7:05	Principal Report		Catarina & Karen	A lot of professional learning has been going on in the school.  A diagram was shown to reflect the focus — equity, leadership and innovation within three main areas of modern learning, mental health and mathematics.  Mental health — Michelle Cassidy was a guest speaker; resources are available through the school and school board.  Mathematics — support in teaching with use of manipulatives. The grade 7 and 8 teachers involved in transitioning to grade 9. Grade 8s are going to Seneca College. Algebra is the most difficult strand to transition from grade 8 to 9. All grade 3s planning together. There is a requirement of 60 minutes a day of math that is already in place here. EQAO has shown that there can be room for improvement. Teachers are encouraged to make connections and integrate math in other subject areas.  Modern Learning workshop — how can we be responsive to the learning in the present time? What are the needs and how can we respond to them? Technology is part of this and a tool to enhance learning. This concept emphasizes collaboration, inquiry, critical thinking, deciphering information, perspective and audience. The emphasis in learning has shifted from the what to the how and why. This is promoting life skills.  Mental health — it is about the mindset — it is not static. Self-talk is very powerful. Changing that path, as Michelle Cassidy explained, is involved. Restorative practice is done with the students around issues that occur (e.g., at recess). It's looking at the impact of behaviour.
