission is "to inspire girls to be joyful, healthy and confident using a fun, experience-based curriculum which creatively integrates running."

As the warmer weather approaches, we ask that families review our student dress code.

The York Region District School Board believes that students must focus on achievement and well-being to be successful. It is important that students dress appropriately to demonstrate respect for self and others at all times. Woodland's student dress code promotes a caring, safe and respectful learning environment, and considers the diversity of the community in terms of culture, socioeconomic status, gender and other factors.

Woodland Dress Code:

The student dress code applies at school, on field trips and during any other school-related activity or event.

- ♦ Language or graphics on clothes will not display provocative, obscene, sexist or racist slogans, or refer to drugs, alcohol, smoking or sex.
- ♦ Clothing which contravenes the Human Rights Code in any way is unacceptable.
- ♦ Students will not wear clothing to school which is revealing or provocative. Midriffs and undergarments will remain covered at all times, and shorts or skirts will be mid-thigh in length. The following items are not acceptable: short skirts and shorts, tube tops, halter tops, and tops with narrow shoulder straps or 'spaghetti' straps.
- ♦ Clothing and accessories which depict violence or death or identify or promote cults or gangs are unacceptable.
- ♦ Head coverings of any description will not be worn inside the school. Exceptions are made for religious or medical reasons.
- ♦ Pyjamas or clothing which look like pyjamas are not to be worn at school except on Pyjama Spirit Day.
- ♦ For obvious safety reasons, weather appropriate shoes must be worn at all times. It is essential that all students have both indoor and outdoor shoes.
- ♦ Students will wear appropriate clothing for gym class, as indicated by Phys. Ed. teachers.

Parent Notification:

Parents will be notified when a student is not dressed appropriately for school. A student may be asked to:

- ♦ Turn the piece of clothing inside out
- ♦ Wear something over the inappropriate clothing
- ♦ Change into something else
- ♦ Remove the accessory and give it to the teacher, Vice-Principal or Principal

According to Board Policy #635.0 "Student Dress Code", Parent(s)/Guardian(s) are responsible for ensuring their child follows the student dress code, and students are responsible for following the student dress code.

Hours of Instruction for French Immersion—New for 2014

YRDSB offers a French Immersion program that is highly sought after. As we continue to implement recommendations from our recent French as a Second Language (FSL) review, we are making a slight adjustment, based on our research, that will provide better consistency within our schools while also better meeting student needs. Research shows the importance of time spent learning in French at the beginning of a program. In Grades 1 to 3, YRDSB students receive 100 per cent of their instruction in French. Beginning in Grade 4, English instruction is introduced for a number of subjects. Starting in the 2014-15 school year, weekly instructional time in Grades 4-8 will be shared equally between French and English language of instruction. Students will accumulate at least 5,000 hours of French language instruction by the end of Grade 8, which far exceeds the 3,800 hours mandated by the Ontario Ministry of Education. YRDSB remains deeply committed to providing high quality and sustainable French as a Second Language (FSL) instruction.

Woodland's Parent Engagement Evening—Math Learning

My husband and I attended the Parent Engagement Evening on Thursday, April 24th. The evening's topic was "Supporting my child's learning in Mathematics", which is something that we and, I am sure, many parents struggle with. The evening was prepared and presented by many of our dedicated Woodland teachers, and was made possible through funding by Woodland School Council and a PRO (Parent's Reaching Out) Grant.

The evening began in the gymnasium with a Powerpoint presentation by the teachers which accurately summed up how many parents feel about the current Mathematics curriculum...it's not how we learned Math! The teacher's pointed out that while the Math curriculum and its instruction is very different today, it is important not to pass our skepticism onto our children. Instead, parents were encouraged to instill perseverance and a "Can Do" attitude in our kids. A positive parental attitude towards Math goes a long way towards building a student's confidence.

The second part of the evening was broken into six stations, hosted by each teacher, which allowed parents to get some hands-on experience of different ways to incorporate Math into everyday life.

Mr. Robertson provided us with some great Math games for the iPad; Mr. Nieuwold took us on a tour of some excellent Math websites; Mr. Brion taught us about perseverance by having us work with tangrams; Mme. Cherid showed us how something as simple as looking through supermarket flyers and comparison shopping could provide an everyday, practical way to learn Math; Mme. Campbell demonstrated examples of how to use shapes to represent fractions; and Mme. Romansecu and Mme. Rosca had us play probability games with gym equipment that incorporated Math concepts. Each station had wonderful take away items and/or handouts to help with learning Math concepts at home. As a family, we have already incorporated many of them and are already seeing benefits.

I know in our busy lives with work, family, activities, etc., many parents find it difficult to attend events like this, but I can honestly say that the few hours we spent at Woodland P.S. on the 24th, it was well worth the effort. So, if you weren't able to join us for this presentation, please consider attending the next event...you will be glad you did! Thank you to all the teachers mentioned above who put together this presentation, along with support from Mme. Palmer. Thanks to Stephanie Bell who organized the child minding and refreshments for the evening.


